ACCIDENTS CLAIM GREATEST NUMBER OF CHILD LIVES

CHICAGO—Here's a word of warning to all Moms and Dads: Accidents are the greatest kid-killers in America!

According to the 1949 edition of the National Safety Council's statistical yearbook, "Accident Facts", accidents far out-rank any of the more generally feared childhood diseases as a cause of death among children 1 to 14 years old.

There were 10,731 accidental deaths in that age group in 1947—three times more than were claimed by pneumonia, the next most important cause of death. And accidents caused 42 times as many deaths as polio.

LOOPHOLES in the Law

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is one of a series of short case histories taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas. Will Wilson is chairman of a special investigating committee of the State Bar, which is working for re-enactment of the Code of Criminal Procedure in order to eliminate loopholes.

Joe was a small town tough, had the reputation of being mean—and when he got drunk, he was often, he was meaner than ever.

He was both drunk and mean one day at high noon. He staggered down Main street in his home town, shouting and shooting a pistol into the air. He was arrested and charged with unlawfully carrying a pistol.

The charge read, in part, as follows: "... that Joe ... on or about the 4th day of October, in the County of Harrison, the State of Texas, did then and there unlawfully, on or about his person, carry a pistol ..."

Joe was brought to trial, but then the charge was dismissed and he was released.

The reason for this action was that the word "and" should have been used instead of the word "or" in the sentence about "did then and there, on or about his person, carry a pistol." Joe couldn't be convicted of the charge because the court ruled that the charge should have read, "did then and there, on AND about his person, carry a pistol."

Technicalities like that one often defeat justice. The State Bar is working for the elimination of such technicalities by seeking to bring about revision of Texas' criminal statutes.

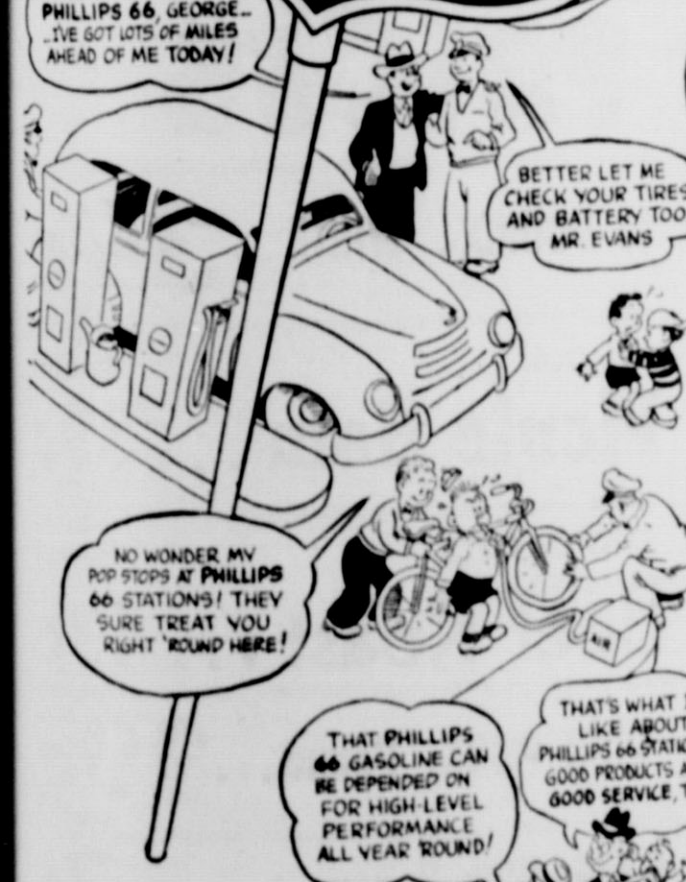
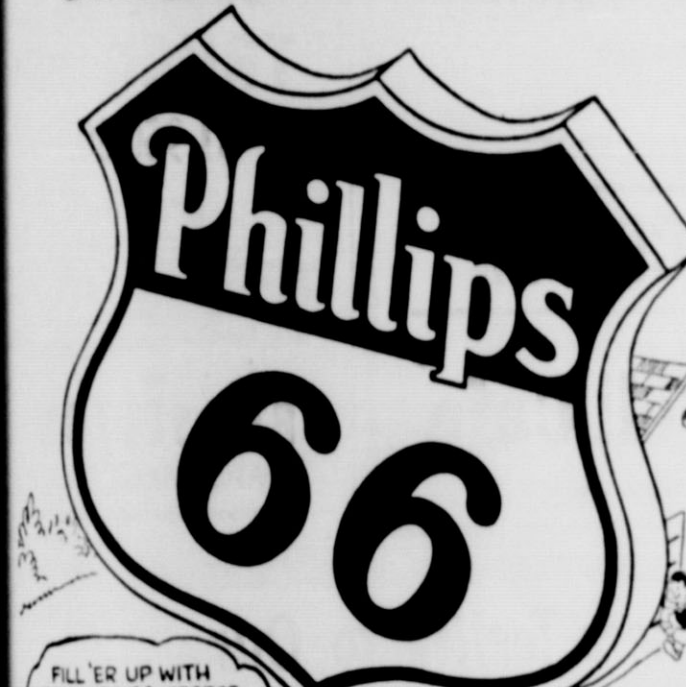

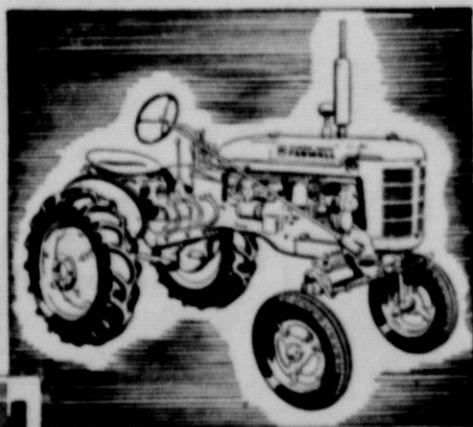

The call was issued by Ed Stewart of Abilene, Texas March of Dimes chairman, after Basil O'Conner announced a nationwide emergency fund drive over a coast-to-coast radio broadcast. O'Conner is president of

the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Stewart said the drive is necessary because of the 1949 polio epidemic.

"Proceeds of the drive will go to supplement funds of local chapters which have been exhausted in the expense incurred in care of patients of the 1949 epidemic", he explained.

Already 70 Texas chapters have been advanced \$147,000 by the national foundation, Stewart announced, and it is estimated an additional \$600,000 will be required during the rest of the year.
