Tires Are Taken In Burglary

Burglars again visited Matador sometime Sunday night or early Monday to remove six tires and a radio from the Jameson Machinery and Trucking Company office located opposite the Motley Hotel on Highway 28.

Ed Jameson, manager of the firm, said that he estimated the loss to be in the neighborhood of \$150. Entrance to the building was gained through a rear window into the shop department, making it possible to enter the parts department office through an unlocked door. Mr. Jameson said that four front-wheel tractor tires, one pick-up tire and one truck tire were stolen. He said five or six inner tubes and a radio in the office, were taken.

No arrests have been announced in connection with the burglary.

Stolen Car Found Here

A stolen 1941 model Ford car was found abandoned in Matador East Mound cemetery, late Sunday. Ownership of the car was established by Panhandle Motor Company of Childress, whose safe was burglarized of between \$300 and \$400, Saturday night.

The following excerpt is from the Childress Index: "The knockers Saturday night entered the Panhandle company building at the corner of Main and Avenue D. Ne. through a back window. They did a 'professional job' of cracking the safe, officers said and took between \$300 and \$400 in cash, leaving the checks."

"They pried open the cash register with a screw-driver, manager R. L. Ragsdale, reported."

"After looting the building, they took the car, opened the door and drove off. The car was found Sunday in a cemetery at Matador. It had Oklahoma license plates and when it was found it bore Texas license plates from Hall county."

Confesses Robberies

"Donald Paskew, an 18-year-old Houston youth who has been working at Vernon recently, was held in the Memphis jail Monday after confessing a series of burglaries and thefts in this area."

"State Highway Patrolman Joe Cantrell, to whom the youth admitted the burglaries, said the youth quit his job at Vernon recently and left in a stolen car, then returned to Vernon about two weeks ago, burglarized four places there, entered two firms at Quanah then came to Childress and broke into the West Texas Utilities company plant office, the J&J Eat Shop, the Phillips service station and Byrd's grocery, all in one night, taking several dollars in cash."

"He then went toward Memphis where he stole a saddle from a horse and sold it in Memphis. Officers there learned that the saddle was stolen and called sheriff Guy Wright at Clarendon, who arrested the youth. He was returned to Memphis and finally admitted the burglaries."

"Charges are expected to be filed against him within the next few days."

The stolen car was discovered in the cemetery here by Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Westmoreland, who noticed that tracks indicated the vehicle had been driven inside the burial grounds previous to the

He received training at Lubbock, San Marcos, Amarillo, Las Vegas, Nevada and completed at Dalhart on April 7th. His parents received a letter from England, informing them of his landing there on April 11th. Mr. and Mrs. Swim received official notice that their son had been taken prisoner by the Germans, in a communication from the War Department dated June 6.

Northfield To Conduct Rally Friday Night

Motley county's 5th War Bond drive is sagging slightly below its quota of \$175,000, it was disclosed here late yesterday. It is estimated that sales of approximately \$10,000 are needed to reach the quota.

The attitude of the average Motley county citizen, however, is one of feverish zeal to purchase every dime's worth of securities possible. Few families have escaped having a son, husband or brother on some battle front and to these, the urgency of buying bonds is already known.

Credit for a portion of the sagging interest in bond sales is traced directly to crop conditions. Some areas have lost all row crops through heavy rainfall and the necessity of re-planting immediately has required day and night work in the fields.

Northfield community, suffering severe damage to crops, is holding a bond rally and pie-supper at the school house tomorrow night, in effort to bring up its quota. No report has been made on sales in the Folly community.

Elmer Stearns, county chairman of sales, said yesterday that the best estimates showed approximately \$10,000 still needed to bring the county up to its quota of \$175,000.

Leaders in the Flomot community declared they will bring their quota up within a few days. Stricken by crop damage in some areas, Flomot was declared slightly short of its quota.

Drinking Water Is Important Factor To Vacationist

AUSTIN—One of the most important factors contributing to the well-being of summer vacationists is a safe and healthful water supply. Contaminated water is the annual cause of much sickness and many fatalities. Water from sources not known to be safe should never be used to supply vacation needs.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, stated this week that most municipal water supplies in Texas are periodically inspected and samples submitted to the State Health Laboratory for examination. He advised that it is always best, when in doubt, to endeavor to secure water from a municipal supply.

"Families away from home on picnics, excursions, or vacation trips," Dr. Cox said, "should either ascertain that their water supply is safe or they should make it safe for human consumption. Water can be rendered safe by boiling for 15 minutes or by the addition of chlorine. A few drops of ordinary chlorine laundry bleaches can be added to a gallon of clear water and if the water is allowed to stand for 15 minutes it may be used for drinking."

If drinking water is obtained from a private well, Dr. Cox advised vacationists to look for these protective features: a well-site protected from flooding with good drainage, and a concrete platform surrounding the pump. The pump itself should be securely mounted on the platform, should have a rod that enters the top through packing and should have a turned-down spout. Contaminated water is usually found in wells with open wood platforms, pits underneath the pump, openings where the pump rod enters the pump, and in pumps that require priming to operate.

War Equipment To Be Displayed At Cowboy Reunion

STAMFORD, June 28—A gigantic display of the modern equipment of a powerful nation at war will mingle with memories of early frontier days of the West in the huge War Bond Parade which will open Stamford's two-day Texas Cowboy Reunion celebration July 3 and 4.

Some 35 vehicles, including medium tanks, light tanks, armored cars and many others vehicles of the 12th Armored Division, Camp Barkeley, commanded by Major General Carlos Brewer, will highlight the parade Monday morning, July 3, at 11 o'clock.

Thousands of Reunion visitors will be given an opportunity to see what their War Bonds buy and to realize to some degree what the enemies of such Divisions as the 12th Armored will face in actual combat.

Leading the armored array will be the 12th own 60-piece band, one of the best bands in the army. Five famous General Sherman tanks, the M-4 Mediums, weighing 33 tons each, mounted with 75 millimeter cannon, machine guns, and anti-aircraft gun, will be part of the display. These tanks, which carry a crew of five, have earned the reputation on the battlefield of being the best tanks in the world.

Other equipment will include five M-5 light tanks, a track laying vehicle; five M-7 105 millimeter self propelled cannon; armored cars, an infantry platoon traveling on halftracks, a large surgical truck, two 2-ton wreckers and a tank transport which is one of the largest vehicles of an armored division.

The United States purchased Alaska from Russia for \$7,200,000; and the Louisiana territory from France for \$15,000,000.

WARTIME WASHINGTON

NEWSLETTER BY GENE WORLEY, MEMBER OF CONGRESS FOR WEEK OF JUNE 26-30, 1944

With the Texas Panhandle facing one of the biggest small grain crops in its history, the following steps have already been taken in Washington to secure as much labor, farm machinery, and trucks as humanly possible to secure.

The National Selective Service Headquarters here in Washington has stated that the Texas Selective Board Headquarters has been urged to grant temporary deferments to agricultural workers about to be called. Washington Headquarters stated no blanket deferments should be made but that each Board should be instructed to be as lenient as possible in deferring these individuals for the harvest season.

I have urged the War Department to grant furloughs and other wise release as much Army personnel as possible. They indicated their strong desire to cooperate in every way possible compatible with war demands. The War De-
