More Farmers Protect Land than a sunset behind louds, when tired fingers the strings

Syrup-Pan Control Wins Approval Of **Motley County**

Three new "syrup-pan" systems of controlling drainage waters for use by crops have recently been added to the fast growing list of farms protected by this method. Terraces on all three farms were constructed by the county terracing machine whose activities are directed by Frank A. Buckley, county agent.

Thirty acres of pasture land will be well flooded by the next good rain if a set of substantial spreader terraces just completed on the Elbert Reeves farm east of Matador operates successfully. Drainfrom road ditches and adjoining fields and pastures is to automatically spread over native grass to cause increased

waters has been severely washing and gullying a broad strip of rich farm land. A set of large terraces has been built according to a scheme worked out by Mr. Buckley designed to tame these raging waters and to divert them to the more level parts of the hundred acre field. It is hoped that all the excess water will be used to grow crops while all washing and other damage will be completely elimin-

Latest of this type of water saving plans to be constructed is that on the M. L. Patton farm east of town operated by Albert Rushing. Following a plan outlined by Mr. Buckley, flood waters from two draws will be controlled on a 160 acre block by a "syrup-pan" system of large terraces. It is contemplated that additional water will be diverted from an adjoining field if proper arrangements can be made.
