

Big Cotton Crop Loss is Insured

Claims on File For \$440,000 As Sun Turns More Fields to Barren Wastes

PROFIT on 22,000 acres (perhaps more) of cotton in fields where a cottonsack will never be unfolded in 1946, is the pleasant experience ahead for drought-stricken Motley county farmers. Gamble of cotton-raising and West Texas weather has been reduced to its lowest terms through cotton crop insurance.

Cotton is going to 40¢ a pound and Motley county is going to make one of the shortest crops in its history, still 295 farmers have already profited on the rising market and they may continue to profit (on cotton they did not produce) for a year, if they want insurance policy. The policy claims are paid in pounds of cotton (although payment is made in cash) to be sold at anytime within one year. The farmer must pay storage if cotton is kept longer

Growth of City on Incline

Matador is growing more rapidly than at any other period in its history. New homes and business buildings have required more new water connections than at any other time since the water system was installed 18 years ago. Old-time residents say the city's growth is not equalled by any past period.

Water superintendent Herman Stanfield said yesterday that he installed eight new water connections last week and that he had installed 40 since the first of the year. The city has about 310 meters alto two and three customers are on one meter in some instances.

Mr. Stanfield said the city's water supply does not show any signs of decrease, altho the daily average for the month of July was 172,888 gallons. The city is supplied by three wells.

Many cities, Wellington, Amarillo, Hollis, Oklahoma, Floydada and others, are faced by critical water shortages or inadequate equipment to supply demands.

Five Motley Boys To Attend 4-H Meet

Five Motley County 4-H boys were scheduled to leave Thursday for the district 4-H Club camp at Wichita Falls. They will return Saturday, according to J. R. Emmons, county agent.

Adult supervisors of the group will be Emmons and Billy Joe Cooper, recently returned Navy veteran and longtime 4-H member.

Those making the trip were chosen as representatives of Motley County, and were picked on the basis of length of 4-H enrollment and achievement. They are Dewayne Martin and Bobby J. Browning of Whiteflat, and Ted Kingery, Roy Redding and Norton Dye of Roaring Springs.

Redding was chosen by state 4-H officials as the county's gold star winner for his 4-H achievements.

Site of the Perkins camp is north of Wichita Falls. The program will include talks by A&M Extension Service members, swimming and rifle matches. Twenty counties will be represented by approximately 150 boys, Emmons declared.

Farm Credit Group Plans To Pay Off Government Capital

Plans to complete payment of government capital by the end of 1947, and the building up of stronger farmer and rancher owned associations was discussed at the annual district director's conference in Amarillo on July 29 and 30, according to R. B. McMurry of Memphis, president of the Memphis Production Credit Association.

At the meeting, the group decided that each association should have approximately \$25,000 in member-owned capital and surplus for each \$100,000 in loans in order to see the members through destructive agricultural times.

The Memphis association has a \$179,000 in stock and surplus owned by farmers in Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Foard, Donley, Hall, Hardeman and Motley Counties, McMurry said.

Besides McMurry, those from the Memphis association attending the meeting were Otis Wilson, vice president, and directors S. M. Jolly of Paducah, R. O. Ross of Matador, Tom Berry of Wellington, and secretary-treasurer.

"Do Service for Others" Rev. Hollowell Tells Lions

Flomot Road Plans Being Drawn Up

Plans for the paved road to be constructed from Highway 18 west through Flomot to the Flomot county line, are being prepared.

In a letter from Texas Highway Department district engineer J. B. Neighbors of Childrens to county judge Wm. R. Cammack, under date of August 5, progress of the much needed road is disclosed.

Excerpts from the letter follow:

"...we are now preparing plans for the road east and west through Flomot. They should be completed within a few weeks. It is difficult to determine how much right-of-way will be needed until the plans are practically complete. I do not like to ask the court to buy an 80-foot right-of-way and then go back later and have to ask them for a little extra right-of-way in various places along the highway. I believe you will have time to buy the right-of-way after we get the plans ready to submit to our Austin office. It will take several weeks to get the plans approved in Austin by the Public Roads Administration office. Just as quickly as we can determine the amount of right-of-way that we will need for building the road we will send you the deeds."

"I wish to assure you that I sincerely appreciate the excellent cooperation the Highway Department has always had from you and every other citizen of Motley County."

Policy of the cafe will be maintained, Mr. Enloe declared. Regular lunches are served each day. Other items on the menu include steaks, chops, sandwiches, pies and coffee.

Motley County's Wheat Crop Fails

Twenty-two of 24 Motley County farms have received indemnity payments on wheat losses this year, Marvin Allen, AAA administrative officer has revealed.

Insuring of wheat under the government program is relatively new to the county, Allen said, and for that reason Motley farmers have not taken advantage of the set up. Among those who did not insure a wheat crop was one farmer who lost 2,000 acres of wheat.

Motley's wheat failure came at a time when the nation's wheat production hit a new high, Allen said.

"Federal Crop Insurance is strictly a non-profit venture to guarantee an income to farmers," according to Allen. "Administrative costs are paid by the government, and all premiums are reserved for payment to insured farmers when their crops are lost. Farmers may insure various portions of their normal crop returns under partial insurance features of the program."

1 cup sifted flour, 1 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup nutmeg, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon butter or margarine, 1/2 teaspoon cup hot water, 1/2 cup molasses, and 1/2 cup butter.
Mix the pie plate with set in the refrigerator. While that is chilling, mix the dry ingredients and rub butter into mixture with the back of a fork. Dissolve soda in hot water and then sprinkle crumbs in the pie shell. Add the molasses and butter. Bake in a hot oven of 450 degrees for 35 minutes, then reduce to 350 F and bake for 30 minutes.

H. J. R. No. 62 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veterans Land Board and establishing a Veterans Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read follows: "Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum. "In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Per-

poses as may be prescribed by law." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veterans Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II." Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veterans Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

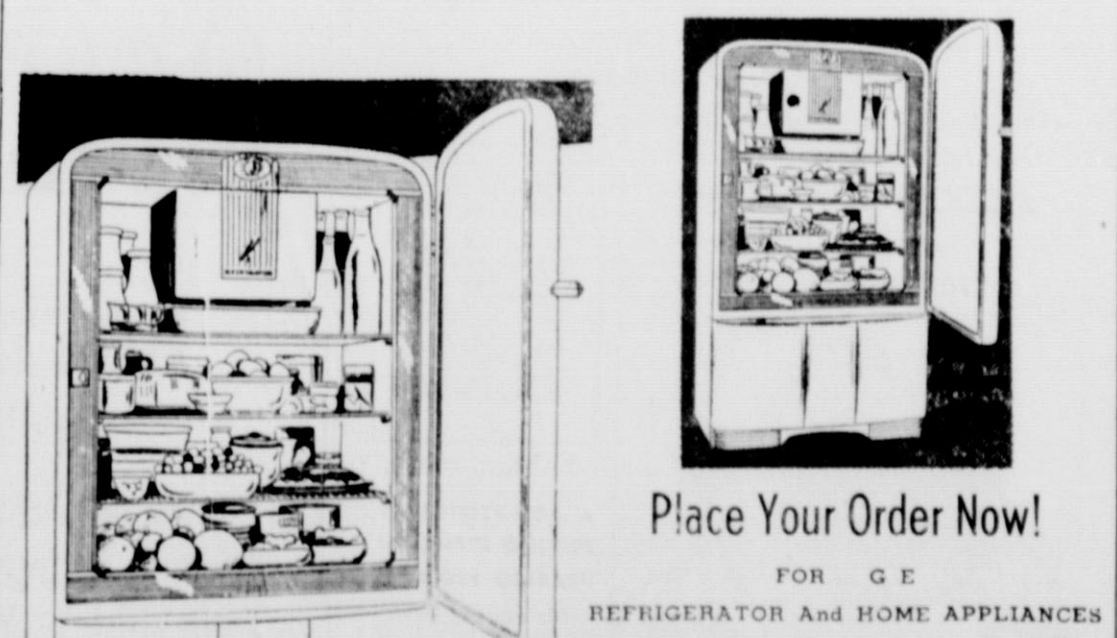

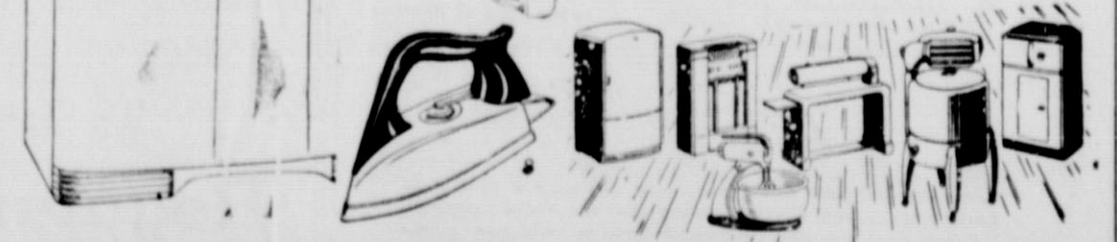
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H. J. R. No. 10 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows: 'Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person...

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946...

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come of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State...

'FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas.'

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

H. J. R. No. 49 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as 'Section 7a'; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways...

Section 7a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways...

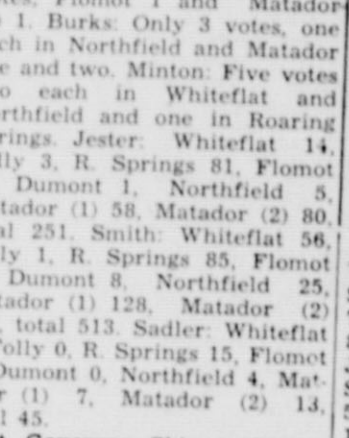

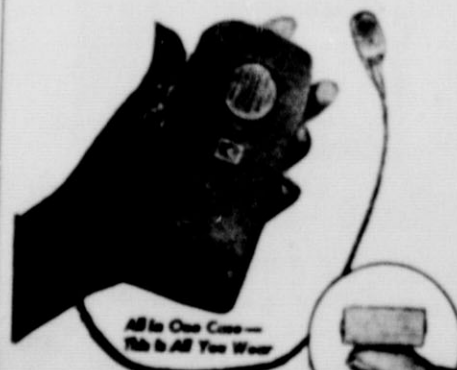

Contour Farming and Strip Cropping:
Prior approvals issued on contour farming and strip cropping expires August 15, just one week from today. Notices have been mailed to all producers to whom an approval for these practices were issued requesting that performance be reported by above date. All producers are again urged to report their performance on these practices before August 15 if payment is expected. If you have already made your report remind your neighbor to do so soon.

The 1947 AAA seed practice has been approved and we are ready to issue prior approvals and purchase orders for seeds now. Come to the AAA office before you purchase your legume seed. We will be glad to help you in any way possible. Detail information on this AAA seed practice, ryegrass practice and phosphate will appear in this column next week.

Wheat Insurance
It is time to sign contracts for 1947 wheat insurance. In fact, August 31 is the closing or last day for signing a contract on this fall sown wheat. Here are a few points we would like to stress in connection with Wheat Insurance. This is the only insurance producers can take which will insure them against all natural hazards. When crops are good, premium is not missed; when crops are poor, premiums appear "cheap". Premiums, a part of operating costs, are deductible from farmer's income tax returns. Administrative expenses are not charged in the premium; they are paid by special appropriation. Price supports are no good without crop. Federal Crop Insurance on your wheat acreage brings "peace of mind" and refreshed sleep. Motley county had 18 wheat in year and has paid 16 of these producers a partial loss or a total loss.

Remember no matter how skillfully the farmer plants and cares for his crops, weather is beyond his control, his only assurance of some return from his wheat crop is a Federal Crop Insurance contract. This office and authorized crop insurance sales agents will offer contracts for sale in this county until August 31.

Loan Rates 1946 Cotton Loan Program:
This office has just received the 1946 loan rate on cotton which has been set at 24.33 cents for middling 15/16 cotton. Since M 15/16 is the basis for making loans, prices will vary on loan papers for grade and staple of cotton from the amount stated above. For information see your committee man or come to the AAA office, we would be glad to explain the 1946 loan program to you. Also the certificate of indemnity to be received by many insured cotton producers can be used and a loan can be made on this cotton. Since these certificates are issued for M 15/16 cotton the above price will apply.
