





### **Prices Pegged** On Cottonseed And Soybeans

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6-The Agriculture Department anounced Wednesday a national average price support of \$2.06 a bushel for 1950 crop soybean and price support loans of \$51 a ton on cottonseed.

This compares with \$2.11 bushel on last year's crop of soy beans, and with support loans of \$49.50 a ton on 1949 cottonseed Where the purchase program may be necessary, the depart ment said, cottonseed purchase will be made at \$47 a ton com

pared with \$46 a ton last year The 1950 soybean suppor price is based on 80 per cent of the September 1 parity price compared with 90 per cent las year. Soybean loans and pur hase agreements will be avail

ble through January 31, 1951. To be eligible for support, soy beans must grade No. 4 or better and contain not more than 14 per cent moisture, the department said.
