Death Claims Riley A. Day

MOTLEY COUNTY PIONEER and native son, Riley Alvoy Day, 70, died about 3:15 Wednesday morning in Stanley Hospital, where he had gone as a patient Tuesday morning after suffering a heart attack. He had been the victim of a heart ailment for several years. Pneumonia was also listed as a contributing cause of his death.

He had been in business here for half a century, and at the time of his death he operated Day by Day Cleaners.

Funeral services will be held at 4:00 p.m. today (Thursday) at the First Baptist Church. Officiating will be the pastor, Rev. Miller Robinson, assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister, and Minister H. L. Dennis, pastor of the Matador Church of Christ.

Burial will be in Matador East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Tose Day, Matador; one daughter, Mrs. Ware Fogerson, Silverton; one son, E. A. Day, Matador; a sister, Mrs. Bertha Garrison, Matador; two half-sisters, Mrs. Andy King and Mrs. Bob Spencer, both of Clovis, N. M.; one step-brother, Creighton Richards of Roswell, N. M. and four grandchildren.

Born at Whiteflat
Born June 1, 1894 at Whiteflat, Mr. Day had lived in the county all of his life with the exception of seven years. He was the son of early Motley County settlers, the late Mattie and E. A. Day.

He attended both the Whiteflat and Matador schools and in 1915 he went into business for himself when he established the second tailor shop in this community. His equipment consisted of an old wash tub and a 22-pound "goose-neck" iron, the type used in early cleaning establishments.

He was married at Matador, February 10, 1916 to Miss Zora Lee (Tose) Criswell, and in 1918 they moved to Wichita Falls. Returning here in 1925, Mr. Day again went into the cleaning business. During World War II he retired to his farm at Whiteflat, and upon the return of his son from service, they formed the Day by Day Cleaners.

Mr. Day was a charter member of the Matador Lions Club, and a long-time member of the First Baptist Church here. Members of the Men's Sunday School class to which he belonged have been named as honorary pall-bearers, together with Kim Wilkinson, Pat Sheridan, Randall Whitworth, Malcolm Morriss, Carl (Continued on back page)

IOOF Pays Tribute To Lodge Pioneers

Standing beneath a photographic roster of Motley County pioneers, most of whom are deceased, Joe B. Meador, former member and native son, Sunday afternoon paid tribute to the founders and early-day members of Matador IOOF Lodge and Order of Rebekahs.

"They cleared the paths ahead," he said, "they lived, worked and walked by faith."

Taking his subject from the 25th Chapter of Matthew, Meador quoted: "For I was an hungry, and ye gave me meat: I was thirsty and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger and ye took me in: Naked, and ye clothed me: I was sick and ye visited me: I was in prison and ye came unto me . . ."

Meador, who is manager of the Vernon Chamber of Commerce made the featured address at a special memorial service at the IOOF lodge hall. He was introduced by County Judge Elbert Reeves.

J. R. Whitworth served as master of ceremonies. Opening prayer was by Rev. W. B. Vaughn. Bruce Martin led a song by the audience.

W. B. Watson extended a cordial welcome to visitors from Floydada and other communities. He said the lodge was founded August 10, 1900.

Mrs. Claude (Pearl) Warren of Haskell, a former member attended the ceremony. She said she joined the Rebekah Order here 52 years ago. Mrs. C. P. Waybourn of Matador attended the ceremony and said she had been a member for 56 years.

Special music was brought by a quartet from Floydada, composed of Mr. and Mrs. Fay Hart, Mrs. Sam Green and C. M. Lyles.

The program was concluded by vocal and guitar duet by Mr. and Mrs. Donald Martin. Closing prayer was by Judge Reeves.

Following the program, refreshments of coffee and doughnuts were served in the lodge dining room.

Motley County followed the states voting pattern Saturday in renominating Rep. Joe Pool over Robert Baker for the congressman-at-large post.

Only 113 votes were polled in the county. Pool received 79 and Baker 32. Matador polled only 39 votes.

Pool defeated Baker in the neighborhood of 100,000 votes in the light 2nd primary.

On the Republican side George Bush scored a landslide over Jack Cox in the U. S. Senate primary. Bush will meet (D) Sen. Ralph Yarborough in November.

PEA ACREAGE NEARS 1,000

More than 350 acres have been planted in blackeye peas for green harvest within 50 miles of Roaring Springs, according to "Corky" Marshall, manager of Marshall Feed & Seed, sponsor of the new cash crop plan.

He said approximately 650 acres have been "pledged" or designated by owners interested in the plan which is operating in several counties south and west of here.

Holmes Green & Dry Pea Co. of Post, Tex. will pay \$1.75 per cwt for green peas in the field. The firm provides its own labor and machines for harvest. Seed peas may be obtained from the company on open account.

Mr. Marshall said some peas have been planted in the Dumont community and 15 miles north of Matador. Contracts can be made within 50 miles of Roaring Springs.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:
1964 COTTON PROGRAM
Motley County farmers face three choices in the 1964 cotton program, according to County Agent Bill Pallmeyer. The cot-

ton program is a part of the Agricultural Act of 1964 recently enacted by Congress.

A farmer can (1) plant his effective allotment; (2) plant his domestic allotment; or (3) plant his effective allotment plus up to 5% additional acreage for export purposes. Under the latter alternative, the farmer will sign up in advance at the County ASC office and request clearance to produce cotton for export.

Under all three choices, cotton produced on the effective or domestic allotment will be eligible for price support loans (based on 30 cents per lb. for middling 1" cotton). A farmer planting within his domestic allotment also will receive price support payments of 3 1/2 cents per lb. on the basis of established normal yield and cotton acreage planted for harvest.

A farmer planting his effective allotment plus additional acreage to produce cotton for export will post a bond by June 1 to assure that the export portion is sold in the export market. This part of his crop is not eligible for price support loans or assistance.

Crop damage by weather or other unavoidable hazard will not effect the 3 1/2 cents per lb. support payment for a farmer planting his domestic allotment. This payment, made on the basis of established normal yield multiplied by cotton acreage planted for harvest, will be made regardless of whether the farmer harvests his full crop.

Additional information can be obtained from the County ASC or Extension offices.

Raising pigs is traditional in 4-H. Pig clubs were the second

project for club members more than half a century ago. Reason for the pig clubs was to utilize products of the original 4-H corn clubs. Today boys and girls enrolled in the national 4-H Swine Awards Program raise pigs for other reasons. They also produce a much different animal than did their 1910 counterparts.

The 1964 meat-type hog is tailor-made for packer and consumer. Modern pig clubs have the advantage of information and practices resulting from years of experiment and research by both the Extension Service and private courses such as the program sponsor, Moorman Mfg. Co. Attention is paid to breed selection, animal nutrition and sanitation, and marketing.

Inoculation, record-keeping and showmanship are a part of the program.

The 4-H member is learning by doing, and is conditioned to accept losses along with gains. Among the gains are recognition and incentive awards given annually by Moorman. They are gold medals for four top members in the county; a trip to Chicago and the National 4-H Club Congress.

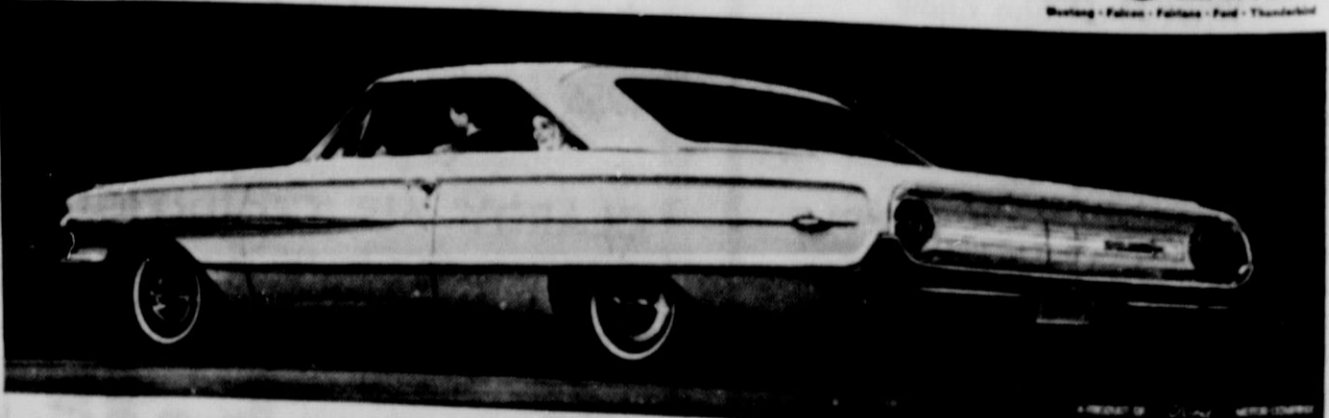

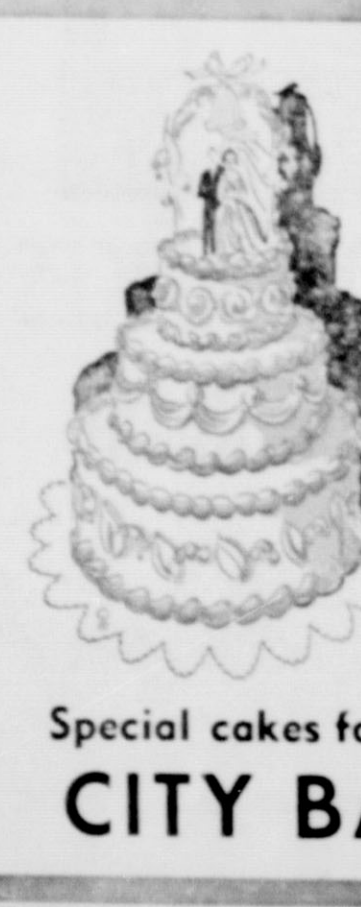
