SERVICE OFFICER CALLED ON TO AID MANY PROBLEMS LIONS LEARN

The Veteran's County Service Officer is often called on to solve personal problems, although his principal duties are to assist veterans and their dependents in matters of rehabilitation. Matador Lions Club learned Tuesday, when Bryan C. Handley of Paducah, Service Officer for Cottle, Motley and King counties, spoke to the group.

A recent experience which Mr. Handley had in one of his counties was that of a mother who wanted him to do something about her son, who had fallen in love with a German girl.

Work of the Veteran's Administration has been by the trial and error method, Mr. Handley pointed out, until in more recent years when it became evident that the services of one person in a designated area, to act in an advisory capacity, to returning veterans, were necessary. In this capacity, Mr. Handley aids the veterans in filling claims, and advises concerning G. I. loans, insurance and other problems of a legal nature. His office is located in the American Legion hall, and he is in Matador each Monday and Tuesday.

Following overcast skies through Monday and Tuesday, a steady drizzle again started falling yesterday shortly before noon.

Unconfirmed reports were that some hail fell in the south part of the county.

The steady rains have improved the crop and pasture conditions considerably, following the driest season in this section in several years.

Total rainfall at Matador, as registered by the City's rain gauge, is 2.20 for the month of September, as compared with 3.5 which fell during Sept. 1944.

GEORGE MAHON VISITS MANILA

Representative George H. Mahon, Democrat 19th District, Texas, member of the House Committee of War Department Appropriations, left Manila recently with fellow committee members for Chungking, China, after having completed a three day tour of military installations and activities in the Philippines.

The tour included a thorough inspection of the Manila area, a trip to Corregidor and an examination of the facilities for handling replacements and personnel recovered from Japanese internment.

Members of the committee are Congressman J. Buell Snyder, Dem. Pa., Committee chairman; Albert J. Engel, Rep. Mich.; William F. Norrell, Dem. Ark.; Joseph H. Hendricks, Dem. Fla.; Francis H. Case, Rep. S. Dak.; and Harve Tibbot, Rep. Pa.

Chairman Snyder stated, "We are on a military mission in connection with future army plans and expenditures in the Pacific area."

The committee, which has handled appropriations for the army throughout the war, will spend two days in Chungking, where they will confer with Lt. Gen. Wedemeyer, Commander of U. S. Forces in China, and Generalissimo Chiang Kai Chek. En-route to London, where a conference with Prime Minister Atlee has been arranged, they will visit Calcutta, Cairo, Moscow, Berlin, Rome, and Paris.

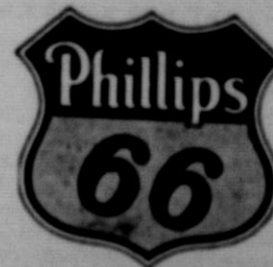
