JOINT RESOLUTION
 An amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and distribution all net revenues derived from the taxes, except production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels, lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways, for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945, providing that one-fourth of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never receive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages allowed by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of the State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the declaration of the election to be held on November 1, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways, for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945.

AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways, for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945, providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

CITATION BY PUBLICATION THE STATE OF TEXAS TO S. N. FARMER, GREETING:

You are commanded to appear and answer the plaintiff's petition at or before 10 o'clock A. M. of the first Monday after the expiration of 42 days from the date of issuance of this Citation, the same being Monday the 19th day of August, A. D. 1946, at or before 10 o'clock A. M. before the Honorable District Court of Motley County, at the Court House in Matador, Texas.

Said Plaintiff's petition was filed on the 6th day of July, 1946.

The file number of said suit being No. 1240.

The names of the parties in said suit are: Leslie T. Garnett, and wife, Lois O. Garnett, as Plaintiffs, and S. N. Farmer, as Defendant.

The nature of said suit being substantially as follows, to wit: Alleging that on or about the 1st day of January, 1946, plaintiffs were lawfully seized and possessed of the following described land and premises, situated in Motley County, Texas, holding and claiming the same in fee simple, to-wit:

Approximately 83 acres out of the west half of survey No. 40, Abstracts Nos. 1402 and 1766, John Gibson Grant, about 1 1/2 miles east of Matador, and more fully described as follows: Beginning at a post marked c-40, set for the center of said Survey No. 40; Thence west 465.9 varas to a post marked N. W. Sub-6, for the Northwest corner of this tract; Thence South 975.5 varas to a stake in the South line of said Survey No. 40; Thence East with the south line of said Survey 40, 485.5 varas; Thence North 975.5 varas to the place of beginning.

That on the day and year last aforesaid the defendant, S. N. Farmer, unlawfully entered upon said premises and ejected the plaintiffs, and unlawfully withholds the same, and the possession thereof from the plaintiffs, to their damage in the sum of \$3,000.00.

Plaintiffs praying for judgment for the title and possession of said land and premises and for writ of restitution, and such other and further relief, general and special, at law and in equity, as they may be justly entitled to.

If this Citation is not served within 90 days after the date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

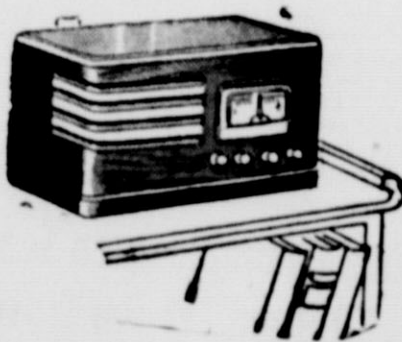

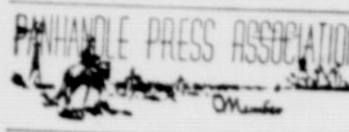

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State, limiting the amount contributed by the State to such fund; providing for investment of fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a fund for appointive officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such fund; providing for investment of fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and publication of the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person."

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or di-

rect aid from the State of Texas, unless the fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person."

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or di-

rect aid from the State of Texas, unless the fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION SYSTEM FOR THE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AND AUTHORIZING COUNTIES TO PROVIDE SUCH SYSTEM FOR THE APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE COUNTIES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS," and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION SYSTEM FOR THE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AND AUTHORIZING COUNTIES TO PROVIDE SUCH SYSTEM FOR THE APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE COUNTIES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

Farm Scrap Needed by Steel Mills



Farmers can help themselves to get steel—whether it be a new piece of farm machinery, an automobile, a keg of nails, a roll of fencing or other products—by promptly taking their accumulated scrap to the nearest scrap dealer. The committee on Iron and Steel Scrap of the American Iron and Steel Institute said today.

A grave shortage of scrap threatens to thwart the steel industry's attempts to make up the 19 million tons of steel that it has lost since V-J Day as a result of strikes and work stoppages. The scarcity of scrap is due largely to the fact that industries which usually generate scrap in large quantities have not been operating at all or operating at low levels since V-J Day.

Farms have always been a good source of scrap and during the war when drives were conducted, agricultural areas yielded large tonnage of scrap to help win the conflict.

In view of the current scrap shortage which threatens the full use of steel-making facilities, farmers are asked to take their scrap now to town and sell it to scrap dealers. If the scrap is unusually bulky, preventing its easy transportation by the farmer, the scrap dealer can be called or arrangements can be made through the local farm agent to get it to the dealer.

The steel which weeks ago should have gone through the processing and fabricating channel, is far behind schedule and, therefore, the American Iron and Steel Institute's Committee on Scrap has warned that a complete return to normal in the flow of scrap cannot occur until the supply of new steel approximates the demand.

In the ten months from August 1945 through May 1946, production of ingots and steel for castings was 22,938,000 tons lower than output over the same period of 1944-1945. Presumably, better operating conditions would have enabled at least 19,000,000 tons of that total to have been made. The 19,000,000 tons would have supplied the steel for 1,000,000 small dwellings, plus steel for 1,700,000 automobiles, plus all the bare ties made for farmers over the last nine years, plus 50,000,000 one-quart tin cans, plus every one of the 1,900,000 home-owned mentioned above—and still there would remain 7,300,000 tons of steel for other purposes, including much needed farm machinery and equipment.

The requirements for all goods, whether for the home, the farm, transportation, etc., will be fulfilled in direct proportion to the receipt by the steel mills of scrap.

Other events included races are three 10-lap stage races, a 10-lap stage race, time trials and 10-lap trophy race. Fifteen drivers from all over the southwest will compete on the one-mile track.

Wolfe and Benson will stage weekly races at the grounds commencing Saturday, July 27, and continuing to the date of the Fair.
