THE VOTERS went to the polls Tuesday and re-elected Republican President Richard M. Nixon in what is described as a landslide. In Motley County he received 657 votes to Democrat George McGovern's 230.

Cowboys Ride Off With 48-18 Score

Preceding the Homecoming football game Friday night, Matadors' football captains, Hal Martin, Berry Bostick and David Martin intermingled with the pretty Matador High lassies and then crowned Miss Glenda Stockton football sweetheart. With a dozen red roses and a Matadors' kiss, they escorted cute and vivacious Glenda off the football field in a 1973 Pontiac car.

The Matador Matadors were unable to give the Happy Cowboys a knock-out punch Friday night at the Homecoming Game and only a minor miracle can keep them out of the 2B crown room. The Cowboys rode from the Burleson Arena with their seventh football victory by outscoring the Matadors 48-18.

First quarter, the Cowboys' fleet footed Chris Pearson, scored for Happy from the 15 yard line. Thomas Tilson re-

covered a Happy fumble and two plays later, high octaned Cleddell Campbell dashed 34 yards for a Matador T.D. The kicking try for extra point miscued. Cowboy O-field ended the quarter with a 20 yard run around left end for another Happy tally.

In second stanza, Cowboy Pearson galloped into the end zone twice for two Happy T.D.s and Hargraves booted his 4th good conversion point. The Matador line socked it to the Cowboys and end Berry Bostick scooped up a 27 yard aerial from Matadors' signal caller, Steve Stevens, but the conversion run fell short. S. Stevens leaped high and wrapped up a Happy pass, but the clock stopped at a 28-12 score.

Twirlers at Halftime Halftime entertainment was Matador Twirlers, Lou Anne Woodruff and Paula Palmeyer, performing an enjoyable and colorful routine for the Homecoming fans.

The Cowboys dominated the second half. Looney made two trips across the goal line for 12

Happy points in the third quarter and Hargraves toed the conversion points. Matadors' S. Stevens set sail again with one of his scoring passes to B. Bostick, but lacked inches for the conversion run points.

Last lap, Matadors' Jesse Hernandez smothered a loose Happy pigskin. In the closing seconds of the game, Johnny Payne managed to push through for a Happy score, but the Matadors blocked the kick. The final score was 48-18.

Coach Stan Irvine stated that he was well pleased Friday night with the Matadors good offensive action and their leather popping tight defense against Happy, a state ranked team and their full-back Chris Pearson, the South Plains scoring leader with 148 points. As he proudly pointed out, the Cowboys stayed with their A team the entire game and Matador completed 9 passes for 144 air yards while Happy completed just one 20 yard pass. The Matadors recorded 16 first downs and 316 total yardage against a bruising Cowboy defense that had three linemen over the 210 pound mark. The Matadors played a much better game than the score indicated.
