Mary Meason is Outstanding Ex-Teacher



"Some of the incidents, however hilarious, would prove too embarrassing to the families who are still around, as well as to the individuals themseves," she said. Mary Meason will be honored at Homecoming as the "Outstanding Ex-Teacher of the Year." She was elected Homecoming Queen in 1965.

The former Mary Hamilton, Mrs. Meason began her career as a teacher, in Matador in 1933, when she was assigned the third grade. "This was my first, and also my last school. I quit teaching in 1947, when it became apparent that I would soon be teaching the children of my first pupils. I certainly didn't want to be around to teach their grandchildren."

She has a collection of photographs and other mementoes of her 14 years as teacher. Through the years she taught various grades, and advanced to homeroom teacher of the eighth grade.

She also still has a worn, white leather belt, that is limp from use. Asked if she really did use the belt, she replied in the afirmative. "How else could you discipline such youngsters as "Tootie" Meador, or Mutt Berryman, and others like them?"

Mary Meason also has memories of the difficult war years when she saw her husband off for service in World War II. Although she continued teaching, she also tended their farm. "And that's what I hated the most," she admits. She and Melvin were married November 26, 1936 and he was in service from August 1942 until discharged in Novemher of 1945. They have one son, Harold (Sparky) who is a labo-
