## Shift To Urban Areas Is Blamed

Only 989 scholastics are registered in Motley county's 13 school districts for 1946-47, according to an enumeration recently compiled by the county school board. Registration in 1930 was 2,002. At present, the county has only 11 districts since Roaring Springs absorbed Flag Springs and Darden Canyon in 1944 and hopes to spread its tax burden thinner over a greater area by bringing the five students registered in the Bird community to Roaring Springs after the June 29 election.

Loss of more than 50% of the county's scholastics is attributed to the decided shift of population to urban areas, evident throughout the south. Mechanized farming in the south. Modern farming equipment makes it possible for one man to farm 500 acres in this area with greater ease than 100 acres was farmed 20 years ago.

The 1932 scholastic census of Motley county showed Whiteflats with 32, Fairview with 78, Flag Springs 52, Barton 58, Darden Canyon 37, Matador 398, Whiteflats 189, Flomot 212, Bird 7, Northfield 85, Folley 60, Roaring Springs 330 and Montgomery 18. For 1946-47, Whiteflats has 19, Fairview 21, Barton 18, Matador 304, Whiteflats 95, Flomot 128, Northfield 37, Roaring Springs 302 (including Flag Springs and Darden Canyon), Folley 46, Bird 5 and Montgomery 14.

Plans to revamp the Motley county school districts to a more even tax burden to all property owners, would bring Whiteflats, Barton and Fairview into the Matador district. Bird would go into the Roaring Springs district and Whiteflats, Montgomery and Folley would go into Flomot. The election will be held in affected communities throughout the county on June 29.

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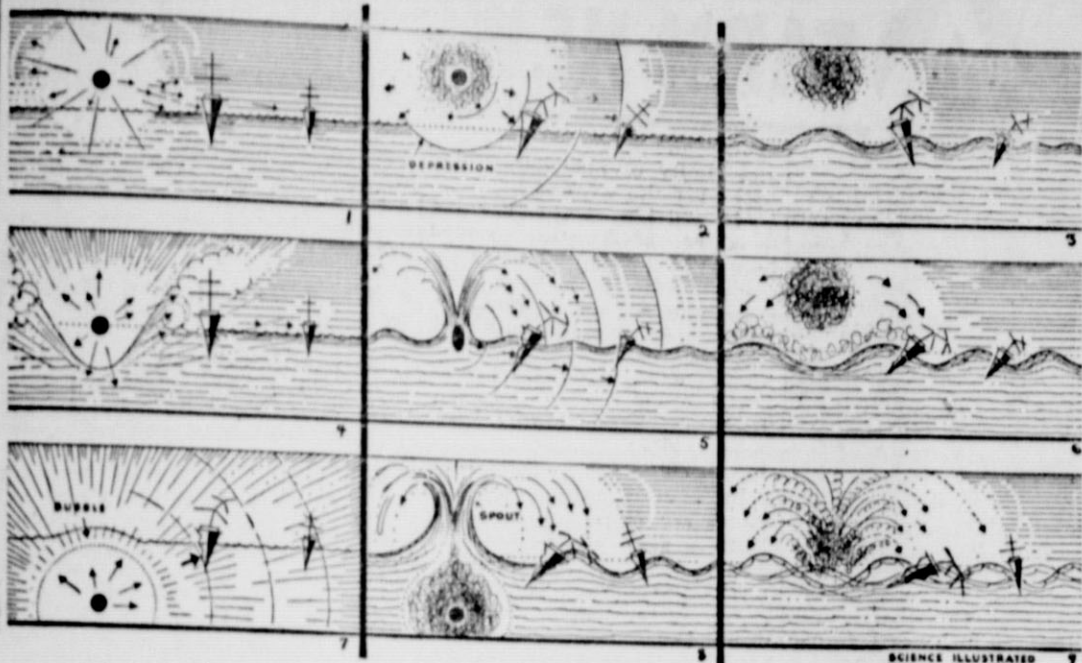
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**Preview of Atom Bomb Tests**



Shown above is an illustration of the atom bomb test scheduled to be made on naval vessels in the South Pacific as described in the April issue of Science Illustrated magazine by Dr. Hans Bethe, professor of physics at Cornell University, who worked on the development of the atom bombs that hit Hiroshima and Nagasaki. (1) Produces intense heat, gamma rays; (2) followed by terrific air pressure; (3) somewhat later, water is agitated; (4) Heat boils water, gamma rays emitted; (5) Terrible air and water pressure; (6) Gamma rays. Torrent tosses ships; (7) Intense heat and water pressure; (8) Tossing damages wrecked hull.

Livestock feeding will be included on the 1946-47 program of Motley County 4-H Clubs. The practice was discontinued during the war, but 39 club members have volunteered for this year's feeding season.

One encouragement offered for the resumption of the feeding program is an O. P. A. ruling which eliminates ceiling prices on 4-H fed livestock.

Twenty-four boys will feed calves, three will feed sheep, and 12 will feed pigs.

**Molasses Recipes Are Sugar Savers**

Molasses recipes released this week by Miss Mary Kathryn Cook, home demonstration agent, are sugar savers which will be welcomed by housewives, due to a possible sugar shortage which is anticipated. These are as follows:

**Old Fashioned Molasses Pie**  
2 c molasses; 1/2 t. soda; 1/2 c sugar; 3 eggs, slightly beaten; 1 t. butter; 1 t. vanilla; unbaked pastry shell.

Warm molasses; add soda and stir until mixture foams. Combine sugar and beaten eggs and blend into molasses. Add butter and vanilla and pour into an unbaked pastry shell. Bake in a hot oven (425) for 15 minutes.

Reduce heat to 325 and continue baking until filling is set, about 35 to 40 minutes. Note: 1 cup of broken pecans may be added if desired.

**ICE BOX COOKIES**  
1 c molasses; 3/4 c. melted shortening; 1 egg beaten; 3 c sifted flour; 1 t. salt; 1 t. cloves; 1 t. ginger; 1 t. cinnamon; 1/2 t. soda.

Combine molasses and shortening. Add egg and stir until blended. Sift together dry ingredients and add to liquid mixture. Mix well. Form into rolls and wrap in wax paper. Chill 2 to 3 hours or until firm. Slice thin and bake on greased baking sheet in moderate oven (375) 10 to 15 minutes. Yield: 4 dozen cookies.

**CUSTARD CREAM**  
1 c. milk; 1/2 c. light cream; 4 T. flour or 2 T. cornstarch; 1/2 t. salt; 1/2 c. light corn syrup; 1/4 c. honey; 2 egg yolks; 1 t. vanilla.

Scald milk and cream in top of double boiler; mix flour or cornstarch and salt. Add corn

syrup and honey and mix well. Add to scalded milk and cook 15 minutes, stirring constantly. Pour mixture over egg yolks and return to double boiler and cook 3 minutes longer. Add vanilla and cool.

Note: c — cup; t — teaspoons; T — tablespoon

**Anti-Aircraft Kites For Sale**

A surplus of maneuverable water-repellant fabric kites, originally designed for anti-aircraft training targets, are being placed on the market by the War Assets Administration, it was announced recently.

The diamond-shaped kites are five feet in height and have a span of five feet. They are controlled by twin control lines and a rudder. At recent flight trials, the kites went through many of the standard airplane acrobatics, even power-diving from altitudes of 100 feet and then pulling out within a few feet of the ground.

Though the kites are stored in various warehouses thruout the nation, orders must be placed directly to the Office of Aircraft Disposal, 425 Second Street N.W., Washington, 25, D. C.

Price of the kites are \$2.65 each, when purchased in quantities of 7,500 or more. Smaller lots sell for \$2.79 each. The minimum purchase is a crate of 10.

**Saucy Vegetable Suppers**

You can promote vegetable dinners to a new pitch of popularity by serving them with condiments and sauces that flavor-heighten their appeal. Beets can be glamour-coated by steeping in distilled white vinegar and spice. Corn, with bacon snippets added, is the better for a bit of broiling with chili sauce on top. And cauliflower takes on new character, has greater charm when a snappy hot sauce crowns its glory.

**Mustard Sauce for Cauliflower**

Combine—  
1/2 pint thick sour cream  
1 tablespoon prepared yellow mustard.  
Heat, and serve over cooked cauliflower. Yield: 1/2 cup.

**Cabbage with Ketchup Butter Sauce**

Shred or slice—  
1 head cabbage.  
Cook, uncovered, in boiling salted water 8 to 15 minutes, or just until tender. Drain thoroughly. Place in serving dish. Pour over top—  
Ketchup Butter Sauce (recipe below).  
The cooked cabbage may be placed in casserole, covered with sauce, topped with bread crumbs, then browned in oven a few minutes.

**Ketchup Butter Sauce**

Combine equal portions of—  
tomato ketchup  
butter.  
Heat, then serve over cooked vegetables. (2 tablespoons per serving).

**Hashed Browns Potatoes**

Slice thinly—  
2 large cold cooked potatoes.  
Brown in small amount of fat.

**When browned, add—**

3 tablespoons India relish  
2 tablespoons tomato ketchup.  
Season to taste with salt and pepper. (Serves 3)

More than \$30,000 worth of insurance policies and \$2,400 in stock is already pledged toward a proposed Farm Bureau life insurance organization, according to L. A. Washington, president of the Motley county bureau.

A county-wide meeting of all bureau members has been called for Wednesday evening, June 5. The meeting will be held in the District court room here at 8:30 p. m.

Vital information concerning the insurance program will be presented by Rhome Edwards of the State Farm Bureau office. W. R. Tilson, state director of District two, will also attend the meeting.

In event the company is organized charter policies (those issued before June 30) will contain special features of great advantage to the policy-holder. All Farm Bureau members and their families are requested to attend the meeting.

The charter policy will be ordinary life, endowment at 85, with special rates after five years. Special dividend will be paid on charter policy. It is declared. Policies will be minimum \$1,000 and maximum \$10,000, available only to Farm Bureau members and their families. No medical examination up to \$3,000. Age limit 65.

**Motley Gins and Cotton Win Praises**

Motley County had the best cotton classed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in 1945 at Lubbock, according to a representative of the department who last week visited County Agent Rufus Emmons.

Good ginning and an unusual uniformness, particularly in the cotton from Flomot, were the chief attractions to the samples, according to the representative.

"The farmers of Motley County should be proud of this report and should now appreciate their gins more," Emmons said.

There were 4,954 samples of cotton sent in for examination; an amount representing a saving of \$1,241 to Motley County farmers, Emmons said.

Flomot sent in 1,794 samples, Roaring Springs sent 1,644 samples, and 1,516 samples came from Matador.

Final tabulations of the tests revealed that Motley gins turned out a 97.4 per cent quota of normal preparation cotton, which is a good record in any body's league, according to Emmons. Only 2.5 per cent of the bales were reduced one grade, and 1 bale was reduced two grades.

On staples, 42.2 per cent of the total number of bales had 13/16 inch staple; 38.7 per cent had 7/8 inch staple; 10.5 per cent had 29/32 inch staple; 4.3 per cent had 15/16 inch staple; 1.6 per cent had 31/32 inch staple; 1.6 per cent had 3/4 inch staple or shorter; and 1.1 per cent had one-inch staple or longer.

**SCHOOLS GET WAR TEXTS**

Approximately 1,500,000 text-books used in Army and Navy training courses will be transferred from the War Assets Administration to the Veterans Administration who, in turn, will channel the texts to veterans through the educational institution where the veteran is enrolled, according to Hamilton Morton, W.A.A. regional director at Fort Worth.

Veterans interested in the books should keep in touch with their particular school, rather than writing to the Library of Congress or to the Veterans Administration, Morton said.

**AAA FARM NEWS**

**Learn By Doing**

"Learning to do by doing" is one of the biggest benefits of the AAA Conservation Program. Each man's farm becomes a demonstration plot and proves to him the advantages of conservation practices. Today there are more than 34 million such demonstrations under way throughout the United States and over six hundred each one adapted to the needs of the individual farm and area.

Each farmer in Motley County that is carrying out a needed conservation practice is demonstrating that there is more efficiency in conservation farming and that they can build healthy, productive land, which in turn means strong, healthy people.

The philosophy of the AAA program is sound. It makes learning possible the doing. First and Third Saturdays

At the first meeting of the Motley County Agricultural Conservation Committee the first and third Saturday of each month was set as regular meeting days of this committee—this still holds true and any producer or operator who desires to meet with the county committee for any reason under their jurisdiction has the privilege to do so by merely requesting or letting their desires be known.

Members of the county committee as elected by the farmers of Motley County last December are as follows: W. L. McWilliams, Whiteflat; L. A. Washington, Flomot; and Roy P. Burleson, Matador. These men are willing at all times to hear your recommendations for changes in the present program on your complaints; to approve financial assistance to carry out needed conservation practice work on your farm. They are responsible for the administration of your AAA program in your county. They are always ready to serve you in any agricultural conservation need you might have.

**Emergency Food Program**

On March 8 we received a wire from Clinton P. Anderson, Secretary of Agriculture, stating that W. L. McWilliams, chairman of the county ACP committee, had been designated as Emergency Food Program Manager and requested that he organize to carry facts of the program to all people of this county as millions of our fellow human beings in other lands face the prospect of starvation in spite of help given so far look to this country for immediate aid. "Voluntary conservation by Americans is essential," so states Secretary Anderson in his telegram.

This program is well under way in Motley County and is being successfully carried out in every respect. From report received, individual conservation of wheat, food fats and oils is

being carried out. However, if food conservation is not being practiced by you, the local committee asks you, for the sake of the starving abroad and a thinner waist line here at home, to reduce your consumption of all foods. Supplies will back up in the channels of trade and then will be available for shipment abroad.

**Why Feed Germany and Japan?**

To those who criticize feeding enemy nations who fought us and committed "immeasurable crimes" let me say this—to keep 500,000 American boys in garbison among starving women and children is unthinkable. It is impossible because, being Americans, they will share their own rations with hungry children; it is impossible because hunger brings the total destruction of all morals; it is impossible because of the danger to American boys of sweeping infectious diseases which rise from famine. During my two year period of overseas service in the Pacific I had occasion to share my ration several times with hungry children and it gave me a definite bit of satisfaction to have had the privilege to relieve hunger in this small way. For a first hand report on conditions on the other side of the world in Europe, I refer you to our local school Superintendent, Mr. Ezell. He will tell those who are skeptic that hunger, even a year ago, did stalk that country. I earnestly hope that every American will remember that an invisible guest sits with him at every meal. Hunger is a silent visitor who comes like a shadow. He brings not only suffering and sorrow but fear and terror. He is more destructive than armies; Not only in human life but in morals. Let us remember always that Civilization marches forward upon the feet of healthy children.
