Through the 15 years that the Opportunity Plan, Inc. has been in operation, forty-eight students from Muleshoe and the surrounding area have borrowed over \$75,500 from the plan.

After trying unsuccessfully for several years to help students borrow money to pay dorm fees and other college expenses, Morris decided to create a revolving loan fund. "Before there was a fund," Morris recalls, "I let them have the money myself on their signed IOU's."

He believed that there should be a place where a student could borrow the money he needed on his own signature with only his honesty, ambition, and character for collateral. That kind of fund is what he attempted to establish.

The purpose of this meeting said President of Bailey County Farmers Union Nolan Harlan, will be to discuss recent testimony before the House Cotton Subcommittee in Washington, D.C. and to hear a report from the delegates to the 66th Annual State Convention of the Texas Farmers Union held in Abilene December 4-6.

## Water, Inc. Deadline Nears for Members

Bailey County residents responded to a request by local water officials when asked to form a group of 100 members and become a part of Lubbock-based Water, Inc.

Late Friday, just prior to the Monday, December 15 deadline, nearly 100 members were signed up to become a part of the larger water organization.

Water, Inc. was formed solely to have representation in Congress for water problems on the South Plains and to work on the possibility of securing surplus water for importation to the agricultural and industrial areas where water supplies are depleting.

With 100 members in the water group, Bailey County would be eligible to elect their own director for local representation in the water organization.

### Santa's Workshop To Open

Chamber of Commerce Manager Jerry Hutton said that Santa's Workshop will open Saturday, December 13 on the courthouse square. Saturday hours will be 10-12 a.m. and 2-5 p.m. The Workshop will be open weekdays from 4-7 p.m. Santa Claus will be on hand to greet the children and hear their Christmas wishes. He will also have candy to give each of the children who visit him before Christmas.

### New Schedule To be in Effect For DL Office

Effective December 15, a change in the schedule for the drivers' license office in Bailey County Law Enforcement Center goes into effect. C.D. Fitzgerald, THP drivers license officer for Muleshoe, will be in the local office each Monday from 9-5 and on the first, third and fifth Tuesdays from 9-5 to give driver tests. Written tests and renewals can be handled by office clerk, Gladys Black, in the Muleshoe office Monday through Friday, 8-5 p.m.

### Ginning Over; Gins Report 35,864 Bales

All 18 area gins report cotton season to be over for the year. Most are in clean-up operations with some of the gins reportedly expecting from 50 to 100 more bales for the year. One gin said they expected approximately 200 more bales before they close for the year.

As of Friday, December 12, the 18 gins report a total of 35,864 bales of cotton ginned. Attributing the drastic drop in cotton production this year to the devastating hail storms in June and the two week early freeze in October, ginners without exception reported poor quality cotton this year.

### School Officials At Workshop For Retarded

Three educators from Muleshoe recently attended a workshop for junior high school teachers of the educable mentally retarded hosted by the Region XVII Education Service Center.

They included Ralph Stevenson, special programs administrator; Veta Skogland, junior high EMR teacher and Elizabeth Watson curriculum director.

Sixteen teachers from the area attended the sub-regional workshop to review current procedures and practices and to learn new concepts in pre-vocational activities for the mentally retarded. Vocational Adjustment Programs were also discussed at this meeting. These programs are limited to the high school in which the EMR student is in school half a day and leaves in the afternoon to work at a job suited to his abilities.

Specialist for the workshop was Bennie Helen Rusk, consultant for Special Education for the Lubbock Public Schools.

### Record Entries For Show Expected

County Agent J.K. Adams has issued a reminder to all 4-H, Future Farmers of America or Future Homemakers of America who plan to enter livestock in the upcoming Bailey County Junior Livestock show that Club members must own and have their animals in their care not later than December 15, 1969. Exhibitors must notify their supervisors of their show animals by that deadline date.

He also said that each exhibitor is limited to three hogs, which may be barrows, gilts or any combination of the same. Each exhibitor may also show three lambs which may be ewes or wethers or any combination of the same and two beef animals which may be steers, heifers, or any combination of the same.

Adams stated that any boy or girl who is a member of the 4-H, FFA or FHA and whose projects are supervised by the county agent or vocational agriculture teachers of Bailey County and attend school in Bailey County, is eligible to show animals in the Bailey County Junior Livestock Show. The 1970 Bailey County Junior Livestock Show will be held February 19-21 in the high school bus barn. The lambs will be judged on Thursday, February 19, at 7:30 p.m.; Berkshire Gilts will be judged beginning at 2:15 p.m. on Friday, February 20 and hogs will be judged following the Gilt show. Heifer judging will climax the show.

The Muleshoe Area United Fund has budgeted \$3,700 for prizes in the junior livestock show this year.

They noted the fact that the livestock show serves to challenge the interests and abilities of the 300 boys and girls in the county who are active in 4-H

In greased casserole place layer of spaghetti and layer of chicken, then some of each kind of soup, undiluted; Top this with layer of Parmesan cheese and continue until all ingredients are used. 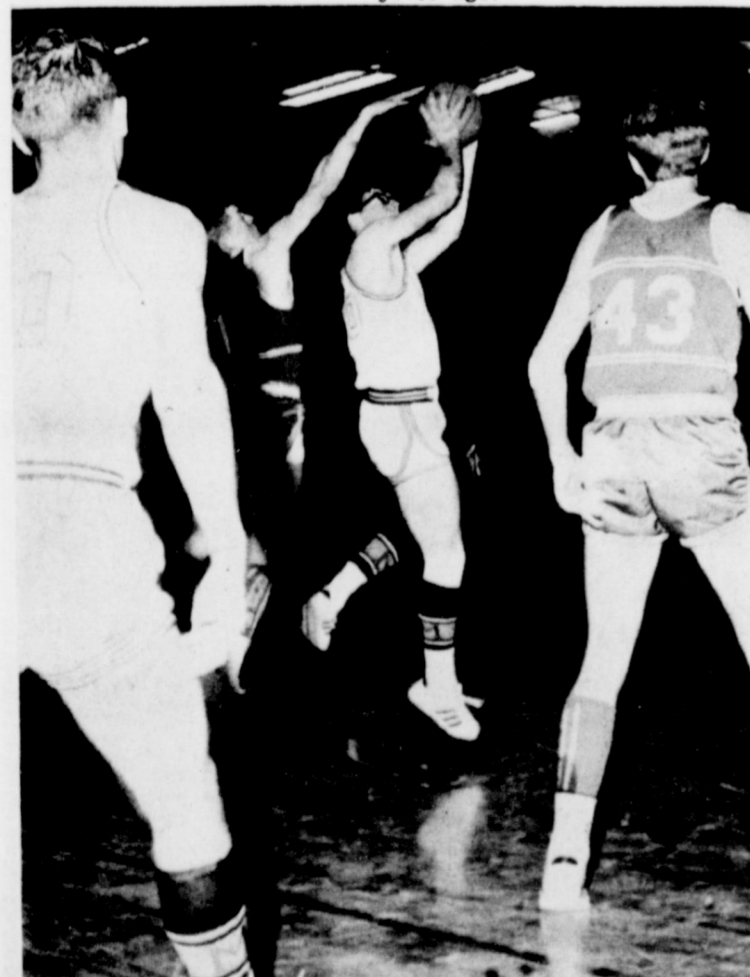

## Teacher Profile

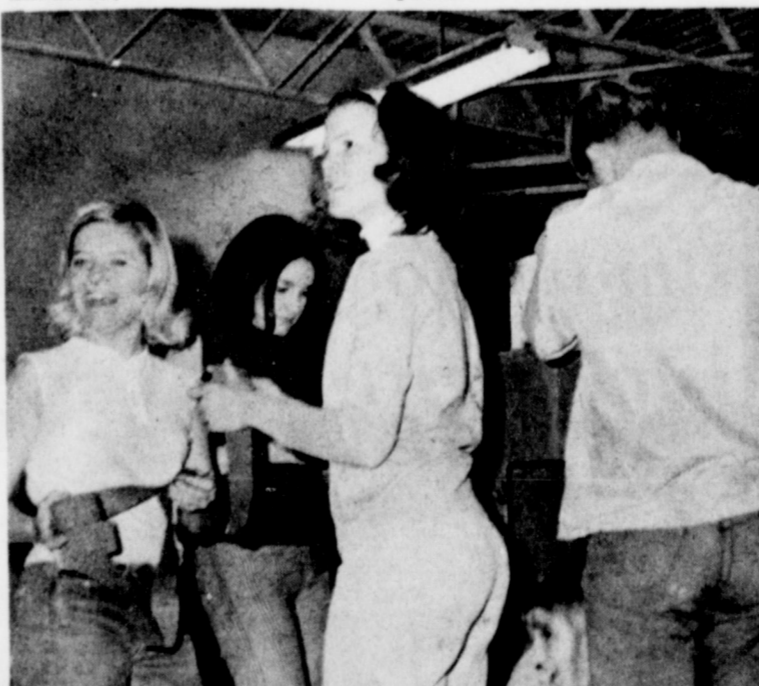

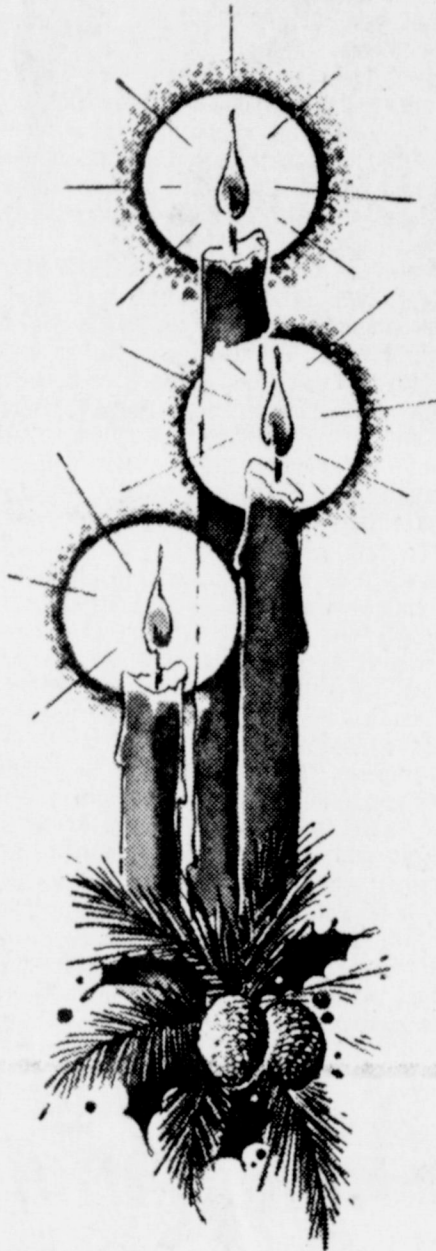
