### District Attorney Gives Vote Info

As many people have been inquiring about voting pro-cedures following the precinct boundary change as approved by Bailey County Commissioner on January 19, District Attorney Jack Young was asked for an opinion.

The district attorney commented, "As I understand it, the precincts have been redistricted.

"People in the new precincts will vote in their new precinct as the county is now divided."

A local resident, Lee Pool, met with the Bailey County Commissioners on December 8, 1969 and requested a boundary change for the four precincts in the county to con-

form with the 'one-man, one-vote' Supreme Court decision. Pool, along with D.O. Kinard and Edd Edmiston filed a suit in district court on December 30, 1969, requesting

the change to equalize the precinct voting populations. County Commissioners approved the new precinct boundary lines in a County Commissioner meeting January 19 and maps of the new boundary lines were printed in the Journal on January 22.




### Physical Education.. **A Vital Necessity**


