



Pfc. Woodrow Deason writes in V-Mail, from Germany, to say hat he is doing fine. Excerpts rom his letter are as follows: I've been in Germany since in October of 1944. Our Division has spearheaded since the breakthrough in France at St. Lo, so we are called the 3rd Armored Spearhead Division.

"I've been with it since it originated at Camp Polk, La., in July 1941, and our division was the first to enter Germany and the first outfit to enter Cologne on the Rhine River; as for me, I've seen ne pretty tight spots. I've been strafed by enemy planes, and shelled by their artillery and shot at by snipers. At Kassel, we were sitting on a hill when five enemy tanks came up on us, and I stood and watched our tanks knock

them out. It was quite a thrill. "Ben, there is a fellow here in my company, Curtis Brower, who is formerly of Littlefield, Texas. He always gets the Tribune after I am through with it, and he said to tell you and every one of Motley County that you are doing a good job at home and for the boys in the service. 
