

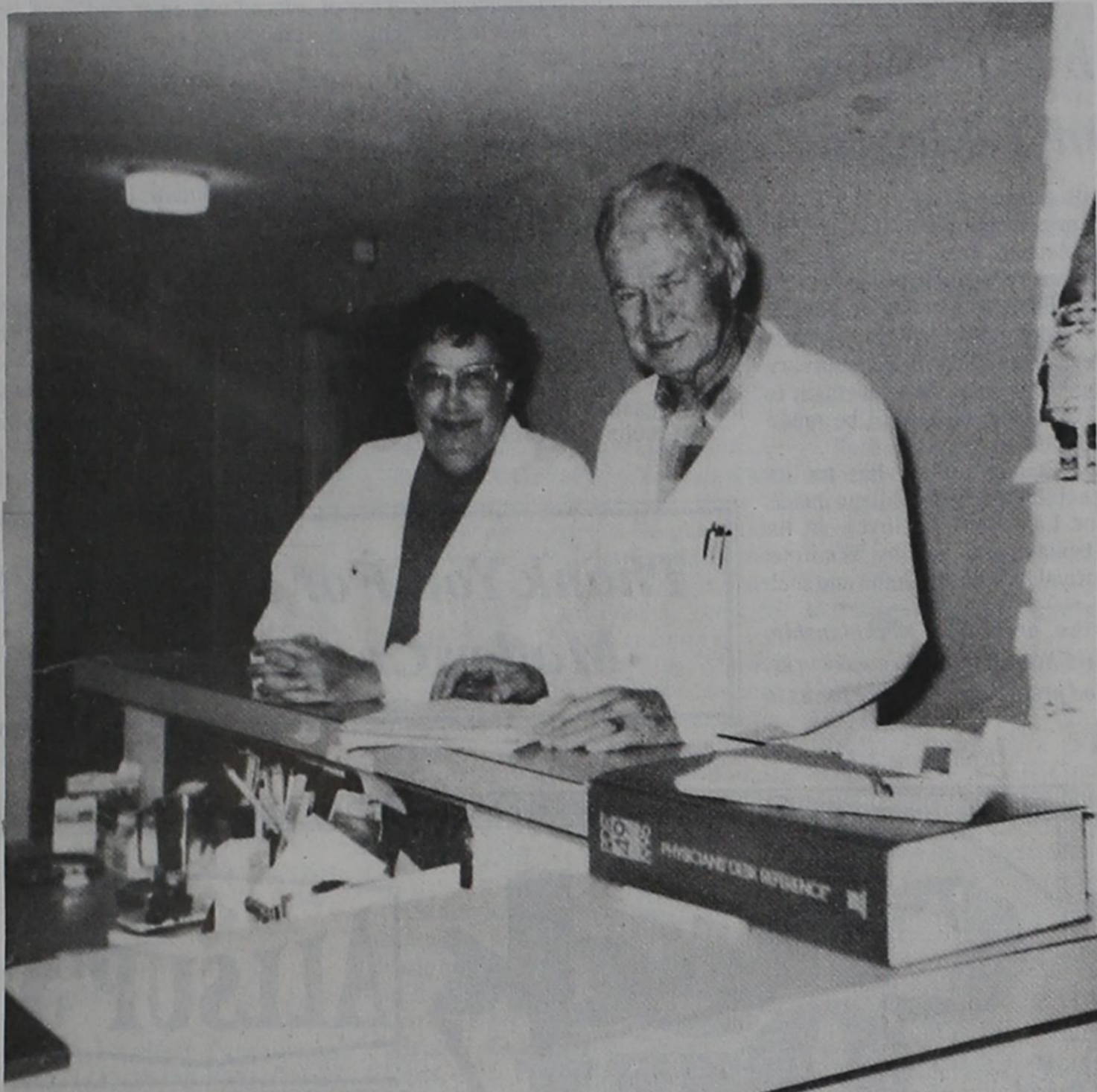

Texas House Re-Elects Laney As Speaker

AUSTIN — James E. "Pete" Laney, D-Hale Center, was re-elected Tuesday as the 71st Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Laney pledged to help remove any barriers preventing people from contributing their talents and ideas to the Texas

legislative process. "Every person should be able to make their voice heard in this chamber," Laney said.

He also noted that beginning today any citizen can have computer access to the legislative information systems. From home computers, they will be able to

track the progress of legislation. He also plans to request committee hearings on ways to broadcast future House sessions so that all Texans can watch the proceedings of the House.

"I want the people of Texas to be a part of this process more than ever before," Laney said.

Laney also pledged to balance the state budget without increasing state taxes. "We are fortunate to have a strong economy generating state revenues," Laney said.

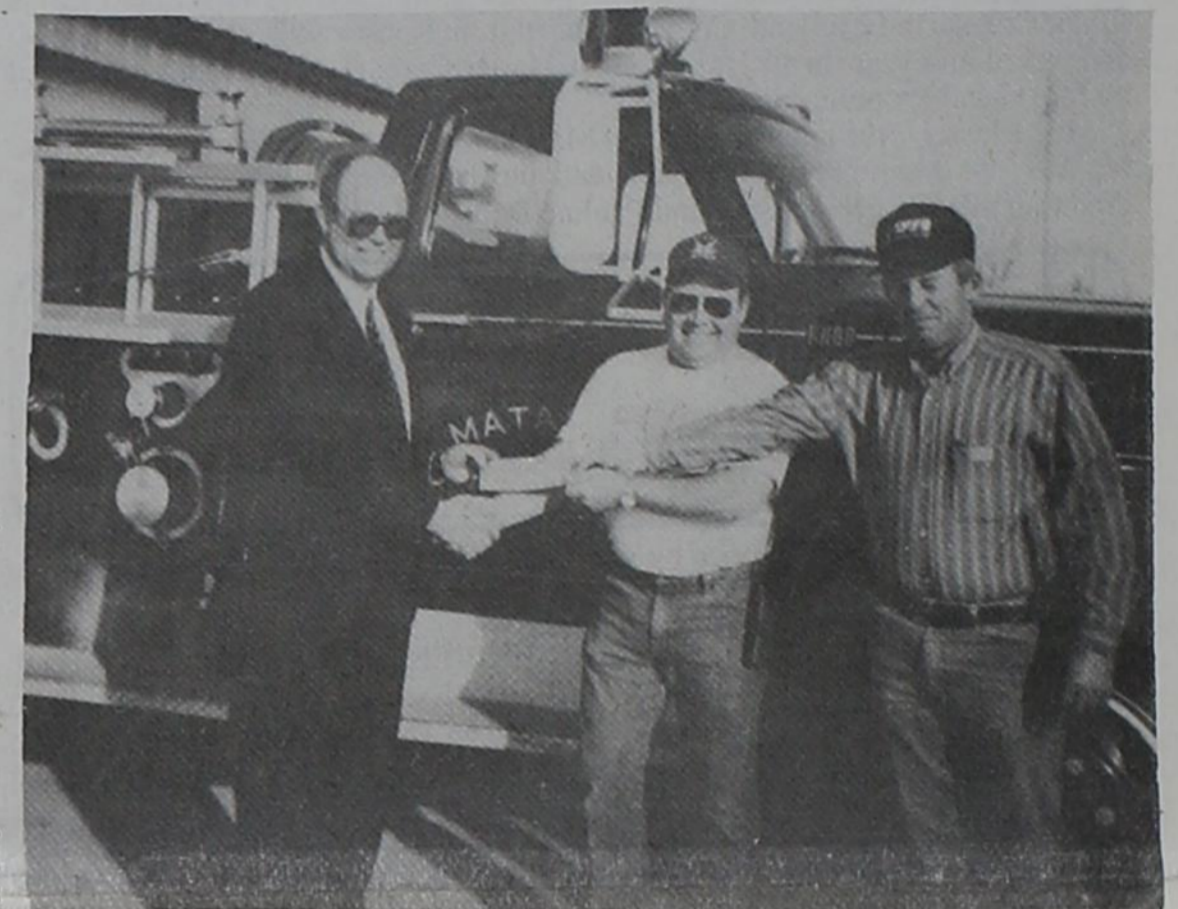
"But the growing demands of education, criminal justice and federally mandated programs will require difficult decisions on all areas of the budget."

Lawmakers also will reassess the entire structure of public education in Texas. "I truly hope this session can be devoted to

improving the quality of education in Texas rather than creating yet another school finance plan," Laney said.

He also called for changes in the juvenile justice system. He said we must do a better job of dealing with juvenile offenders and protecting our citizens from violence.

Laney, 51, was first elected speaker in January 1993. A Hale Center farmer, Laney is married to the former Nelda McQuien. They have three children: daughter KaLyn Laney of Austin; daughter Jamey Laney Phillips of Lubbock; and son, J. Pete Laney, a Texas Tech University student.

The Motley County Commissioners Court convened January 9 for regular session.

Judge Laverna Price opened the Court. Lucretia Campbell, County Clerk, read the minutes. Bills were read and approved.

The reports were read and accepted from Treasurer, Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector, County Agent, Library, and J.P. report from Precinct 1 Place 1, with \$6,938 collected and \$4,438 for the

county. Place 2, \$105 collected with \$35 for the county.

The Judge opened and read the insurance bids for coverage on the Sheriff department's two cars. Pipkin Insurance bid \$2,531.00; Long Insurance, no bid as he needs 45 day advance notice to prepare his bid. Pipkin bid was accepted because it is due February 1. Meeting adjourned.

Top Cooks Named In 4-H Food Show

New ways to prepare and serve some old favorites joined traditional recipes as 224 boys and girls from 25 counties exhibited their nutritional knowledge and cooking skills at the Rolling Plains District 4-H Food Show in Vernon Saturday, December 10 at the Wilbarger Memorial Auditorium. Four seniors will advance to the State competition in June 1995. Each received a plaque and ribbon in addition to advancing to the State contest. Second

place senior winners will participate in the State event if the first place winners can't take part. Intermediate and Junior Division winners also received ribbons and plaques, but do not compete beyond the District level.

Each contestant had earned championships in their county advance to the day-long competition at the District meet. The dishes were judged by panels of profes-

sional home economists and 4-H leaders. Contestants were quizzed on nutritional values, preparation methods and costs of preparation.

This show is one aspect of the year-round foods and nutrition project in 4-H, explained Elaine Houston, District Director with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. 4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System.

She said the project helps youth learn the relationship between science, foods and nutrition, and food preparation, as well as food buying, managing time, use of energy, and food storage and safety.

3rd Annual Caprock Cotton Conference to be held in Floydada

The latest information to help area cotton farmers plan their 1995 crop will be presented in Floydada on January 17-18, 1995 during the Caprock Cotton Conference. The two-day program, featuring national leaders in the cotton industry, will be at the Plains Baptist Assembly in Blanco Canyon located 7 miles south of Floydada.

The conference is designed for cotton growers of the Rolling Plains, South Plains, and West Texas. It is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Extension agricultural committees in Floyd and Crosby counties.

The program has been approved for ten (10) continuing education units (CEU) for recertification of licensed private and commercial applicators who attend.

The first day will be devoted to issue related to the cotton industry. Guest speakers will be Adam Ballinger, Publisher of Fiber News Magazine; Paulette Zabrzkeski, Legislative Analyst for National Cotton Council; Nicholas Hahn, President and CEO of Cotton Incorporated; and Marshall Kuykendall, Rancher and President to Take Texas Back.

The second day will focus on cotton production technology. Some of the guest speakers include Kater Hake, Extension Cotton Specialist; Dr. Wayne Keeling, Weeds and Herbicides Specialist with Texas Agricultural Experiment Station; Dr. Jim Lesser, Extension Entomologist; Dr. Bill Lyle, Ag. Engineer with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station; and Frank Meyers, Director of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation.

The cost to attend the Conference is \$45 for both days, or \$30 for one day. The fees include lunch, refreshments, and admission to the technical sessions and exhibits. Cotton producers will be able to register at the door. Checks should be made payable to the Caprock Cotton Conference.

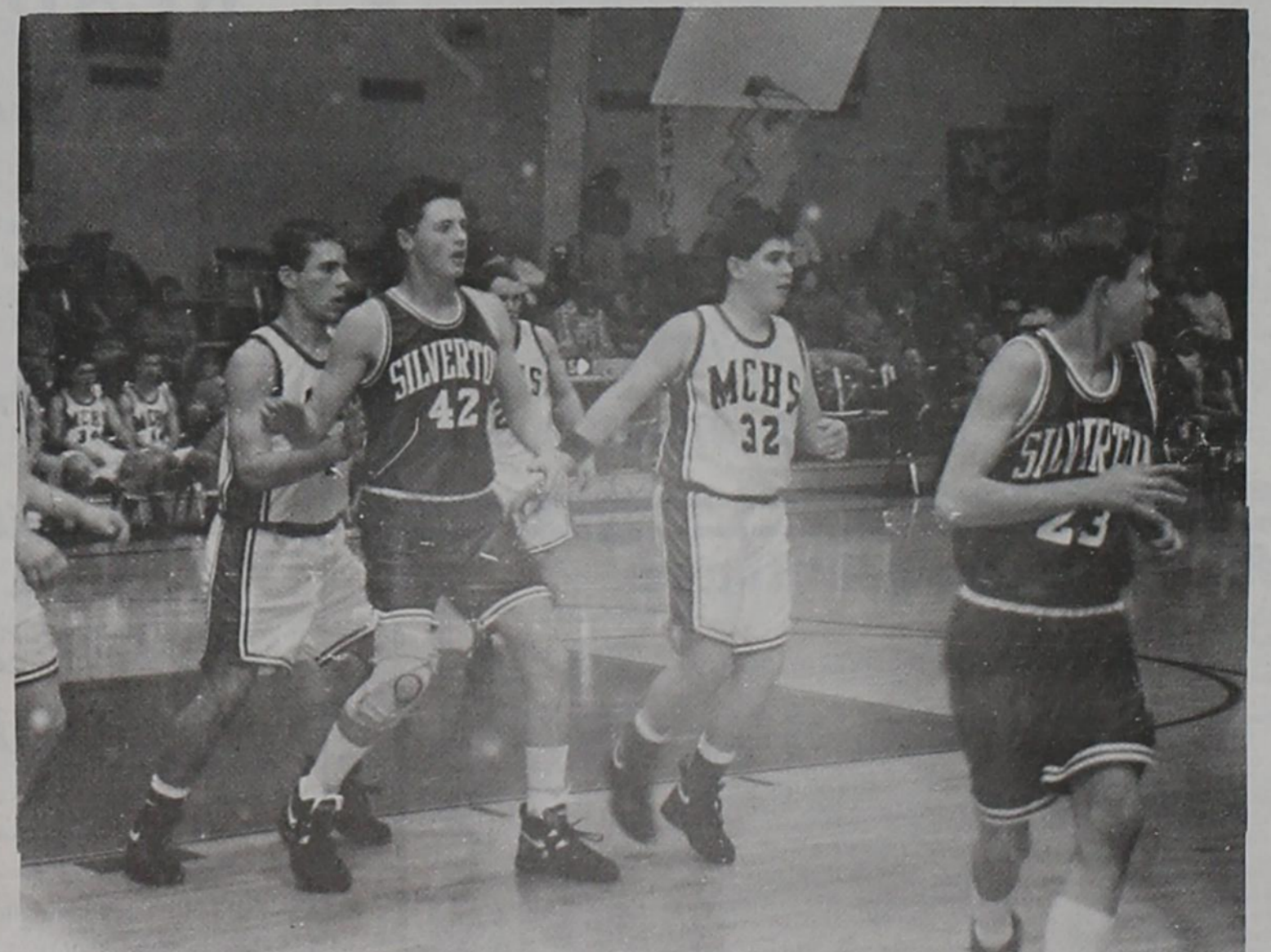
COTTON GIN TOTALS

Home Economically Speaking

LEARNING YOUR A'S AND C'S

The next best thing to whole fruits and vegetables is their juice. Most of the nutrients are retained, but nearly all the fiber is lost.

Orange juice is the leading source of Vitamin C in the American diet. But orange juice isn't the only juice high in Vitamin C, and Vitamin C isn't the only reason to drink juices:

— Vitamin C -- All citrus juices are high in C, containing up to twice the daily recommended Dietary Allowance (RDA) in an eight-ounce glass.

— Beta carotene -- Most red or orange-colored juices are rich in beta carotene. Red or pink grapefruit has more carotene than white. An eight-ounce glass of carrot juice supplies six times the amount recommended by most experts.

— Potassium -- This mineral is an ample supply in most juices, with carrot, prune, tomato, and orange juice at the top of the list.

— Folic acid -- Many juices are good sources of folic acid. Women of child-bearing age need twice as much of this B vitamin as other adults.

— Iron -- Prune juice is the only one high in iron, containing 30 percent of the RDA for men, 17 percent of that for premenopausal women.

— Calcium -- Fortified orange juice

contains as much calcium as milk and may be worthwhile for people who don't consume enough dairy products.

Juices need to be stored properly to retain close-to-maximum vitamin content. Vitamin C deteriorates in contact with oxygen, so the longer juices sit around exposed to air, the less Vitamin C. Fresh-squeezed juice has the highest Vitamin C content initially, followed by juice made from frozen concentrate. Once you get your juice home, store it properly. A refrigerated carton, reconstituted frozen juice, or canned juice can last two to four weeks before there is a serious loss of Vitamin C. To protect the Vitamin C from air, store the juice in a tightly closed container and keep it at 40 degrees or less.

Watch for the wording on labels when buying fruit juices. If it's labeled "juice", it must be 100 percent juice. Anything called "drink", "beverage", "punch", "juice blends", "ade", or "juice contain" usually contains little fruit juice - the rest being water and sugar.

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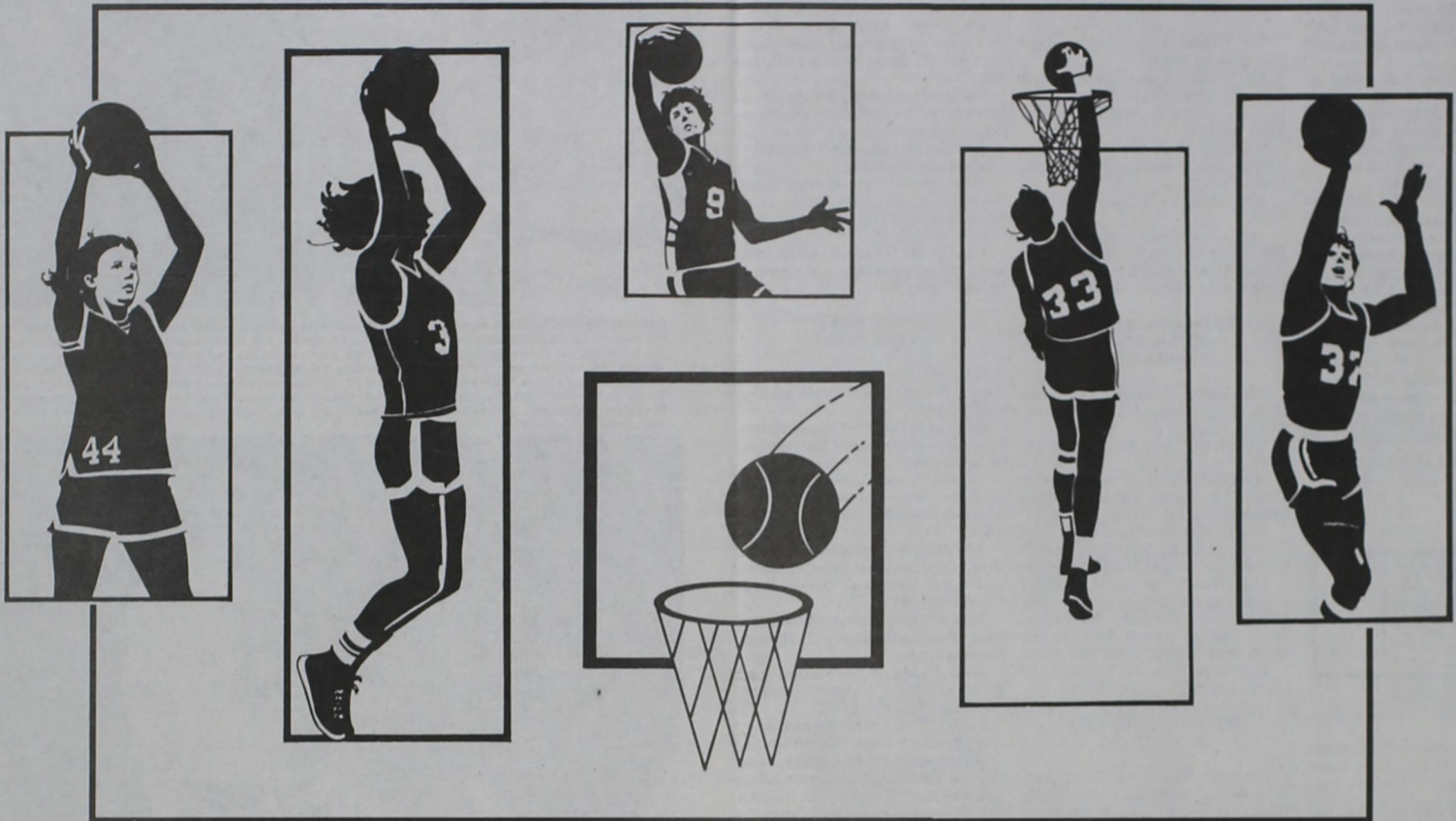
