





## UNION FAILS IN

The union failed to win elecion for agency conducted Wednesday, December 19, and Thursday, December 20, by order of the National Labor Rela tions Board, among Production Department employees of the West Texas Utilities Company.

Votes counted Thursday night in San Angelo by field represen tatives of the Board in the preence of the union and Compa observers indicate that the International Brotherhood of Elec trical Workers failed to win a certification as bargaining

Of the 152 votes cast, 45 were challenged votes. Nearly all of the votes challenged were challenged by the Labor Board and union men. Because the number of votes challenged (mainly by these men) will necesarily deter mine actual results of the election, the Labor Board field men had to refuse to certify the results of the election until such votes are given proper consider-

Lee Smith, attorney representing the Company at the election, said that in his opinion the majority of the challenged votes were votes of operators of diesel plants which the Company operates for auxiliary service in 14 towns served by the Company. Smith continued, "The Company will do everything posible to see that its employees are al-


