## C. C. Haile Resigns Old Settlers Helm

Crowds Estimated At 5,000 Despite Wind, Rainstorm MEADOR IS NAMED PRESIDENT AFTER CAMPAIGN SPEECH

A tired country newspaper editor was named president of the Old Settlers association at Roaring Springs Friday afternoon. Douglas Meador, mayor of Matador, the town in which he was born in 1901, was waiting for the election of officers to complete his notes, while Matador attorney John Hamilton was making a nominating speech.

When his name was announced at the end of the speech, the startled country newspaperman rose out of his seat electrified. He immediately protested his nomination. No one had previously suggested him as a candidate for the office. His protest was over-ruled and election was unanimous.

Mrs. M. D. Freeman of Roaring Springs was re-elected secretary-treasurer, Elbert Reeves of Matador was elected vice-president. Former board of directors, including Clark Forbis of Afton, Dempse Clifton of Afton, H. Jackson, Herman Havis and Fred Dawson of Roaring Springs were re-elected. Fred Dawson replaced John Russell of Matador on the board, who had tendered his resignation.

A business meeting of the board was held at Pioneer pavilion Saturday afternoon at 3 p. m. To name him when he was a baby, Parker was born at Dumont in 1892. Mr. and Mrs. Duff Green came to the area in 1894 and 1900 respectively. Mrs. Green was a teacher at Flag Springs, and she came to Motley county from Throckmorton in a two-wheel cart, she recalled.

## Lewis Eudy Burned When Overflowing Tank Starts Fire

Lewis Eudy, 36, Turkey wholesale Phillips agent and former Matador oil dealer, barely escaped with his life Sunday in a gasoline storage plant fire immediately north of the Flomot school building. Eudy is in Stanley Clinic hospital suffering first degree burns about his face and body. Physicians say he is improving rapidly and will soon recover.

Large gasoline transport truck, 5,000 gallons of gasoline, 3,900 gallons of kerosene and storage facilities were lost in the blaze which started at 11 a. m. Ronnie Eudy, 10, son of the oil dealer, who was aiding his father, escaped without injury. Eudy was unloading the 5,000-gallon transport truck when the storage tank began overflowing. In an instant the spraying gasoline had covered Eudy and the small gasoline engine used in pumping the fuel from the transport to the storage. A spark from the engine ignited the gasoline.

Escaping the flaming area between the truck and storage tanks, Eudy tore away his burning clothing and rolled in a cotton field to extinguish the fire about his body. A passing motorist rushed him to Matador.

## Big Tanks Explode

H. V. Cromer, Flomot (Phillips "66") jobber, was at church when the fire was discovered. He rushed to the scene and began looking for Eudy whom he believed to be somewhere in the burning area. He said he could have driven the empty transport away from the fire when he first reached it, but continued his search for Eudy.

The storage tanks were full and heating rapidly. Soon they exploded while the intense heat scorched everything in a wide area. Electric power lines 300 feet away were melted and the Flomot community was without power for several hours. The black smoke from the fire was seen 30 to 40 miles away. A large crowd was soon attracted to the scene and hundreds visited the burned truck and storage tanks throughout the afternoon. Fire (from gas fumes) was still burning the transport truck at sundown Sunday. Loss is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$30,000. Mr. Cromer declared that since the first of January, it has been impossible to procure fire insurance on gasoline transport trucks. The truck alone was valued about \$20,000.

## FORD TO SPONSOR CONTEST, PRIZES TOTAL \$100,000

Seven hundred prizes totaling \$100,000 will be awarded winners of a car safety contest being sponsored by the Ford division of the Ford Motor Company. Announcement was made today by Glenn L. 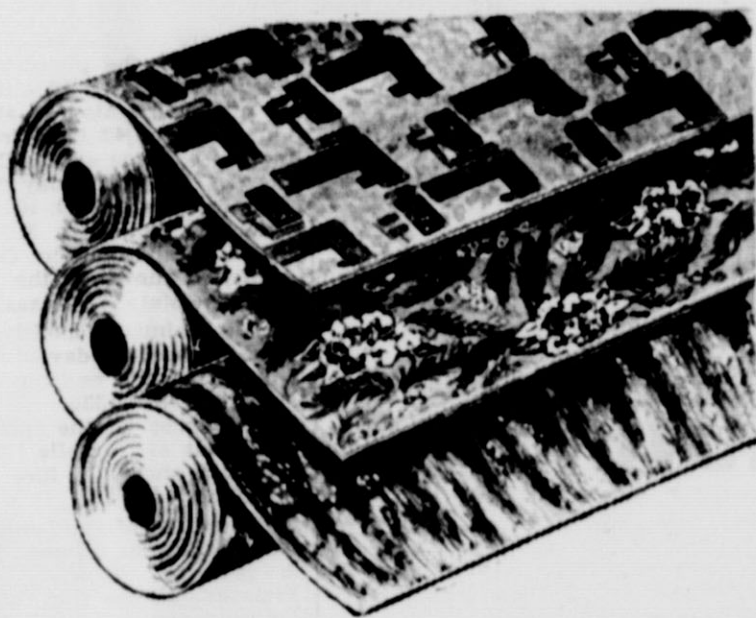

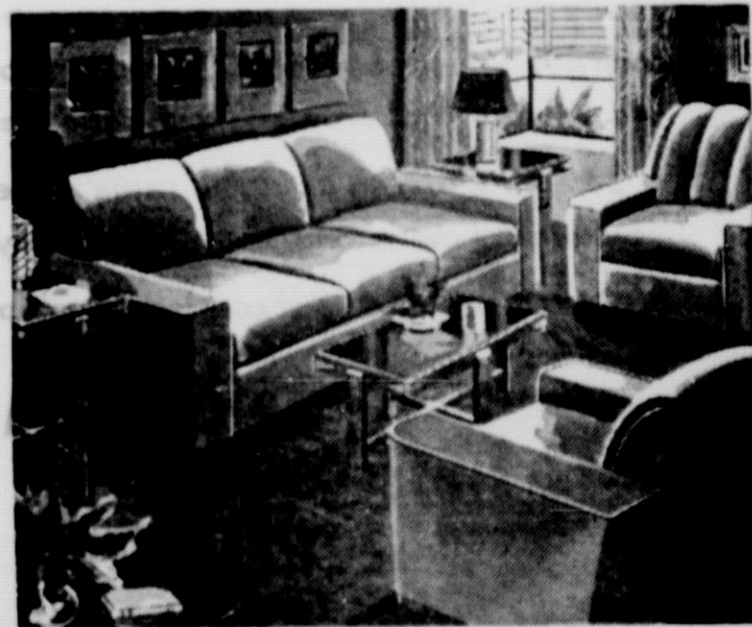

## LOOPHOLES in the Law

By WILL WILSON

District Attorney of Dallas County

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This is one of a series of short case histories taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes often enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas. Will Wilson is chairman of a special steering committee of the State Bar, which is working for revision of the antiquated Criminal Code and Code of Criminal Procedure in order to eliminate these loopholes.

Joe Doakes was charged with robbery with a pistol. A jury found him guilty, and his sentence was fixed at fifteen years in the penitentiary.

The indictment of Doakes read, in part, as follows: "That one Joe Doakes, by assault and by violence, with a firearm, robbed one John Smith of one ten-cent piece." However, when John Smith took the stand during the trial, he testified that he actually had been robbed of two nickels instead of one dime. The jury saw no difference and promptly convicted Doakes.

The case was reversed by a higher court. Its ruling was that the proof did not meet the allegation against Doakes—simply because of the difference between two five-cent pieces and one ten-cent piece. The higher court ruled that Doakes was entitled to a new trial.

The State Bar favors revision of Texas' criminal statutes in such a way as to eliminate technicalities that result in delay and additional expenditures from public funds.
