Basketball Season Schedule Complete

Serious preparations for the coming basketball season were underway the past week by Matador High School girls and boys teams, as the schedule was completed

A full schedule has been ar-ranged and the Matador teams will play in Class B district in which they participated in football, according to school officials. They will not play Kress and Happy however, but will play Carey and Kirkland.

Both boys and girls teams will play under interscholastic league rules this year and both will play to a district championship. This is the first time for the Interscholastic League to sponsor girls basketball.

Teams making up the western half of the district are: Silverton Quitaque, Turkey, Flomot and Matador, while teams making up the eastern half are, Estelline, Lakeview, Kirkland and Carey. The two high teams in each half will meet in Matador on Feb. 9th and 10th in a district tournament to vie for the right to go to the regional meet.
