Kenneth Simpson In Fatal Crash

2nd Lt. John Kenneth Simpson, 21, U. S. Marine Corps Reserve, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred G. Simpson of Roaring Springs, was killed in line of duty while on a training flight in the neighborhood of Jacksonville, Florida, about 17:15 (5:15 p. m.) Tuesday, according to a message received here yesterday morning from the commandant of the Naval Air Station.

Nature of the aircraft accident which caused the young flyer's death was not disclosed. The message was received by D. E. Pitts and delivered to Lt. Simpson's parents. Excerpts from the message are as follows: "Today about 17:15, your son, 2nd Lt. John Kenneth Simpson, while on a training flight, in line of duty, was involved in a serious aircraft accident in the vicinity of Jacksonville, Florida, which we deeply regret, proved fatal to him."

Your son chose a path in the defense of his country requiring courage, stamina and skill, from the start, which he demonstrated in no small degree. My sincerest sympathy is extended to you. Your son earned the gratitude of his country and has the right of interment in any Naval or National cemetery of your choice with full military honors.

Lt. Simpson will be buried here but funeral arrangements were incomplete late yesterday. 2nd Lt. L. W. Smelson, who was on the same flight, has been selected to accompany the body home, according to a telephone call following the telegram.

School Sales Nets Unusual Returns

Auction sale of the Darden Canyon and Flag Springs school buildings netted a total amount greater than anticipated by the newly-elected Roaring Springs Rural High School board, according to C. W. Giesecke, superintendent, who acted as auctioneer. The sale of the buildings and equipment totaled approximately \$1,500. Darden Canyon school house sold for \$525.50, with the teaching bringing \$310. The Flag Springs school house brought \$550, with the windmill and tank selling for \$75 and outhouses bringing \$35. The sale was held Wednesday afternoon, April 19th. High prices were paid for the frame buildings because of the wartime scarcity of lumber and restrictions on construction new buildings it was declared.

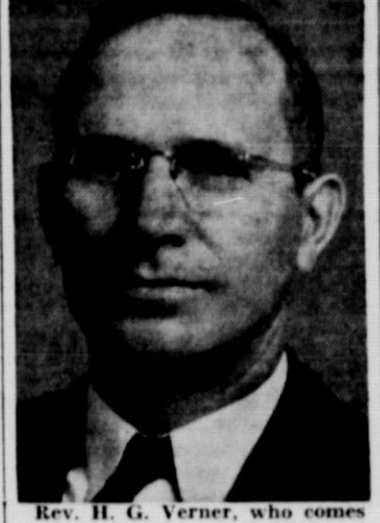

Spastic Specialist To Visit Lubbock

Much interest is being manifested in the forthcoming visit to Lubbock, some time in May, of Dr. Earl Carlson, of New York and Florida, celebrated specialist in spastic paralysis cases. Arrangements are being made by Lubbock organizations for parents having children afflicted with this strange malady, throughout this area, to consult Dr. Carlson on his visit to Lubbock. Some twenty or more cases of the disease have been reported in this area, according to Mrs. A. E. Jones of 2112 Sixteenth street, Lubbock, a leader in the fight on spastic paralysis in this section. Those interested will get in touch with Mrs. Jones for further details of Dr. Carlson's visit.

Doctor Carlson, himself born a spastic, has given his entire professional life to combatting the ailment. Spastic paralysis, while sometimes resulting from meningitis or a fall, usually results from an injury at birth. In some way too technical for attempted explanation, spastic paralysis removes the individual's control over, and coordination of, muscles and thus keeps most victims bound for life in a wheelchair or a bed.

APRIL GARDEN NOTES

(By Lois Jo Bentley, Home Demonstration Agent)

Watch out for mildew on english peas. This disease gets on english peas in warm weather causing a powdery appearance on the leaves. Later the leaves have a rusty appearance and the plants die. Dust once a week with dusting sulphur to prevent this trouble.

Green beans, squash, cucumbers, swiss chard and tomato plants

should go into the ground now. Wait until the soil has warmed thoroughly before planting butter beans, okra or setting pepper or eggplants. Be sure to wait until all cool weather is over and both days and nights are warm before planting black-eyed peas, cantaloupes and watermelons. Don't forget to inoculate green beans, butter beans, and black-eyed peas before planting in order to stimulate early growth and greater production.

Cutworms spend the winter in the soil in various degrees of maturity and begin to feed on young garden plants as soon as they are up. These pests can be satisfactorily controlled by poison bait containing 5 lbs. wheat bran and 1/4 lb. Paris green and enough water (2 to 3 quarts) to make the bait moist. This can be scattered in spots about the garden late in the afternoon for the cutworms come out at night.

Treat Your Broom With Care

Better take good care of your broom. Civilian production of brooms will be only about half the normal output this year. Rot and drought hit the broomcorn crop. Industrial brooms used in warehouses, factories and army camps will require 40 per cent of the available supply. You can make your broom last longer by keeping it in a rack. Keep it in a dry place, free from oil and grease.

Remedy For A Stopped Drain

A clogged drain may often be unstopped with potash lye. This combines with grease to make a soft form of soap—one that quickly washes down the drain when you flush the pipe with plenty of hot water. The wrong kind of lye, caustic soda for instance, will combine with the grease to form a hard cake that's difficult to dissolve. Use potash lye.




