

No canals are now to be seen in Mexico City-save one, the Viga Canal at the outskirts, but formerly it was otherwise. The whole city was criss-crossed with canals. It must be remembered that this Axtec city of Tenochtitlan was located on several islands situated in the middle of Lake Texcoco. And this unstable marshland can even be detected at the present day. Many buildings are out of plumb, many church towers are leaning in a most threatening manner. In spite of all that can be done to prevent this, the magnificant marble pile known as the National Theatre or the Palacio de Artes is sinking.

Tenochtitan was founded in the year 1325 and two hundred years more a magnificant city had replaced the mud and reed huts that were first built on the site. The Gods, themselves, if one can believe their legends, indicated these marshlands as a future site for their city. An eagle, with a serpent in its mouth, was seen here perched on a rock-this was the sign given from on high. In consequence, eagle, serpent and rock among the cacti have been incorporated in the National Seal of the Mexican Republic.



Should the Federal government carry out its announced plan to slash highway-construction appropriations as an economy measure, the job of road improvement in Texas will have to be slowed to January, A. D. 1938. a walk at a time when 6.819 miles of the state's 21,378 miles of highway remain unimproved with paved surfacing

Few items of Federal spending are able to show such definite and lasting rerults as the \$300 000,000 spent annually on better and safer raods. A job well begun, it is exiomatic, should be continued.

The most consistant characteristic of safer histhways is their greater cost. Grade-crossing eliminations, divided-lane highways clover-leaf intersections, all these have been developed in recent years to meet the demand for cafer driving facilities. But these things cost money. If the highway budget is reduced drastically in the future N will mean building fewer new highways at a lower safety stand-

Traffic acciden's studies clearly indicate that low highway standards form one of the four basic causes of the tragic motor homicide toll. To reduce, through an economy drive, the standards of construction would be a long leap away from the desired reduction in auto death figures.

Continued appropriations at this time will permit Texas to complete its lone range policy of saying roads. Important as is an conomy program at the present time, it would seem to be a poor policy to cut the budget where money saved may mean lives lost.



AUSTIN, Jan. 24-John Wood Texas Highway Commissioner, was going about his duties as usual this week after making his formal announcement for railroad commissioner at his East Texas home town, Simpson, last Sunday.

Wood, who set precedent by becoming the first highway commissioner in Texas to devote his entire time to state affairs, is seeking his first elective office after serving on the highway commission for five years.

Appointed secretary to the Governor in 1933, a short time before taking his present position, Wood is proud of the fact that he has directed the expenditure of more funds than any individual ever to sit on the commission, and the \$220,000,000 building program of the department since he has been in office has been administered without serious criticism from any quarter.

Wood, 54, rose from a farm boy in Grayson County to see a successful mercantile business established in Timpson. He clerked in stores in Greenville and Whitesboro before moving to Timpson in 1913. He came to Texas when he was 18 from Georgia.

Commissioner Wood is basing his campaign on the state control of natural resources and the theory that close cooperation is essential on so vital a state agency as the railroad commission. 


