



at Meeting ABSENCE of any wrangling marked the mass meeting Monday afternoon when Motley county's Commis-sioners' Court presented a

representative group of property-owners with a need for more tax revenue. The county's position was explained by County Judge

C. W. Giesecke, jr. It was very simple. The county is attempting to operate on tax valuations and rates set up five years ago and in some instances, many years ago. Everything the county buys costs more money. There is not enough revenue to keep the

county on cash basis. "Any man who operates a farm, ranch or other business, knows that operation costs have advanced a great amount in the past five years," Judge Giesecke declared, 'and he also is aware that it is impossible for the county to buy materials and labor on the basis of five years ago. The county is in no present financial strain but we see a crisis in the near future . appears that the most practical neans of raising revenue is to raise property tax values. We estimate that we will need a 20% increase in valuation of real property (raise will probably include only real estate)." In the group of approximately 20 property-owners representing most of the communities, there was not a single objection to the proposed 20% valuation raise.

In a meeting of the Commissioners' Court following the mass meeting in the District Court room, members declared they would start next week a project of equalizing property in the county before adding the proposed 20% valuation advance.

Judge Giesecke said the present taxable valuation of the county is \$5,757,000. He said on the average property-owner's present valuation the increase would add about \$10 to his present tax bill.
