

Farmers Active With Planting **In Full Swing**

General rainfall over the Texas Panhandle Friday afternoon relieved the threatened drought condition during the crucial planting season and improved the outook for wheat on the plains and ome areas of Motley county

The slow rain which started here Friday afternoon and continued through the night, measured a total of one inch according to the rain guages maintained by the City of Matador and George The precipitation was Springer. much heavier in some areas of the county according to reports, with omé estimates as much as two inches

The planting season is now in full swing and reports have been received that some farmers are operating tractors at night in order to destroy the rapidly growing weed crop and to get cotton and feed crops in the ground while a good season prevails.

The rain fell slowly and was not accompanied by wind nor electrical display. Continued cloudiness indicates more rain may follow within the next few days, to still furher improve the farming outlook

While the rain fell so slowly that few earth tanks received water, anchers declare the range condition is greatly improved and that grass is growing rapidly.






