ALL GENERAL ELECTION RECORDS BROKEN IN DISTRICT; REPUBLICAN POWER SHOWN

AFTER FOUR ELECTIONS this year Walter Rogers of Pampa has been named by the voters of the 18th Congressional District as their Congressman. The margin was narrow in Tuesday's general election, only about 25,598 votes as over 40,000 voters went to the polls in the 28 counties. The voter turn-out broke all past records. Ben Guill, the Republican Congressman elected in the special election held in May. showed surprising strength in the "Democratic" Panhandl The race was bitter as the time before election narrowed, and during the last few days, reached the "name calling" stage.



Motley county's vote reflected the general trend over the district. A total of 587 votes were polled in seven boxes. Rogers received 87 more than his opponent (337 and 250). Guill carried only one box in the county, Roaring Springs, 69 to 51. Only one box, Dumont, voted the Democratic ticket straight. All six votes went to Rogers. North Matador voted Guill 59, Rogers 63; South Matador, Guill 69, Rogers 124; Whiteflat, Guill 17, Rogers 23; Flomot, Guill 20, Rogers 46 and Northfield, Guill 16 and Rogers 24.

Over the nation the Democrats had hard sledding but kept control of Congress and the Senate. They lost some old war horses and picked up some new racers. Organized labor received a mighty dirty signal from the voters, losing most of the races in which it pitted money and influence. Dewey was reelected as Governor of New York and will probably be a Republican presidential candidate in 1952.
