

# Stage Set for Annual Junior Livestock Show

STAGE of livestock splendor for Saturday when the annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show is scheduled here. County Agent Ru-Emmons yesterday declared approximately 25 head of swine and 35 head of cattle will be exhibited.

Emmons said. In addition to the FFA and 4-H members, three steers are planned to exhibit. Girls who are to show calves are Waydette Martin and Mary Folley of Flomot and Jan Barton of Matador.

Awards for the steer division range from \$15 for the top calf to \$5 for the 10th place winner. Grand champion prize will be \$40 and \$25 will be paid the reserve champion winner.

Following the show the dry-lot fed calves will be shipped to Ft. Worth and boys (and girls) showing the animals will go to Ft. Worth the following week-end, and remain there while the stock is sold.

Swine division awards range from \$7.50 for first place to \$2 for the 10th place. Mr. Emmons declared there will be no grand or reserve champion swine selected. Two classes are scheduled in the swine division and possibly three, depending on the number of entries. The two divisions are for the breeding animals, which includes both sows and gilts, and barrow, or fat hog class.

Judging will begin about 1:30 p. m. Saturday afternoon. Judge of both the beef and swine divisions is W. W. Rice of the Ft. Worth Stockyards company.

Awards will be given for the best trained calf and hog. The boy showing the best trained calf will receive an additional \$10 prize and the exhibitor of the best trained animal in the swine division will receive a \$5 premium.

**First Thought Of Forming New Party**

**Dalhart Man Announces For President as 'Real Deal' Demo**

DALHART, April 26—A Dalhart businessman has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for president. He admitted his chances of winning are not good—"maybe one in a thousand."

Dan Allender, 53, civic figure in this upper Texas Panhandle county seat, described himself as a "business Real Deal Democrat" candidate.

Several months ago Allender had announced he would run for president on the Referee party ticket. He said someone was needed to referee the many squabbles in Washington.

**New Party "Impossible"**  
He admitted today he was not fully serious then. But the response—phone calls from big city newspapers, word from friends—impressed him.

"The thing snowballed," said Allender. "Sometimes when good friends have censured me for being impractical and foolish with maybe one chance in a thousand of reaching my goal, I have been tempted to quit. But, frankly, my conscience won't let me."

"The reason I am now running as a business Real Deal Democrat on the Democratic ticket is

that organization of a new political party is almost an impossibility.

**Lifelong Democrat**  
"Anyway, I'm a lifelong Democrat. I've always voted the Democratic ticket."

Allender said the presidency is "the most important job this side of heaven." He said there isn't anything wrong with the U. S. government that common sense, business judgement, rugged honesty, and attention to duty won't cure.

"Our government," he added, "is the largest business on earth. It should be handled in a business manner."

**Work Through Meets**  
Allender said he has neither time nor money to go into the state primaries still left. He said "I've decided to work with grass roots democracy, starting with the precinct conventions, going through the county and on up the state conventions, seeking delegate strength."

He said he grew up in the Kansas wheat lands as a boy, spent a year in Oklahoma and came to the Texas Panhandle in 1914.

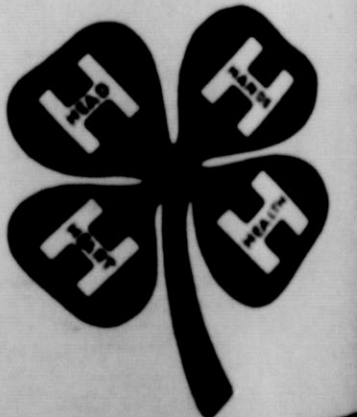

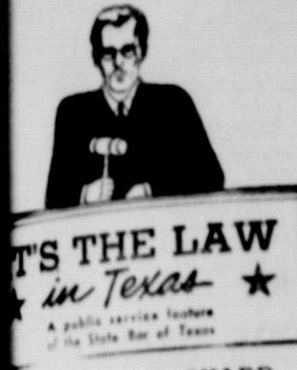

### THE LAW

**SEPARATE RECORDS GUARD WIFE'S SEPARATE PROPERTY**

Persons are generally aware we have what is known as "community property" system in this state, but many do not understand the significance of this fact. The property acquired by a husband and wife, or either of them, during their marriage is to them jointly and is held as "community property." In fact, the law presumes that all property acquired during the marriage is community property unless the contrary is proved. As included in this category is property owned by either husband or wife before marriage,

and that which is acquired by either of them after marriage by gift or inheritance. Such items are regarded rather as the separate property of the individual spouse.

May the husband and wife divide their community property so that each will thereafter own one-half of it as his or her own separate property? Until the passage of a recent constitutional amendment, such action was not permitted by our laws. Now, existing community property may be so divided under certain circumstances. However, an agreement by the husband and wife that future earnings or income will be separate property is invalid.

In contrast, it has always been possible to convert separate property into community property. This is usually done unintentionally when separate property is sold or exchanged, and the parties fail to indicate clearly that the purchase money or the new property is to be the separate property of the husband or wife.

Very often the money received from a sale of separate property is deposited in the joint bank account of the husband and wife, mixing or "co-mingling" such separate funds with the com-

munity funds. This ordinarily results in the entire amount becoming community property through the inability of husband or wife to trace the separate funds at a later date.

The distinction between separate and community property is important for many reasons, and married persons owning separate property should normally exercise care to prevent its being co-mingled with the community estate. Lawyers say that separate bank accounts and proper records will help keep matters straight.

Failure to use proper safeguards can result in an alteration of the legal order of descent at the death of a person leaving no will, since community property passes in one way and separate property in another. Or, one of the parties may lose his right to will what was once separate property to whom ever he chooses.

Other consequences include the possibility that the separate property of one spouse may become subject to the debts of the community or of the other spouse. Or, if a divorce should occur, one of the parties may lose part of his separate estate during division of the couple's various properties.

The owner will then be given a report on the condition of these features.

"The program was inspired by findings that virtually one-third of all cars on the highway are below safety standards," Mr. Campbell declared. "In many cases the owners were not aware of the defects in their cars and in a great majority only a slight adjustment was necessary to correct the fault."

"Whether or not the car owner decides to authorize repairs in our shop or elsewhere, we will at least bring deficiencies to his attention."

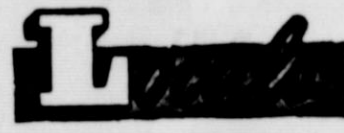

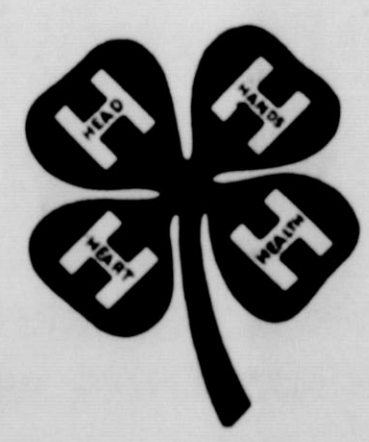

"Acceptance by the farmers of the 'Hoe Devil' has exceeded our most sanguine expectations," Mr. Braselton declared. "We were positive the implement was successful but we did not expect it to win such wide acclaim in such a short time."

The "Hoe Devil" which is a steel sled equipped with knives which cut the weeds on either side of lister furrows (two rows or four rows at a time), have five pronged wheels which rotate in each furrow. The wheels cultivate the row crop and at the same time destroy the small weeds on each side of the row. Tests have shown that 60-70 per cent or more of the weeds are destroyed in one operation.

The implement is the result of eight years' experiments in actual field operation, combined with talents and ideas of Braselton and his partner W. D. Lewis who operated a blacksmith and welding shop in Roaring Springs before becoming production manager for the Springs Manufacturing Company.
