Distance is a wasting ice cube in the punch bowl of air travel. One of the most inspiring experiences ever devised by mortal man is rapidly becoming an accepted necessity of modern life. The air terminals are filled with travelers of every age and station in life and the once-lordly railroads are haunted by the specter of empty depots and vacant chairs in their rolling coaches. Everything about air travel is new, but courtesy is the most glittering symbol of the trackless sky roads. It begins the moment the passenger inquires regarding a reservation and increases at every stage of the journey; courtesy has no substitute. Commercial airplanes are operated by educated and alert young men and women who are considerate of the people who pay their money at the ticket desks. Every passenger is a personal charge and responsibility is not released until the flight is completed and a pleasant journey is ended.

Air terminals have an enchanted atmosphere that bears the fragrance of far-away places. The strange and interesting cities of the world are but a few hours beyond the luggage scales; the sweet cordial of adventure is poured from 711 a. m. tilted against the sky. In most terminals automatic vending machines write insurance policies of a thousand dollars for five cents but they receive small patronage. Danger is not confined to planes. It is in a soapy bathtub, on a stepladder, in an automobile or crossing a busy street. The greatest hazard about flying is the revolting attitude it creates with regard to ending a journey and resuming the ordinary duties associated with labor.

Immediately facing the entrance of Dallas' imposing union railroad station, an enterprising air line has erected a complex and ornate sign board with flasher arrangement. At one flash an air liner is on the runway and at the next flash it is outlined in blue neon against the night. The location, could, of course, be an accident.

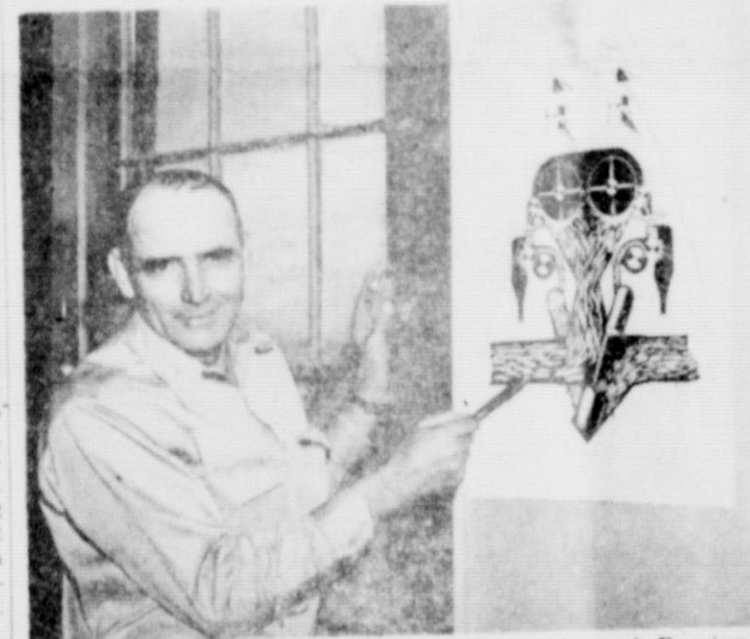
### MRS. SAMPLE IMPROVES

For the first time in the history of the stockshow, two girls, Kelly Ann Green of Roaring Springs and Mary Foley of Flomot, will each exhibit a calf.

Mr. Emmons said all animals to be entered in the show must be on the grounds by 12 o'clock noon. Volunteers are needed Friday to arrange pens for animals to be shown in the exhibit. Location of the show will be on the R. P. Moore property, immediately east of the city hall.

Interest in the show has been growing at a steady pace during the last few days, spurred by reports that some exceptionally fine livestock will be on display.

Due to the constantly advancing price of livestock, it is expected the calves will top all previous records per head. The cattle will be sold Monday on the Amarillo market, according to a previous announcement.

### BREAD LOAF PUFFS



Take a loaf of enriched bread and remove the crusts. Slicing almost through to the bottom, cut lengthwise once, crosswise five or six times. Here you have the start of a whole repertoire of bread loaf puffs. You can brush the loaf with melted margarine and sprinkle with garlic salt or spread it with a creamed mixture of margarine, mustard, chopped onion, and caraway seeds; or butter and fill with cheese. Start with these suggestions, and make up some of your own. Brown the garnished loaf in a hot oven, 400° F., and serve piping hot.

## Butane, Once Waste Product, Now Vital To Modern World

AUSTIN, April 18—The story of "the magic that lives in the tank" will be told the public of Texas in a state-wide advertising program now being prepared by the Texas Butane Dealers Association. The story is a fabulous one, for it deals with what for many years was considered a waste product of the refining industry which has become an important factor in the lives of thousands of rural and semi-urban families, for these liquid

petroleum gases bring city comfort and convenience to homes "off the gas mains." The activity is headed by U. C. Runey of Corsicana as chairman of the Industry Advertising Committee. The program will be placed in Texas newspapers and magazines, on billboards and the air waves.

C. D. Ribble of Paris, president of the Texas Butane Dealers Association, in announcing plans for the advertising program, pointed out that one of the primary objectives will be to familiarize the public with the benefits butane and propane provide for residents of areas beyond the facilities of cities. The campaign will stress the availability of butane and propane to any home

regardless of the location, and the fact that residents of rural or semi-urban areas no longer need face periods of waiting to obtain service. "Butane and propane can be had almost immediately any place in Texas that is reachable by a road," Mr. Ribble

"The supply of butane and propane is entirely adequate to the present and future needs of the people and the fact that users of these gases are not faced with the likelihood of service stoppages because of weather conditions will be brought strongly to the attention of the public. The effort which has long been contemplated by the association will reach into every corner of the state and will stress the fact that no one need be without the benefits of this modern fuel for domestic, agricultural and industrial uses."

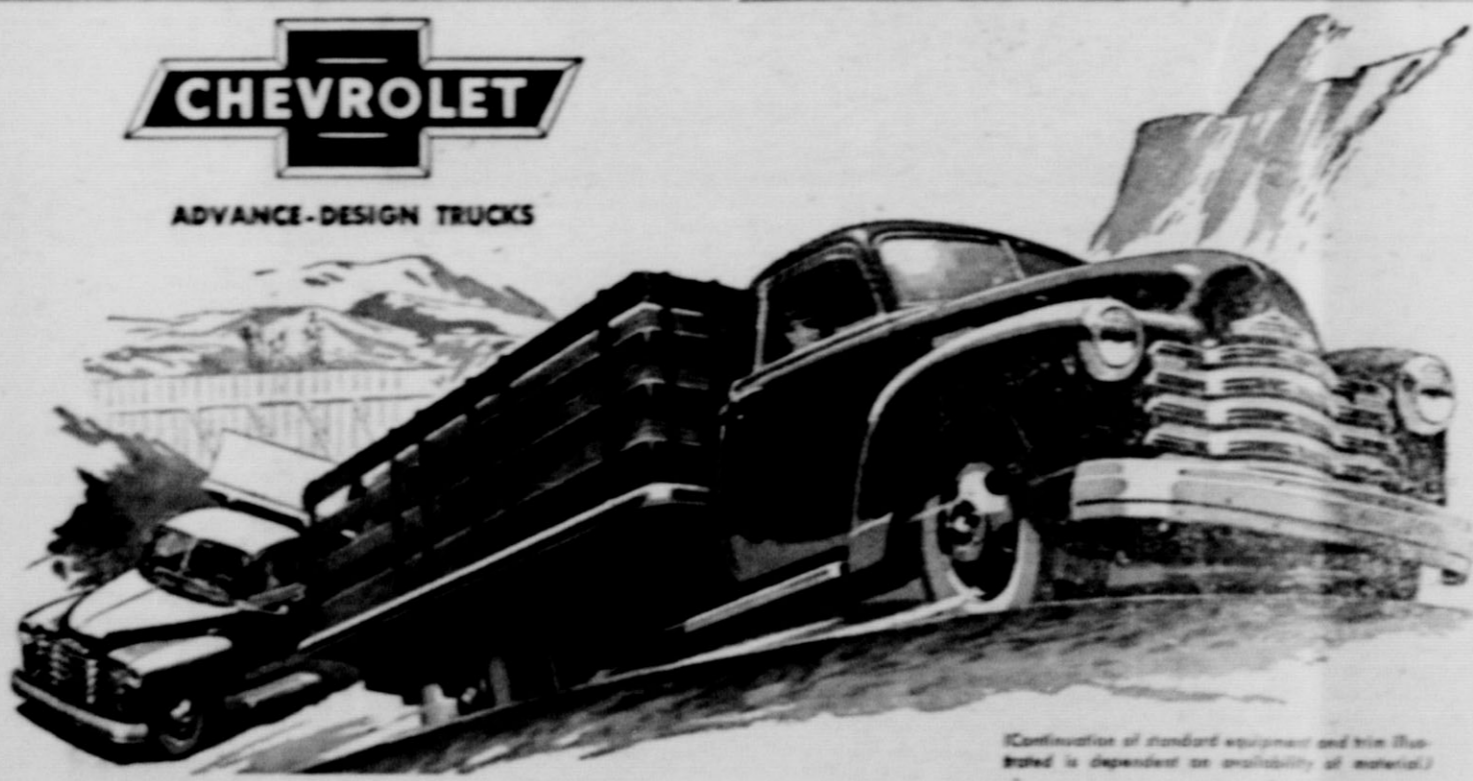

**SOUTHWEST DEFENSE HEAD WARNS OF WAR DANGERS CIVILIANS FACE**

ALLAS, April 14—Atom bomb warfare, nerve gas, sabotage, and other things are among the things that the Southwest's new defense director said today.

"In high time that we get out of the alley of apathy and into the main street of alertness," French Robertson, Abilene attorney, said.

Robertson held a news conference in advance of Monday's opening of headquarters for civilian defense in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana.

Robertson warned: The Russians have the planes and bombs to deliver an atomic attack in force on a dozen or more of our major cities at any time, and there is nothing we can do to completely stop such an attack.

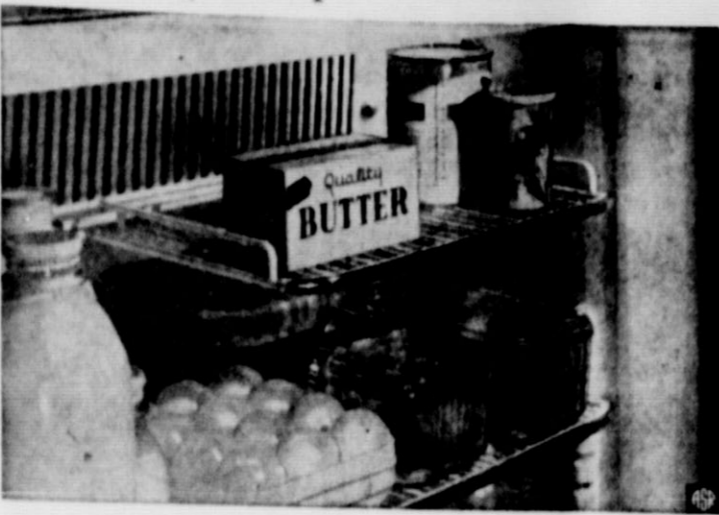
Civilians face a greater personal danger than the men in uniform, he warned, and said they must realize their own backyards may become the front lines in the event of an attack.

Among the weapons the enemy is capable of delivering are several forms of germ warfare and nerve gases, he said.

that O'Mahoney once authored a bill in Congress quitclaiming a section of land to Wyoming after a Supreme Court had ruled the United States to be the owner of land on which oil valued at more than \$3,000,000 had been discovered.

Daniel said, "The Supreme Court held against Wyoming, but you authored a bill in Congress quitclaiming this section of land to Wyoming, in spite of the Supreme Court's decision against your state and in spite of the argument of federal officials that the land belonged to all the people and should not be restored to Wyoming. We who urge restoration to the public school fund of Texas of the lands which we have held in good faith for over 100 years occupy the same position as you did in the case of Wyoming."

"The oil under our lands is no more valuable for national defense than the oil under Wyoming land, and the federal government is as much obliged to defend Wyoming as it is to defend Texas," Daniel wrote.

Regardless of which government owns or administers the land, oil and other necessary resources will always be available to the nation for defense, he continued.

Daniel said he believed more oil could be produced under state control "than would be produced if this added burden is

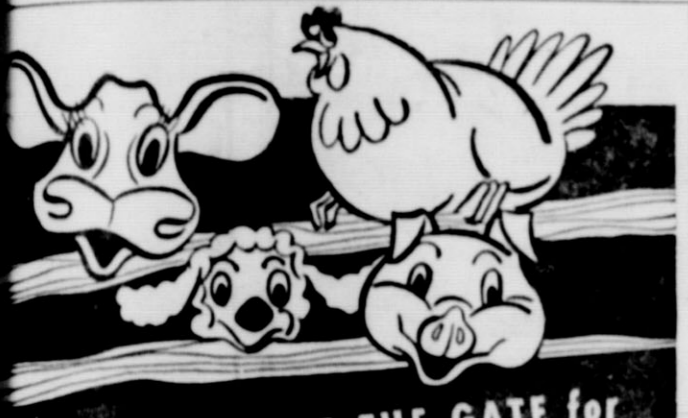

**Tidelands Claim Is Defended By Attorney General**

AUSTIN—Texas Attorney General Price Daniel Tuesday compared attempted federal control of tidelands to Iran's nationalization of oil.

"In nationalizing the tidelands, our federal government is doing to the states exactly what Iran is doing to the British lease owners, and danger lurks in nationalization of state resources here at home as much as abroad," Daniel said in a letter to Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), Chairman of the Senate Interior and Insular Affairs Committee.

The Attorney general said his letter was in reply to arguments advanced by O'Mahoney against state ownership of submerged lands.

The Wyoming Senator announced last week he had written governors of the 48 states that nationalization of oil in Iran created an emergency requiring immediate federal control of the tidelands of Texas, California and Louisiana.

"The states discovered and developed the resources in these lands, and except for recent fed-

eral claims and lawsuits there would be no threat of delay in development today," Daniel wrote, adding:

"The President and his cabinet members ignore the majority in Congress, as well as the national emergency, when they threaten to stop production from these lands unless it is placed under exclusive federal control."

"If the emergency is as great as you indicate, it would seem that the President would be willing to sign any bill that receives a majority vote in Congress and guarantees continued development of the property."

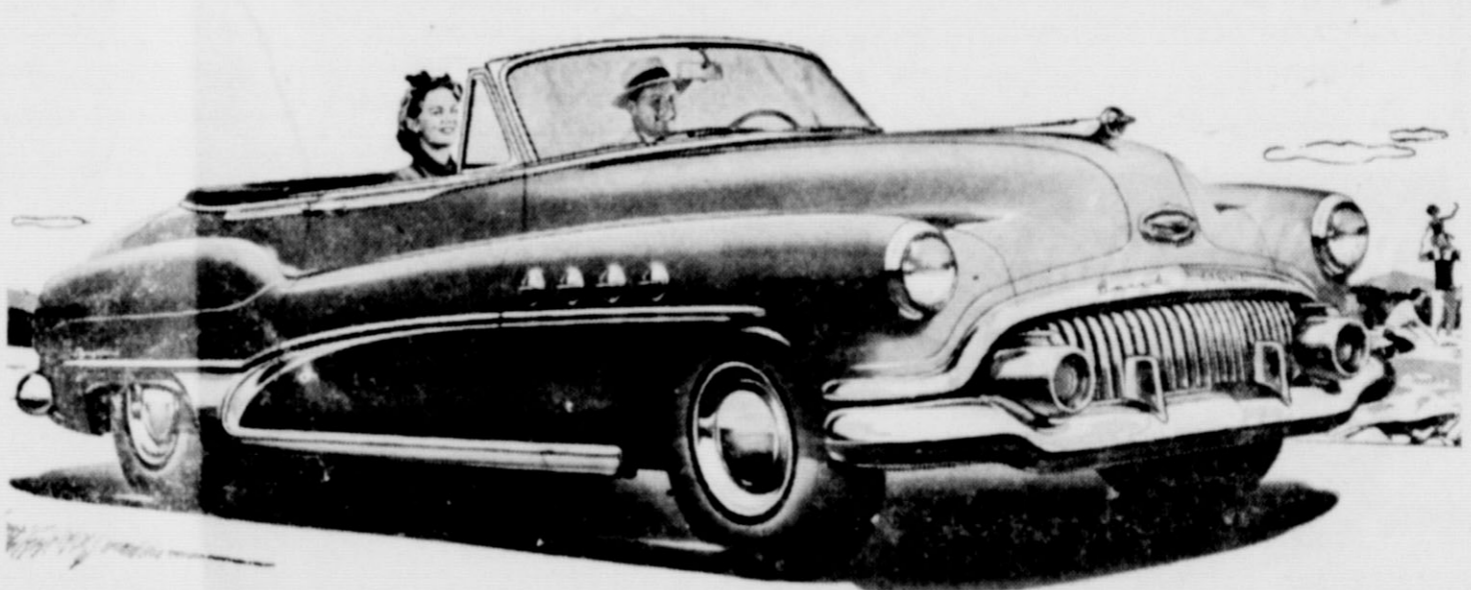

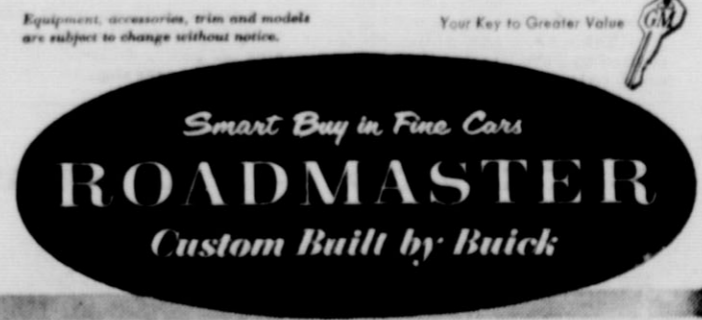
