"The same policies of the firm will be continued without interruption," Mr. Rattan declared, "and we will strive to improve our service in every possible way. We will appreciate the continued patronage of our regular customers and welcome the opportunity to serve new customers."

No change in the present operation personnel of the firm will be made, Mr. Rattan declared.

## DEATH CLAIMS GLENN DOBKINS

Glenn Dobkins, 44, longtime South Plains resident, died at 10 a. m. Saturday of a heart attack at his home, 2706 Thirtieth street, in Lubbock. Untimely death of the well-known and highly esteemed young businessman came as a shock to friends in this and adjoining communities, where he grew to manhood and was active in civic and church affairs.

Mr. Dobkins had been in business in Guatemala, Central America, for two years before moving back to Texas in March of this year. Prior to his Guatemalan venture, a punice stone plant, he had operated several farms in the South Plains area including one at Glenn, his former residence.

His sister, Miss Joyce Dobkins now owns a weaving factory in the Central American country although she is presently in Lubbock. Born at Hollis, Oklahoma, June 11, 1907, he moved with his family while still a small boy, to the community of Dobbs City, southeast of Roaring Springs and the postoffice there was later changed to Glenn, by the late Elgin Dobkins, for his son.

He was married at Roby, Texas, August 8, 1935 to Miss Wilma Thacker of Roaring Springs, and to this union were born two daughters, Glenda and Cliva. He died on November 10, 1951 at the age of 44 years, 4 months, and 29 days.

## Voting Light On 5 Amendments

Voting was extremely light Tuesday in Motley county on the five proposed state constitutional amendments, but it reflected the attitude of Texans throughout the state. The Texas Election Bureau announced yesterday that it was one of the lightest votes in years.

Only about one out of each four qualified voters in Matador went to the polls. The courthouse box polled 53 votes and the city hall box totaled 60. At Roaring Springs 49 voters exercised their privilege. White flat box turned in a report of five votes. Flomot had nine. No report has been received from Northfield or Union Corner.

Motley county voters felt like most Texans with regard to the proposed amendments. They were against all of them but the Veteran's land fund. They approved it 104 to 62 which mirrors the state average. On the other four amendments, the vote was as follows: County pensions, 37 for and 128 against; University fund, 45 for and 111 against; Rural fire prevention, 38 for and 128 against; State welfare payments, 63 for and 105 against.

Hot dogs and buns will also be served.

Many clever and entertaining numbers are being prepared this year for the amateur hour, and the various classes have selected their queens and escorts for the coronation ceremony, which will be held in the school auditorium immediately following the supper hour.

Usual side shows in the class rooms and corridors will be features of the entertainment for the evening. These will include the fun house, fortune telling booth, pie walk, horseshoe pitching, a fishing well, and other events.

Proceeds from carnival will be used to sponsor worthy school projects.

### Committee Working On Advance Gifts Has Good Response

MEETING in the basement of the Methodist church Wednesday morning a group of leaders and workers opened the 1951 fund drive for the Matador Community Chest with a "kick-off" breakfast.

The campaign to raise the 1951 budget of \$2,750 officially opens this morning and will continue through November 24, President J. N. House announced.

A special advance gifts committee has met with encouraging response in contacting various firms and individuals, Mr. House declared. The goal this year is \$250 less than the 1950 budget.

Territory embraced by the Matador Community Chest is the Matador Independent school district. This is the fourth season the Community Chest plan has been used by Matador as a method of bringing contributions under a "one-time" collection. Matador is one of the smaller communities in the entire country using the plan. The community is affiliated with the national Community Chest only in the matter of membership and advertising. All the money collected is retained for local needs, except the funds which go to the Salvation Army, USO, United Defense Fund and Cerebral Palsy foundation. The organization is operated by local citizens who serve without pay. In this year's budget (besides the above named) funds are allocated for Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and the general relief fund.

The greatest amount of the budget is set aside for the general relief fund, which means the aiding of local people who have suffered misfortune (home destroyed by fire, sickness, etc.) Each request for funds of any nature is carefully screened by a local committee before any money is advanced. Popularity of the Community Chest in Matador has grown steadily and civic leaders are optimistic as the campaign swings into operation.

Regarding the drive, President House yesterday declared, "We feel that the Community Chest is sold in Matador and the territory which it embraces. We hope the contributors will have their donations ready so as to cause as little delay as possible. The workers in this campaign are giving of their time and besides making their own contributions they are contributing to the welfare of the community."

"I personally hope that each person solicited will carefully consider making as large donation as possible, remembering that they are giving to seven causes instead of one. I also hope that they will consider that every cent will be spent for a worthy cause without the usual heavy loss to administration, characteristic of many charity organizations."

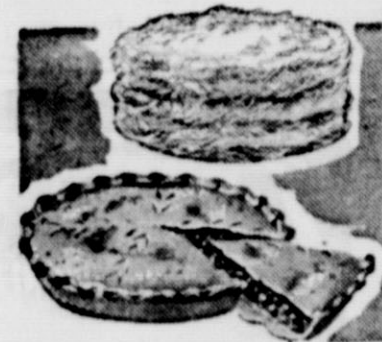
