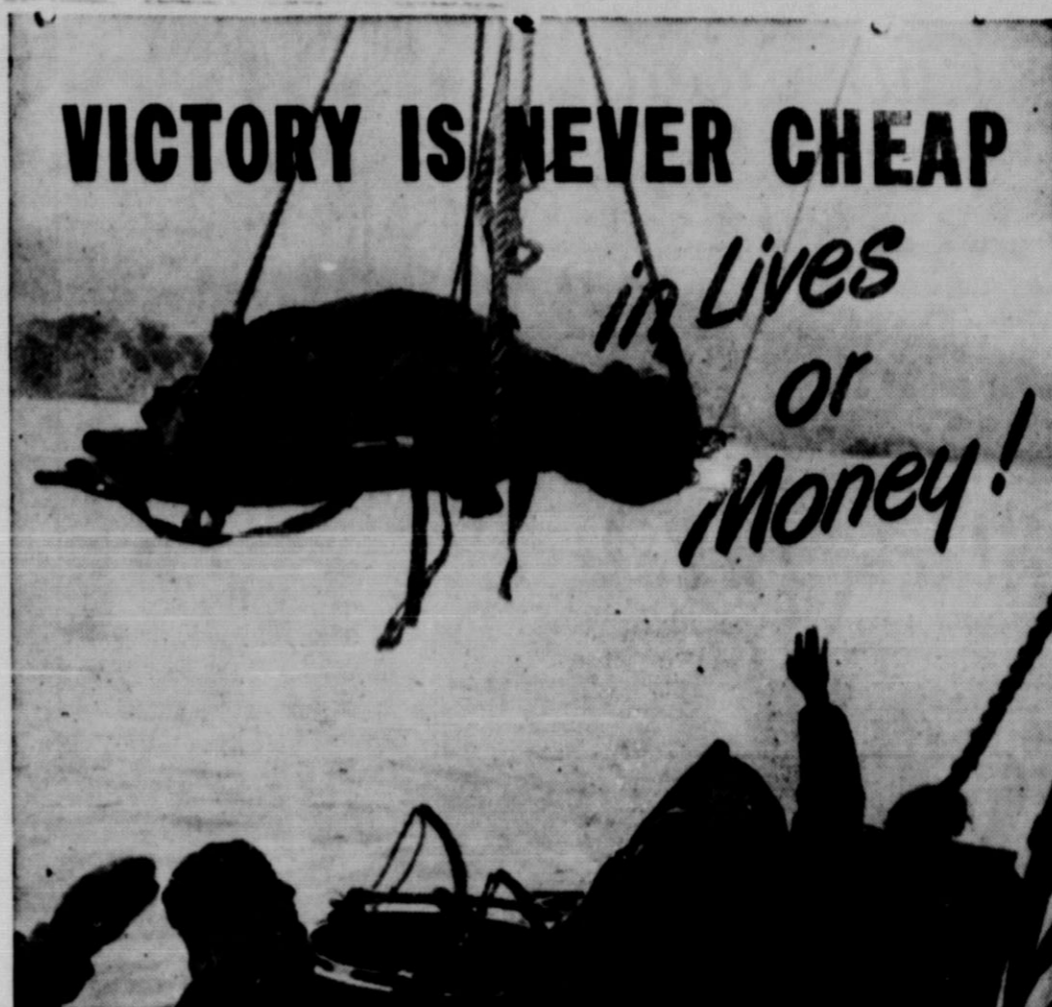

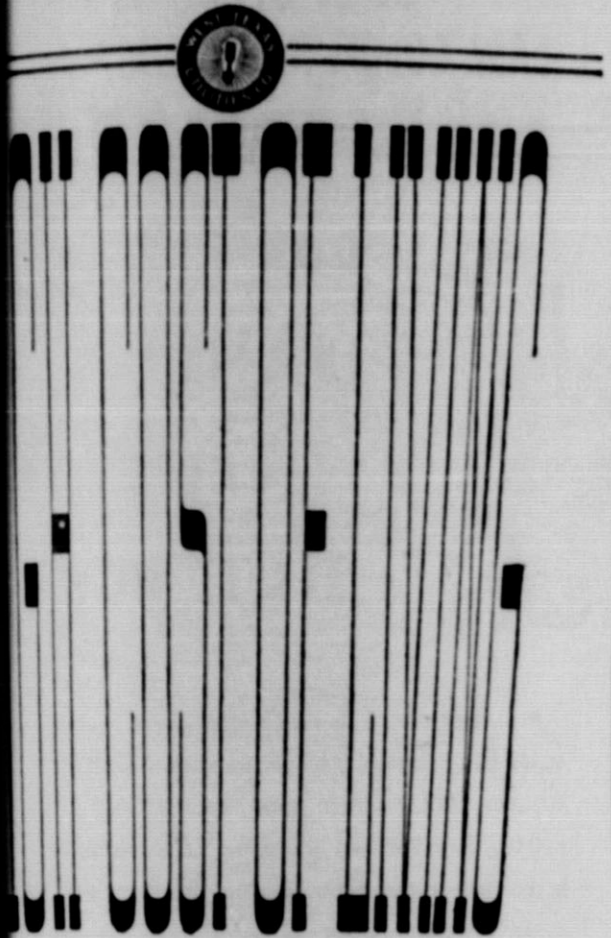

He always gets the Tribune after I am through with it, and he said to tell you and every one of Motley County that you are doing a good job at home and for the boys in the service.
