## Daniel Asks Senate Seat Of Connally

DALLAS, Jan. 21—Price Daniel, Texas attorney general since 1947, announced his candidacy for the United States Senate here Monday night with a promise to do his part in a Washington housecleaning.

Opening his race for the seat now held and being sought again by Senator Tom Connally of Marlin, Daniel made official a bid that had been almost a certainty since Governor Shivers' renunciation of any plans to enter the race against Texas' white-haired senior senator.

And Daniel further promised that if elected he would "work for immediate reduction of present expenditures" in federal government, "work diligently toward the day when taxes can be reduced," and "work for a positive and understandable foreign policy which will not yield to or compromise with communism anywhere on the face of the globe."

Making his announcement in a radio address carried statewide by the Texas Quality and Texas State Network, Daniel described the Truman administration's foreign policy as "not worthy of our American heritage," and called for removal of Secretary of State Acheson.

**Return Engagement**

Some confusion exists regarding "free votes." Miss Rachel Patton, deputy clerk in the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector John Stotts, makes the following explanation: Those entitled to a free vote are residents of the state who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1951, or will become 21 years of age before an election (any election this year) in which they wish to vote. They must obtain an exemption (at the Sheriff's office) by January 31, 1952.

## Ginnings In Texas Up 1,000,000 Bales Over Last Season

WASHINGTON, January 23—Ginnings of the 1951 Texas cotton crop prior to Jan. 16 were more than a million bales more than the ginnings to the same date of a year earlier.

The report of the Census Bureau Wednesday showed Texas had ginned 3,949,062 running bales of its 1951 crop prior to Jan. 16—compared to 2,841,439 for the same period of the year before.

For the nation the figures were 14,508,132 bales up to Jan. 16 this year, compared to 9,688,157 ginned to the same date of 1951.

Ginnings this year included 45,823 bales of American Egyptian type compared with 54,934 a year ago and 3,648 two years ago.

## "Estimated Goal" Now \$1,100 Short

Polio victims, most of them children, would look into the future with diminishing hopes if the lagging condition of Motley county's infantile paralysis fund drive becomes general. Late yesterday only \$1,800 had been reported.

County fund chairman Jack Norman, who last year led a campaign that brought more than \$2,700 to relieve the suffering of polio victims, had set an "estimated goal" of \$3,000 (because of the three-times-larger cotton crop and general prosperity). He said yesterday that reports showed the county \$1,100 short of the estimated goal.

But many encouraging reports are being received. Flomot community has already reported more than \$500 under the leadership of Mrs. Rose Turner. Roaring Springs, under the leadership of Homer Kingery, has already reported more than was donated last year and workers are continuing their solicitations.

## Theatres Aid Drive

Rogue theatre in Matador and Spring theatre in Roaring Springs are aiding the drive with benefit shows. School children here are selling tickets to "County Fair" to be shown at the local theatre January 29-30. Students of the room which sells the most tickets have been promised a half-day holiday.

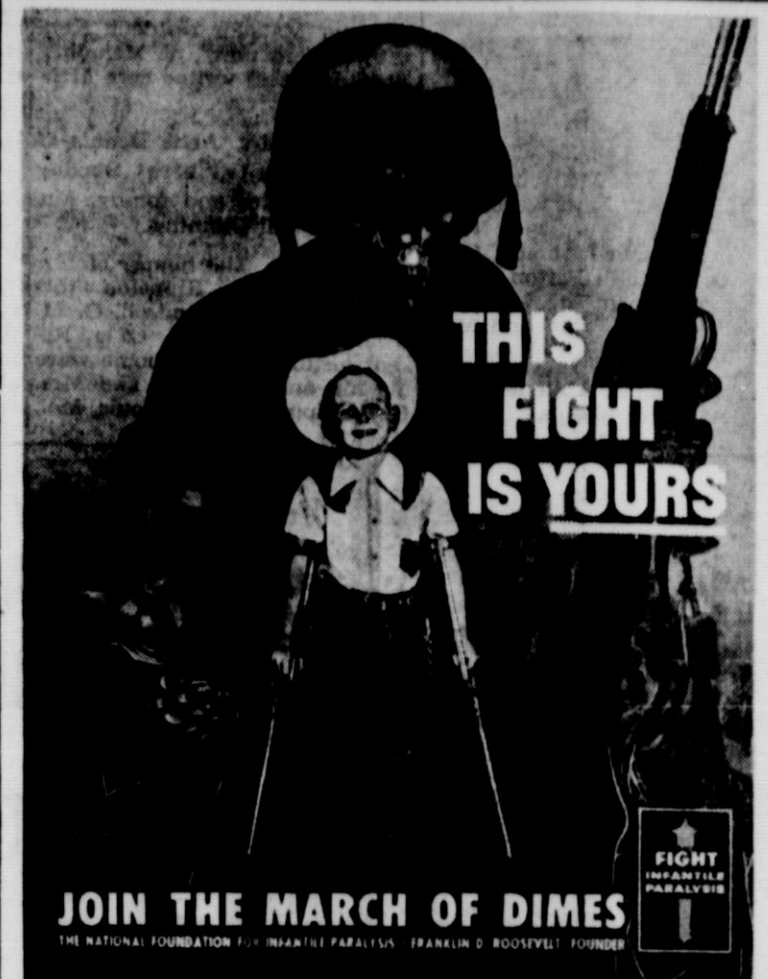

for male foreign students.

The group is Kiva, men's social club, and since the spring of 1950 it has pledged five foreign students—a former Japanese army officer, a Korean whose home was completely destroyed by the war, two brothers who are Spanish-Americans and an Estonian who escaped from his home-land when the Russian persecution began.

Besides Morrison, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. King, and Pipkin, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Pipkin, about 30 other men's names are listed on the membership of Kiva, organized in 1939 to promote friendliness and sociability on the campus.

Byoung Kee Min from Seoul, Korea, paved the way for the other four by accepting a bid to pledge in 1950. Then the second semester, 1951 Juri Nou of Tallinn, Estonia, and Servando Trevino of Chihuahua, Mexico pledged. Shiego Sato, the Japanese, and Mauro Trevino rounded out the five by completing their pledge-ship last semester.

To observe the quintet now—in their varied college activities, in their complete adjustment to the American way of college life it is difficult to imagine any one of them ever feeling or acting

like an outsider. Yet prior to their pledge-ship, being very unaccustomed to "extra-curricular side" of an American college, all five found themselves wondering and standing on the outside of activities.

Through certain requirements of pledging the boys have been forced to adjust to American customs, ideas and traditions to a certain extent. For instance at first all were extremely bashful about asking a girl for a date. However, since it is a strict club requirement that all pledges have dates for club socials, then dates they would get. Now all are able to enjoy a normal social life without any qualms.

In the case of Mauro Trevino the club seems to have had a very stabilizing effect, as he attended two other universities before finally settling at McMurry and filling out a degree plan.

Naturally in pledging there were a lot of difficulties for all of them, but after successfully overcoming these obstacles each is better adjusted. For instance in the case of Sato and the Japanese view that women are of a lower level than men. Sato had to become accustomed during pledging to acting foolish in the presence of women as well as

men. Now Sato has practically forgotten the Oriental idea concerning women. He also had another big problem. He thought the members picked on him because he was a former officer for the Japanese. It wasn't until he was rid of this idea that he attained his first real happiness as an American student. The Latin pride over class distinctions was quickly eliminated in the Trevino brothers when they started carrying shoe-shine boxes and cleaning rooms, the two most obvious signs of menial labor and an insult to the higher class Spanish-Americans.

Although Kiva has definitely contributed to all five of their college lives and helped each to adjust, it hasn't been a one-sided deal at all. Members and fellow pledges have learned the real meaning of tolerance—they've even learned to write in some of the boys' native languages, but the pay-off came at Christmas. It was quite a treat to hear the Kiva boys—the group that's gradually assuming a distinct international favor—as they sang, "Silent Night", all together, first in Korean, then in Spanish, again in Estonian, and finally in Japanese.

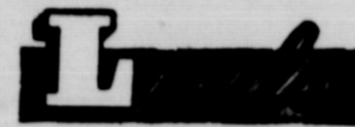

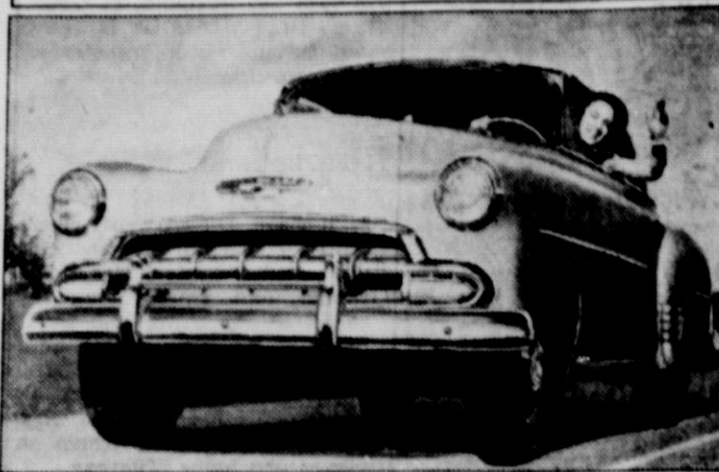
### Missionary Society Meets At Whiteflat

"The fundamental principle of civilization is the accumulation of wealth, the securing of a home, and the raising of a family. No other part of the state offers opportunities so readily as the town of Matador.

"Matador, the county seat of Motley county, has the best lo-

cation for a great town of any town in the west. It is surrounded on all sides by rich alluvial soil that will produce all kinds of fruit, vegetables and truck, the superior of any other county.

"Heretofore, the county has been in large ranches but the cattlemen are cutting their ranches up into small ranches and farms. We need more good, honest, law-abiding citizens to come and secure a good home in our county and town. The new railroad will be completed into Matador by the first of September, 1913, ready to haul away our fall products.

## KEFAUVER'S HAT TOSSED IN RING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23—Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee formally announced his candidacy for the Democratic presidential nomination Wednesday with a call for "new blood and new ideas" in the nation's political life.

The crime-hunting Senator emphasized that he will be a stick-to-the-end candidate, with no interest in settling for the vice-presidency in the event President Truman decides to seek reelection.

"I am not a candidate for any other office," Kefauver told a news conference.

"I am going to work hard to win. I'm in until the finish."

The Tennessee, who skyrocketed to national prominence last year as chairman of the Senate crime investigating committee, also declared he will campaign for a "clean house" in government and an end to "the unholy alliance between criminal element and some men in politics."

He said he will lay stress on developing "the positive and great elements in our foreign policy," and seek to push a "policy of strength" as a "Democratic counteroffensive against Communism."
