Politics Stirring

A slight motion in Motley county politics was evidenced this week at the beginning of a year in which voters will go to the polls in two primary and one general election. Residents of Matador and Roaring Springs will also vote in city elections.

It is going to be an active year for the voter. His approval will be sought by candidates for every office from mayor to president (the two extremes on the political ladder).

Of course national politics are already blazing away with Republican presidential candidates trying to get the voter's range and wondering how much ammunition to waste before General Ike makes a definite announcement, and if he will show up in the GOP camp.

A story is making the rounds that traveling salesmen are having cards printed, which they hand to their customers, bearing this wording: "If you don't give me a good order I will vote for him again." With the political scandal in Washington, the Democratic party faces a crisis; it is not a cross-roads but one of these clover-leaf affairs.

It is probable the voter is going to weigh the candidate more closely in 1952 than in former years. A political revival is evident. The nation needs leadership and it needs statesmen instead of politicians. The voter, too, has his responsibility to the present and to the future. He must try to spend his ballot where it will become an investment instead of a liability.

Forum To Discuss Team Work For PTA

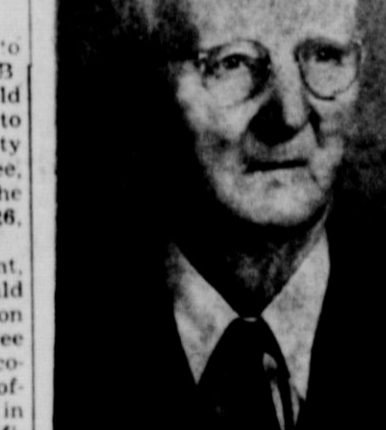

Drive Launched For Polio Funds

Polio, among the most dreaded diseases of modern civilization, has spread during the past year and the National Foundation to fight infantile paralysis, established by Franklin D. Roosevelt, is many millions of dollars in debt.

The national drive to raise funds to fight the disease, opened yesterday, and the Motley County chapter of the organization began plans for an intense campaign during the remainder of the month.

Jack Norman, manager of the West Texas Utilities Company, who waged such a successful drive last year, has accepted the responsibility again. He said yesterday that complete announcement of plans will be made at an early date (probably next week). Last year the drive raised more than \$2,700 in Motley county. "No quota has been named," Mr. Norman declared, "but the spread of polio has increased the needs of funds for treatments and I feel that the response from the generous people of Motley county will be adequate to the crisis."

A grown coon was captured in the lobby of the Matador post office New Year Eve morning. Tom Hamilton, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hamilton, whose before school chore is sweeping out the lobby, was a little sleepy shortly after 6 a. m. Monday when he started his task. It was dark outside and the light wasn't too good. It looked like a dark object scampered across the floor. The youth's drowsiness vanished. He had a coon hemmed in the lobby. His next problem was to capture it. He solved it as would his cattle-country ancestors. He roped the animal.

Woman Injured In Highway Accident

BIRTHDAY of 1952 was cold in West Texas. Rain, snow and sleet fell here during the night the infant year was delivered. Perhaps at no time in recent history has the unpredictable weather shown a greater range of temperature change.

Monday broke December heat records from Amarillo to Ft. Worth where the mercury reached 90. Light rain began falling in Matador about 2 a. m. Tuesday morning. It continued until daylight but started freezing on eaves. Later the rain changed to sleet and snow, but remained light.

Warm earth melted the sleet and snow on highways as it fell but on bridges (where the cold air could reach underneath) motorists faced an accident trap of frozen surface.

This condition on Middle Peace river bridge north of Matador caused Mrs. Herman Cartwright of the Whiteflat community to be the victim of the county's first 1952 automobile accident.

Mrs. Cartwright, who drives a school bus to Matador, was returning home about 9:30 Tuesday morning when her car (a new Nash with only 1,500 miles) skidded into the bridge banister. Mrs. Cartwright was brought to Stanley Clinic-Hospital and treated for severe lacerations on the forehead and lip, and an injured arm. Examination revealed that no bones were broken. Her new car was almost completely demolished.

HIGHWAY TRAFFIC IS BROUGHT TO STANDSTILL

Continued intermittent rain, sleet and snow throughout Wednesday had brought highway traffic to an almost complete standstill last night. With approximately half an inch of ice and sleet on the paving at ten o'clock the Texas Highway Department had posted flares and signs warning motorists of perilous travel conditions.

Amarillo radio stations were issuing warnings to travelers to stay off upper Panhandle highways except in cases of extreme emergencies. Weather station at Amarillo forecast a break in the cloudy skies today but continued cold until Friday.

Charles Robert Keith, Matador high school student and son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Keith, was injured on the school campus at noon yesterday when he slipped and fell while running to the school lunch room. His head struck a concrete curb and he was rendered unconscious. A later but unconfirmed report declared he was recovering from the fall at Traweek Hospital.

The temperature hovered at a few degrees below the freezing point here last night and added extra weight to trees, telephone and electric wiring. The icy landscape at dawn was one of unusual beauty.

Cattlemen were hard-pressed by the sudden change in the weather as they worked through most of yesterday to feed and shelter shivering livestock.

Welcomed by both stockmen and farmers was the moisture which will greatly benefit wheat pasture. City Water Superintendent Herman Stanfield said the total moisture received at 6 p. m. was 27-inch. Continued rain, sleet and snow through the night is believed to have brought the total up to approximately 35-inch or more.

Grass Fires Clip Into City's Funds

Continued outbreaks of grass fires may throw the city's budget into a tail spin. With an average of almost a call every other day during December, the Matador Volunteer Fire Department and the new fire truck got plenty of exercise, but the taxpayer's dollars were also on the move. The firemen do not want to earn their meager stipend (\$1 per man per call) by running down grass fires which may have resulted from carelessness.

Fire Chief Freddie Welling estimates it costs the city from \$15 to \$25 (including truck wear and operation) each time the department is called. Mayor Douglas Meador yesterday issued a statement on the unusual number of grass fires which the department must extinguish. He said, "We are aware that all fires are accidental, but it is apparent that some of the prevailing grass fires must be the result of carelessness. We are also aware of the extreme dry weather makes burning trash difficult but Matador needs all the funds it collects. Help the city and yourself please by being careful. Clear away a large place about your trash-burner. Wait for a still period to burn your trash. Don't leave it until all the fire is extinguished

wet down the ashes with a garden hose. Help your city save \$15 to \$40; perhaps prevent a serious fire which might get out of control.

"And another caution: When the fire alarm sounds, pull your car to the curb and wait for the fire trucks to get to the fire. Stay out of the way of firemen (some arrive by their own cars), electric servicemen and officers. A serious accident may be averted by a little caution."

Many Advancements Class Northfield As Modern School

In the rapidly changing picture of West Texas rural life there is an outstanding monument to progress, in one of the vast area's most isolated communities. The Northfield rural school is among the most modern in the Panhandle.

Northfield is a small community that nestles amid fertile farming land in a bow of the broad and sandy Pease river. It is encircled by rugged terrain that has posed an old and tough problem for the road builders but it is soon to have a modern, hard-surface road into Childress. It is situated in the extreme northeast corner of Motley County.

At present 45 students are attending Northfield rural school. The modern brick building (erected in 1935) provides facilities equal to many urban schools. Ten grades are taught with a faculty of three teachers headed by Superintendent G. F. Yeates. The school is equipped with a modern workshop. Visual aid and other modern teaching methods are employed. The school has recently refurnished and redecorated the gymnasium and built a new teachers' building.

Far removed is the small one-room school house where students at their cold lunches from tin pails. Approximately 40 hot, balanced meals are served daily from the school's modern lunch room (price is only 25¢).

The pioneer mail hack that once followed hilly wagon roads between Childress and Matador, doesn't stop at Northfield any more. Daily mail service is provided out of Childress. Northfield has met progress more than half way.

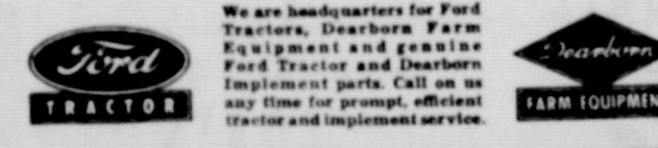
