Timeliness one's problem, Convenience classified ad to

solve it, certain matters of technique may well be borne in mind. Number one is timeliness. Ice skates do not sell well in summer. Number two is convenience. Make it easy to respond to your ad. And number three is adequate description. The more you tell, the more you sell is an ex-cellent bit of advice.

If tempted to keep the cost low by being too brief, remember that your reader knows only what the ad-vertisement says, so telling a com-piete story is one way to assure ccess. 


