As the train steams through the shinnery sand hills east of Roaring Springs it will draw a curtain on an era of history in this section of West Texas. After approximately 25 years, Motley county will again be without railroad mail and passenger service.

The once isolated county is now served with rapid mail and passenger service which has advanc d to a point where the railroad could not continue to compete. We are trying to make arrangements to continue the express service by handling express in our freight trains. Our agents will be kept informed about this for




