Commissioners Interview For County Attorney

The Motley County Commissioners Court met Monday, April 10 at 9:30 a.m. Judge Laverna Price opened the meeting. J.N. Fletcher gave the invocation. Minutes were read and bills were approved. Reports were given by the Treasurer, Tax Collector, County Agent, Library and JP collecting \$2,853.50.

The Court discussed purchasing liability insurance for the Precinct vehicles. Commissioners will list vehicles and the Judge will get bids.

Judge Price read the list of violations following the courthouse elevator inspection. Court elected for the Judge to oversee the work to be done and if she needs extra help to let the Commissioners help.

Judge Price presented the Motley County Appraisal district proposed budget for review.

Caprock Community Action asked the Judge if they would like to purchase a 1985 Dodge Van. It doesn't run, and is not in good shape. Court elected not to take it.

The Court and Sheriff Jim Meador discussed installing cellular phones in

the Sheriff Department cars. Meador explained the radio phones are not private except on the Sheriff's side. The caller or receiver side of phone conversations can be heard over scanners. The Commissioners agreed there is a need, but want to see more information and price.

Commissioner Hughes explained a road and ditch problem in Barton Community. The court agreed for Judge Price to write the landowner a letter informing them of the law concerning County right of way and authority of County concerning interference with County work.

Commissioners went in to closed session for interviews with two of the three applicants for Special Prosecutor for Motley County.

Out of closed session Motley County Sheriff and Matador Mayor Gary Lancaster discussed the night watchman delimita. The City does not want the liability of a lawman, they don't feel it's their responsibility to hire a certified lawman.

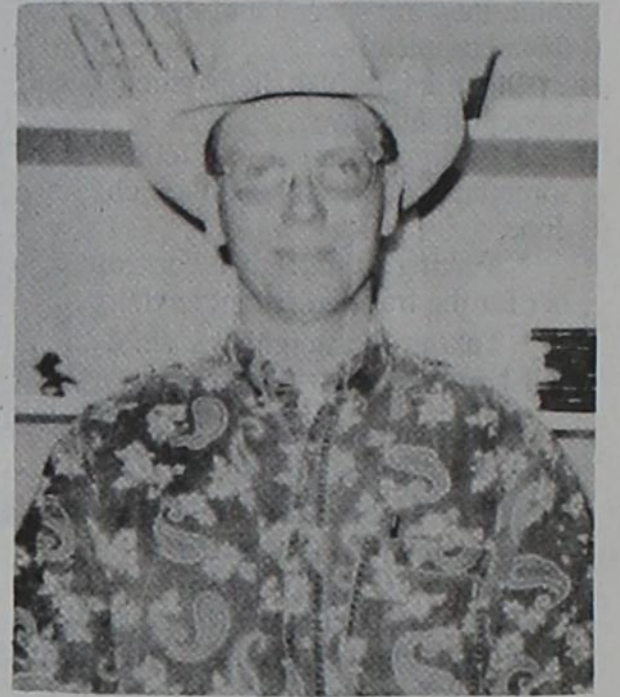
The Commissioners expressed that the County doesn't want or cannot afford another law officer.

The Mayor asked the County if they will consider a 50/50 financial support. The county said they will work with the city, but not financially until next year after their budget.

They all agreed they need to work together.

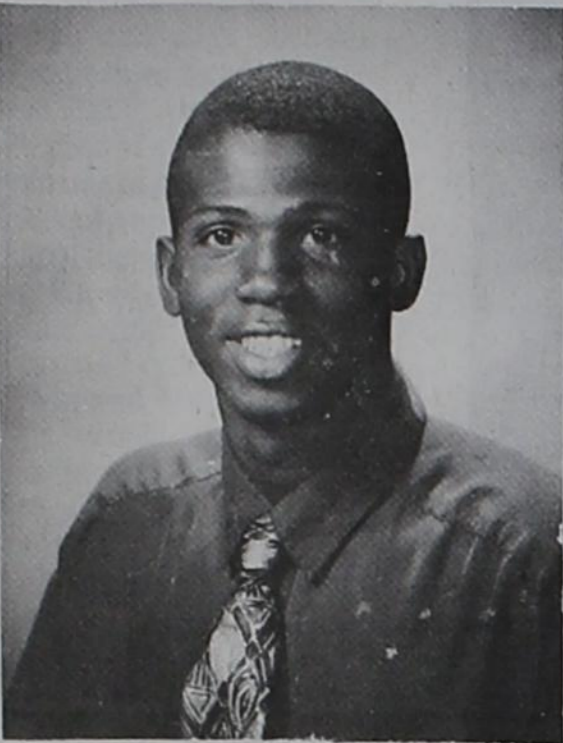
Jones and Don Martin placed 21st out of 81 teams. They were the 10th place team from Area I, and first in District.

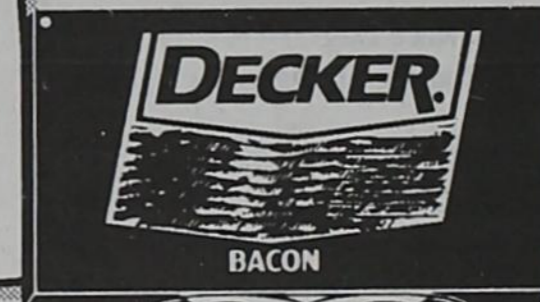

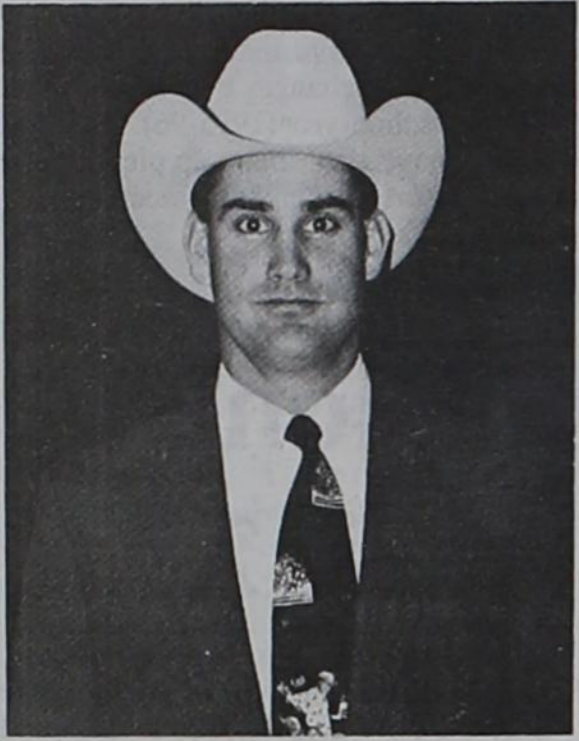

Jones County Deputy Sheriff Named TSCRA Field Inspector

Fort Worth, Texas -- Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association has appointed Scott Williamson 31, of Anson, Texas, to serve as field inspector for District 10, effective April 1, says Don C. King, TSCRA secretary-general manager.

Williamson succeeds Inspector Manfred Elliott of Seymour, Texas. Elliott is retiring after 28 years of TSCRA service.

TSCRA, a 118-year-old livestock trade organization, employs 33 field inspectors, all certified peace officers carrying Special Ranger commissions, to assist cattle producers and conduct theft investigations in Texas and Oklahoma.

Williamson will be working with TSCRA members, other cattle producers and law enforcement agencies in Motley, Cottle, Dickens, King, Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Knox, Baylor,

Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties, Texas. He also will supervise the brand inspectors who work auction markets and stockyards in the district.

"Inspector Williamson has served as market inspector for the association, working sales in the Abilene area for the past eight years," King said. "He also has served as deputy sheriff in Jones County since 1990. He is a very skilled brand inspector, cowboy and peace officer, and I know he will do a good job following Manfred in the Seymour district."

Born in Denton, Texas, Williamson attended Abilene Christian University in Abilene, where he graduated with a bachelor of science degree in range management. While at ACU, he was a member and president of the intercollegiate rodeo team, president of the range and agronomy club, the livestock and horse judging teams, Delta Tau Alpha agricultural honorary society, ACU Ag Council and the national Block and Bridle Club. He was named outstanding range student by the Society of Range Management in 1983.

His work experience includes being night foreman at Abilene Livestock Auction, a ranch manager and market inspector at Abilene, Sweetwater and Haskell in the Texas Rolling Plains area.

Dr. Frank Craddock, Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist - San Angelo, will be on hand to discuss meat goat production at the annual Meat Goat Field Day to be held Thursday, April 20, 1995. The Field Day will begin at 9:30 a.m. with Dr. Craddock visiting with Spanish goats producers in Dickens County. Dr. Craddock will then travel to Jayton at 1:00 p.m. to tour local ranches in Kent County. Following a meal, which will be served at 5:30 p.m. in Aspermont, Dr. Craddock will conduct a formal program on meat goat production. The meal and formal program will be held in the Aspermont Community Center.

During the program, Dr. Craddock will address Herd Management, Marketing Potential, and Selection of Bucks and Does. Producers can attend the entire

Field Day or selected parts. There is no cost to attend the meal and formal program.

Meat goat production has continued to increase in this area of Texas. It is estimated that there are over 4500 meat-type goats in the 5 County area, which includes Motley, Dickens, Kent, King, and Stonewall Counties. With the recent boom in the meat goat industry and increased interest in show goat production, Spanish goat production may prove to be a viable alternative to livestock producers, especially on marginal rangeland.

Social Security Tips

BABYSITTER UNDER AGE 18: NO NEED TO REPORT WAGES PAID

"Am I required to report my babysitter's earnings to Social Security and pay taxes on those earnings?" That has become a frequent question from people who call or visit the Social Security office, according to Plainview office.

The answer is "You don't need to report his or her earnings and pay Social Security taxes if the person is under age 18 unless babysitting is the person's primary occupation."

However, if your babysitter or child care provider is over age 18 and you pay him or her \$1,000 or more during the year, you'll need to report the earnings

and pay the employer portion of Social Security income tax return.

These same rules apply to anyone you hire to work in your household, whether the person provides child care, cooks, cares for your lawn or garden, or performs any other kind of household work for you.

We've seen an increase in the number of inquiries about reporting household earnings as a result of a new law that was enacted late last year to simplify the reporting requirements. Previously, people who hired household workers were required to report any household worker earnings that exceeding \$50 during a calendar quarter.

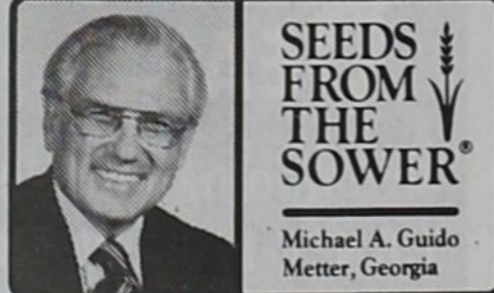

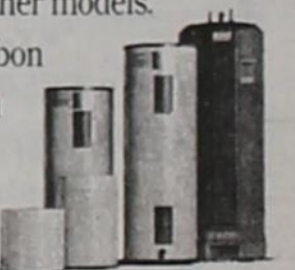
