LEGION ARRANGES SUPPER, PROGRAM

Members of the American Legion have set March 3rd to hold a supper. The Women's Auxiliary will prepare and serve food to the organization's approximately 125 members, and their families and guests. A complete program of entertainment will be arranged for all veterans who attend the meeting, the program chairman declared.

Hub Swearingen, post commander, said, "I hope all of the veterans in Motley county, whether members or not, will be able to visit us March 3." He pointed out that the local post, as in the past will continue to be a home for service men and women.

"We hope to create a spirit of friendship and meet new veteran buddies at such post functions," he stated.

EIGHT DAYS have been allotted as sufficient time in which to raise the annual Motley County American Red Cross quota, according to Fund Chairman Vance Gilbreath. The drive will open Saturday, March 1st and continue through Saturday, March 8th.

"It seems unnecessary," Mr. Gilbreath declared, "that we should require more than eight days to secure the county quota of \$1400.00. We are aware of the great work being done by the Red Cross and of the important part it is now playing on the battlefields of Korea. We all know of the relief to suffering humanity which has been advanced by the American Red Cross in instances of national disasters.

If we all have a part in the drive and make contributions according to our ability to contribute, the burden will be equally light on all of us."

Rites Held For Pioneer Officer

NEMESIS of the cattle-rustler and law-breaker, J. E. (Cap) Russell, is dead. West Texas lost one of its most outstanding pioneers Saturday night when the patriarch of peace officers in this area died at his home in Matador at the age of 79 years, two months and four days.

Services under arrangements of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home were held Monday afternoon at 3 p. m. at the Matador Methodist church. Pioneer Methodist pastor Rev. Bob Jameson conducted the service assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn and Rev. Marvin Brotherton, and a personal tribute by G. E. Hamilton.

Mr. Russell had been a member here since 1907 when he was converted during an Abe Mulky revival. He served as a steward of the church for many years and dedicated his life to the principles of Christianity. He was a charter member of the Matador Masonic Lodge and graveside Masonic ceremony was held in East Mound cemetery where interment was made.

Pioneer Sheriff
John Edward Russell was born in Blum, Hill county, Texas, December 19, 1872, the son of John J. and Sara Ann Russell. He came to Motley county with his father in 1891 and had made his home here continuously.

He started as a cowboy on the Matador ranch and was later a range wagon cook. He was employed by the ranch for 12 years.

He was married in Matador on his birthday, December 19, 1895 to Miss Ella Parille Cornett and to this union six children were born, all of whom survive.

In 1910 Mr. Russell was elected sheriff of Motley county and served six consecutive terms.

Iva Irene Knipe was born at Mangum, Okla. June 26, 1898 and died at Matador, Texas, Feb. 25, 1952, at the age of 53 years, 7 months and 29 days. Her family moved to Motley county during her youth, and she had lived in this area for 36 years. She was married to Guy Ashford, in January, 1926 at Childress, Texas, and they made their home in the Northfield community for a number of years before moving to Parnell, and later to Turkey, where they resided at the time of her death. She made a profession of faith and became a member of the Church of Christ at an early age.

Besides her husband, she is survived by two sons: R. C. Byrd, Lubbock and Dale Ashford, Turkey; one brother and three sisters: W. D. Knipe, Mrs. Lester Eickhoff and Mrs. Viola Ruff, all of Albuquerque, N. M. and Mrs. W. C. Dugan, Houston.

A jury Tuesday recommended five years suspended sentence for Raymond E. Byars, 27, of Lubbock, who was charged here with driving while intoxicated in September following a head-on automobile collision about eight miles east of town on U. S. Highway 70.

Five people, including Byars, were injured in the accident which occurred Sunday night, September 2nd. Herman Myers, 32, of Olton, his wife and two sons were seriously injured in the accident.

Mr. Myers, manager of Cashway food store in Olton, and his family were returning from a visit to Wichita Falls when the accident occurred. Byars was enroute to Vernon.

The case, which was tried in District Judge Alton B. Chapman's court, started Monday and continued into Tuesday, when the jury reached a verdict.

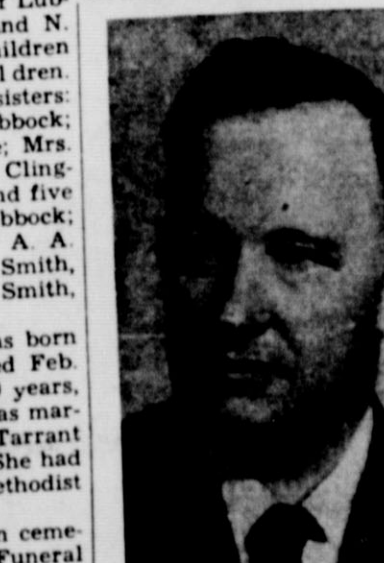

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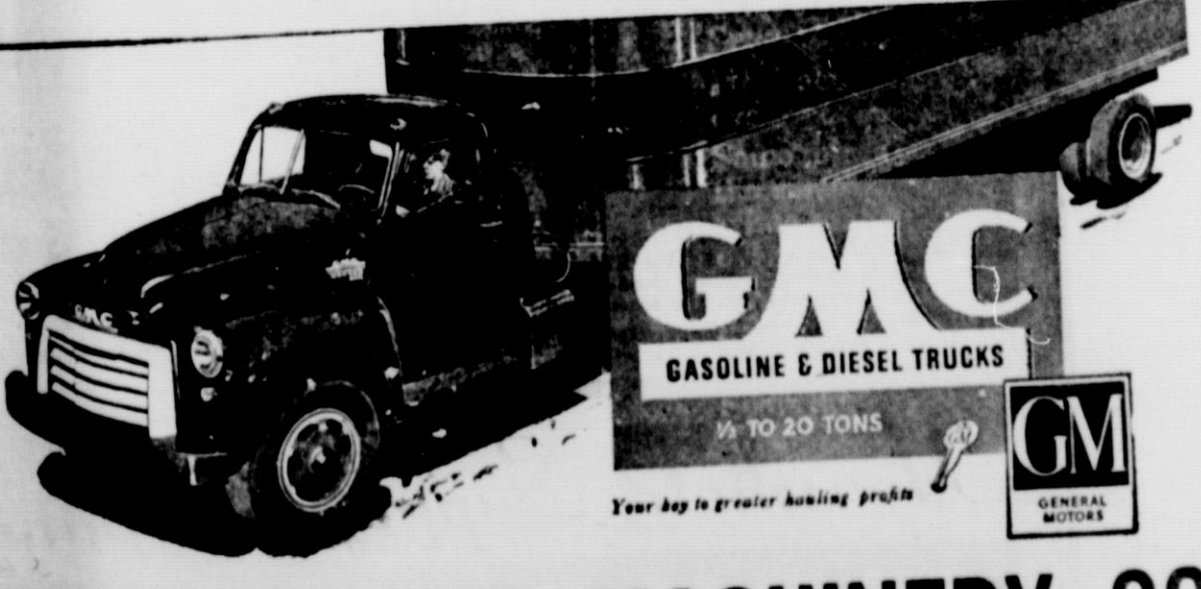

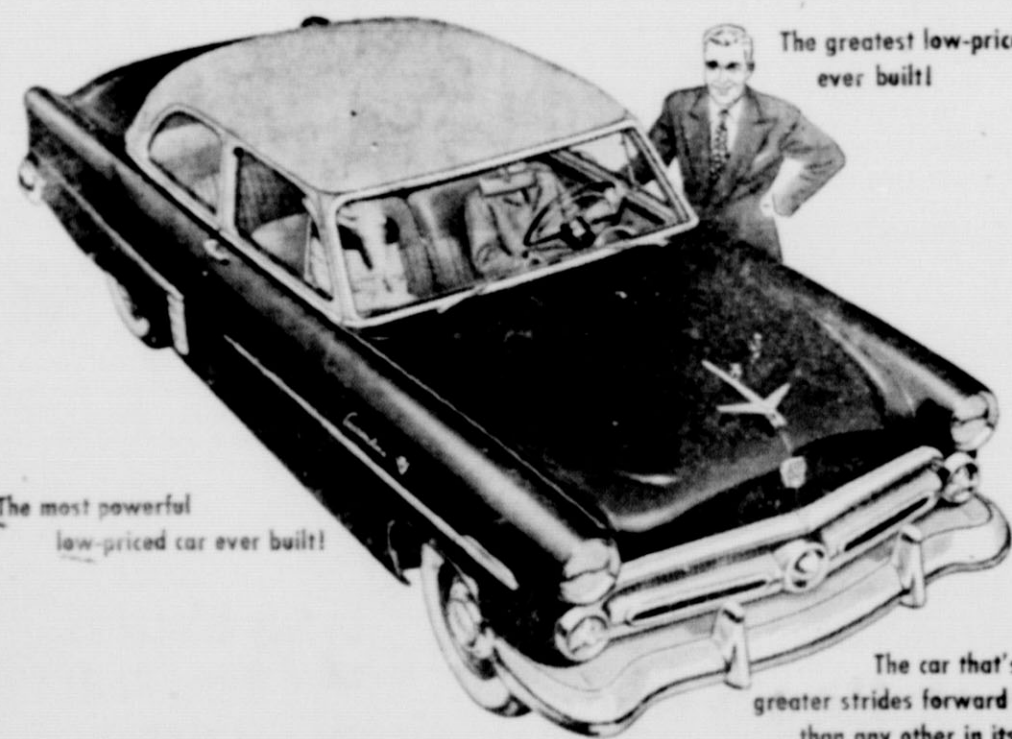

Utilities Company Wins Decision In Election Hearing

ABILENE, Feb. 23—According to a Decision and Order of the National Labor Relations Board received here yesterday, the West Texas Utilities Company has won another round in the labor election conducted among the company's production department employees last December.

The election, ordered by the NLRB's Regional Director at Ft. Worth, was for the purpose of determining whether or not the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers should be certified as bargaining agent.

Of the 152 votes cast, 45 were challenged. A majority of these votes were challenged on direction of the NLRB's Regional Director on the grounds that they represented votes of operators of diesel plants which the company operated for auxiliary service in 14 towns served by the company.

The National Board changed this by clarifying its definition of the "bargaining unit" as follows: "We will clarify the unit finding in our Decision which was intended to include in the appropriate unit all employees, however designated, who devote any part of their time to the operation or maintenance of the

Employer's diesel engines." Of the 45 votes challenged by the board, company and union, the board agreed on the challenge of only 12 votes, and ordered that 3 votes be counted without further data being required. The board then ordered that hearings be held to determine if the remaining challenged ballots of employees could be counted as diesel engine employees under the clarified definition of the unit as directed by the board.

Grass 'Planted' By Plane On 900 Acres

Turner Brothers & Campbell, former Roaring Springs farmers who now live near Kress, farm in a hurry. They "planted" 900 acres of sandy shinnery land in half a day.

The farmers used a plane to scatter 1,800 pounds of Sand Love Grass seed on the farm which they "broke out" in 1930.

They believe sand love grass the best method to hold the blowing sand and rebuild the soil. They own 1,544 acres but 644 acres is already returned to grass.

The American Dusting Company plane which was piloted by 22-year-old Dwain Pittenger of Childress, spread the grass seed through a special grass seeding device which has been used to seed about 30,000 acres in Collingsworth, Childress, Donley and Wheeler counties. Cost of plane planting is 40¢ per acre.

John Turner who has been interested in grass for a number of years, said, "It seems foolish to plant now but getting grass started is 90% luck and 10% science. We have used twice the amount of seed recommended and we may be lucky." One pound of seed per acre is recommended as sufficient. While the planting was done entirely at the owners' expense, the seeding was under the supervision of Soil Conservationist J. H. Priddy.

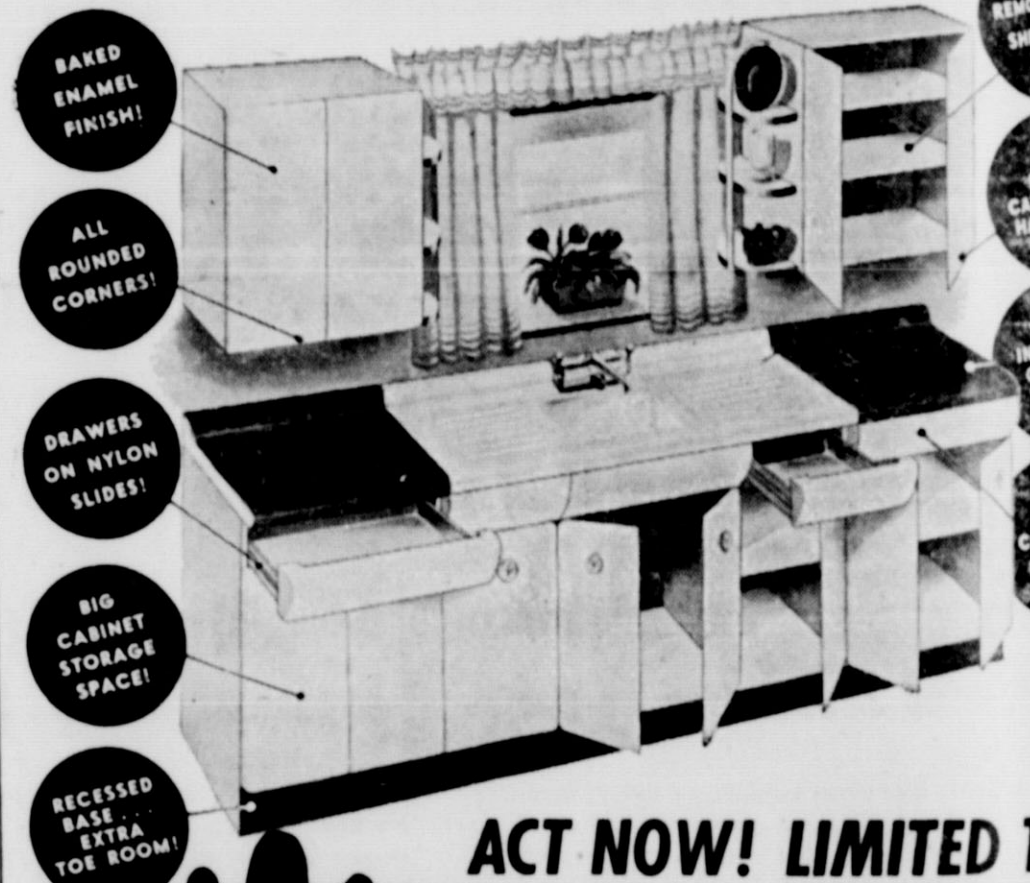
