## TRAIL DUST

Passengers on the returning train of memories are children of parents kneeling before candles at a half-pagan shrine in the mountains of Guatemala. Here the silent acid of civilization is eating away the hearts of the people. Nature spreads the dust centuries into the purple valleys and hungry roots of food for new vines and the epitaph is more vivid than its subject.

Guatemala was a land of 80,000 souls before the quake 400 years ago. Its cities and colleges were symbols of the great Spanish influence. The earth shook until hills rang; cattle bawled and men brayed in terror. Thousands departed in a single day.

One of the ancient bells heard its sound echo through the dreary halls of time to strike the same mountains that held the sound of bells for generations. Soil was thick with mounds that covered the rubble of churches and bore grass to the very edge of deep holes. Fifty feet below, sunbeams poured in through the crumbling portals. Rain fell beneath the trees and soft grass found a way between the worn flagstones. White stone benches were empty beside the high wall where the ghosts of lovers were in the lonely paths of centuries.

There is no poverty in the small enough. In the twilight on the high plateau of Guatemala, little blazes flicker about the great market. They are like the flow of distant fireflies, the small stoves of the poor, preparing a few bites of food. They sleep on the cold stones and snow will be better. Some will want the pottery, the beans, vegetables, fruits or baskets and they can return to the forest and find arms of the mountains.

Light poured through some places in the grey clouds and the bronzed cowboy stood in his stirrups and surveyed the red brakes. He was tall and lean like a pine fence stay. He wore one of Mr. Stetson's trimmed berets, caked with mud and alkali dust, a blue shirt open at the throat, California pants and run-over boots. The chilling wind whipped an odor that hung on his shoulders like a sack with holes in its armpits. On a distant ridge he sighted the unused gate and he turned it. Once on the other side he headed straight toward the sun and it was dark when he reached the linecamp. He led his horse from the small back of hay and went to the house. He did not knock because he felt the emptiness before he entered. Starting a fire in the heater stove, he sliced some bacon, opened a can of tomatoes and began stirring flour and meat grease in a pan. The coffee had boiled when he finished frying the thin batter. A gust of wind shook the frame house. The cowboy looked outside and saw flakes of snow starting across the shaft of moonlight. The Norther had struck.

Cows were working buttons on the blouse of day and pressed the pleats in a flimsy skirt bedecked with sequins and stars. Beauty must be constant lest it perish in an unguarded moment.

Christmas is the season in which I am helpless before the tender memories of a little mother. It is the season in which we shared a life of affinity transcending the fleshly cup and brown bread and five times drove the steadily to spend my meager savings and return home from California.

## Snow in Wake of Blizzard

### Mercury Drops To 9 Early Wednesday

WINTER swept across the Panhandle of Texas early Tuesday with light rains followed by snow and frigid winds up to 48 miles per hour. Summer-like weather (despite high winds) Monday brought temperatures in the high 70's and the warm weather continued until the blizzard struck about 3 a. m. Tuesday.

This area received approximately two inches of dry snow that drifted with the strong north winds. At 8 a. m. the official mercury reading here was 15 degrees. The storm abated during the day but temperatures remained low and with calmed winds Tuesday night the cold front drove the mercury to nine degrees here, only four degrees "warmer" than Amarillo.

Continued cold last night despite the thawing Wednesday temperatures, probably kept the mercury in the neighborhood of 10 or 11 degrees.

Deputy Sheriff Jinks Wilson said no traffic accidents were reported in the county despite the covering of ice and snow on paving. Livestock warnings by radio prepared cattlemen for the sudden change and no losses have been reported in the area.

The precipitation was the first received here since September 26, when 7 inch of rain was recorded. Although 1950 has experienced several "dry spells" it will be recorded as a "wet year" according to County Agent Rufus Emmons. Rainfall registered to date (not including Tuesday snow) was 24.35 inches while the annual average is only 21.7.

## Farm Bureau Directors Plans 1951 Objectives

Meeting here Tuesday in commissioners' court room, directors of Motley County Farm Bureau, scheduled plans and objectives for 1951. Meeting with the directors were Bill Tilson, district director from Meadlow area field Cravey of Morton, area field man. Fiscal year for the farm organization begins on December 1st.

The directors endorsed resolutions passed by a convention last month in Mineral Wells of the Texas Farm Bureau federation. These resolutions oppose the Brannan plan of price supports for agricultural commodities, favor better rural roads and support retention of the four-cent tractor gasoline refund. Gasoline burned in farm vehicles not used on the highways is subject to a refund of four cents a gallon to farmers. District number two of which Motley county is a member, is composed of 19 counties.

President Ben Edwards was ill and unable to attend the Tuesday meeting. Other officials of the Motley county organization attending, included Nelson McMahon, J. W. Pritchett, Elbert Reeves and D. P. Smiley of Dickens county.

Plans were outlined for the national convention which opens in Dallas, Tuesday, December 12 at Fair Park auditorium. Some of the nation's leaders are scheduled to speak during the three-day program, including a welcoming address by Governor Allan Shivers, annual address by the President of the American Farm Bureau, Allan B. Kline, W. Averell Harriman, assistant to President Truman, will speak during the afternoon of the first day.

Second day of the meeting (Wednesday) James B. Carey, secretary-treasurer of the CIO will make an address, to be followed by Henry Ford II. During the afternoon, Senator Allen W. Ellender of Louisiana will address the group to be followed by Congressman William R. Poage of Texas.

It is estimated that ten delegates from Motley county will probably attend the meeting.

## JACKSON RITES HELD ON FRIDAY

M.; Miss Marjorie Jackson of Long Beach, Calif.; Mrs. Lois Hunter of Freeport, Texas; Gordon Jackson of San Francisco, Calif. and John Jackson of Raymondville, Texas. He is also survived by 6 grandchildren and one brother, Albert S. Jackson of Lubbock.

Friends from over a wide area of Texas and New Mexico attended the services, and several came Saturday, after hearing an erroneous radio broadcast that the services would be held that day.

## Pioneer Jurist Declares Growing Need For Prayer

Reviewing briefly the panorama of progress the world has made in the past fifty years and evaluating its dire distress, including the tragic Korean situation, Judge Charles E. Coombs of Stamford, principal speaker at the Tuesday regular meeting of the Matador Lions club, believes there is a growing need for greater prayer and turning to the great truths taught by Christ.

The pioneer jurist has been a close friend of Lion G. E. Hamilton, who introduced him, for half a century. He has held the office of District Attorney, District Judge and was former mayor of Abilene. He is the author of a popular book, "Prairie Dog Lawyer".

Judge Coombs explained that he lived in an age when "... we did our own baby sitting and we had our own social security.... if we were not careful about the amount of money we spent our social security often failed to provide...."

An able speaker, Judge Coombs, once introduced William Jennings Bryan, and was told afterwards that he made a better speech than the great "silver-tongued orator." In his speech Tuesday he proved himself a capable teller of humorous stories and kept the audience laughing most of the time.

Dist. Governor Harvey said District Governor Marshall Harvey of Lubbock, was also a speaker on the Tuesday program. Governor Harvey said Lionsism is continuing to grow more rapidly than any other service organization in the world and that at present 8,300 clubs have a total membership of 405,000. Texas has 638 Lions clubs with a membership of 39,000. District 27-1, of which Matador is a member, has 75 clubs and 3,700 members.

Governor Harvey said Matador has long been one of the most outstanding clubs in the district and is recognized by Lions International for its large membership, constant activity and a attitude of community building and service.

## Lt. Frank Mitchell Is Killed In Korea

### Roaring Springs Marine Is County's First Casualty On Tragic Battlefield

CHRISTMAS PRESENTS were mailed out of Roaring Springs ten days ago to a Marine fighting in Korea. They were addressed to Lt. Frank Mitchell but he will not be present to answer the mail call when they arrive.

Lt. Frank Mitchell has paid with his life on the battlefield of the undeclared third world war, as one of thousands, for the preservation of liberty and freedom. The message of his death was received Saturday by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Mitchell, his wife, Beverly, and daughter, Barbara, 4, all of Roaring Springs, and brought a pall of grief over the entire county.

The message was from the War Department and declared he had been killed in battle, Sunday, November 26. His death is the county's first reported loss on the tragic Korean front, which now is crumbling before a mass army of more than one million Chinese communists.

Lt. Mitchell was wounded earlier in the fighting and his picture appeared in Associated Press dailies throughout the country. Account of his injury was published in the Tribune, November 16 issue. He had recovered and been sent back to the front.

Lt. Mitchell was a graduate of Roaring Springs high school, class of '38, and had attended Tech college at Lubbock, College of Colorado, Southwestern University and North Texas Agriculture college. He was a veteran of World War II and had remained in the service. Previous to going to Korea, he had been stationed in China and Guam.

## Chest Drive Is Favorable

Early reports on the third annual Matador Community Chest drive are favorable to achieving the \$3,000 quota. Glenn Woodruff, president of the organization, declared late yesterday.

Unfavorable weather has slowed the work to some extent, he said, but officials are hopeful that the almost complete support found by earlier solicitors will be continued until the goal is achieved.

## DRIVER ESCAPES WHEN GRAIN TRUCK GOES INTO SPIN

W. H. Long, 34, driver of a heavily-loaded grain truck, must have glimpsed eternity about dark yesterday when the big vehicle went into a spin near the crest of the grade just east of Teepee creek.

Mystery surrounded the accident until almost ten o'clock last night because Deputy Sheriff Jinks Wilson was unable to find any trace of the driver after two trips to the scene. Neither of the Matador hospitals had received an accident victim and after Cottle county officers visited the scene and declared the Paducah hospital had had no accident patient, it was believed the driver might be buried under the great mass of thrashed Milo.

The cab of the 1949 Chevrolet truck was pulled loose from the long trailer bed and had apparently rolled over several times before coming to a stop with the wheels against a wire fence. The metal cab was crushed until it seemed impossible that the driver could escape alive.

On his second return to Matador, Deputy Wilson was able to learn that the man had been taken to Paducah and treated by Dr. F. C. Harmon. He had an ear cut off and other minor injuries, but escaped with his life. The truck belonged to McCarter Grain Company of Kernes, Texas. Cause of the accident which tore up a long section of highway guard rail, could not be determined.

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**TEXAS BAPTISTS SET WORLD RADIO SERIES**

Dr. Deed said that the short-wave station can be heard over the world, particularly around 5-15 p. m., Dallas time.—Dallas News.

**RANDOM THOUGHTS**

(By Lewis Nordyke)  
Between Matador and Roaring Springs is a small airport. Its name is Buzz Field.

On a trip down in Texas the other day, we went by Tullia, Silverton, Quitaque, Turkey, Whiteflat, Matador, Roaring Springs. It was the sort of day tumble weeds love — gusts of wind, a haze hanging low. The Matador Company was making news in England, Scotland and this country because of the demand for the company's stock, but men out on the range, just outside Roaring Springs, didn't know about this. They were making camp for a round-up. The chuck wagon lumbered up to a little glade and stopped. The men put up the tent. A big trailer truck rolled up. It contained saddle horses. Men mounted them, rode over the hill and brought in the remuda of 150 animals. The outfit of 11 men were ready to make a round-up on Wolf Creek. The back of the wagon was covered with stake ropes for the night staking of horses the men intended to ride next morning. . . . Walter Edwards, tall, lanky, slightly wrinkled, sat at the back of the wagon, chewing on a stub of a

cigar. His neckerchief was silk. He wore fancy leather cuffs, or wristlets. A Scotsman, who wore knee-length boots and smoked a pipe, sat on a bedroll. I was hurt just a tiny bit because this man from the Highlands wore a cap instead of a big John B. . . . Bob Thornton rattled off in the hoodlum wagon to get a barrel of water. He has been on the Matador about five years. Mr. Edwards has been working for the ranch off and on for 18 years. He wants only a riding job. He said that each man has a dozen horses in the remuda and that each would ride from one to four animals a day on the sort of work. One of the tough jobs on the Matador is that of getting wild cattle out of the almost endless reaches of brush—mesquite and shinnery. A few years ago, the Matador men got a 13-year-old steer out of the brush. He had managed to hide out every time a round-up was staged in his vicinity.

Water roars out of Roaring Spring at the rate of 500 gallons to the minute. The spring is on the shore of the Pease River and five or six miles from the town of Roaring Springs. Stopped by these to see the spring and to look at Indian grinding places in the rocks. The Comanches were camped there in 1860 when Cynthia Ann Parker, the noted white girl captive was recaptured by the whites down the Pease in Foard county. For centuries men have used Roaring Spring and left their signs. . . . Boo Downell, booted, spurred and ready to ride, came walking up from his Matador Camp to the spring to get a bucket of water. He asked the time and commenced cussing himself. He had set his clock by guess and had reckoned 15 minutes in error—got it 15 minutes ahead. But at the time, there were a few clouds around and Boo couldn't get a good look at the sun and shadows. He had stopped the clock so he could get some rest. He had had some teeth pulled and his mouth was so tender and sore that the tick of the clock hurt him. . . . Had lunch in the cafe just back of

the hotel in Roaring Springs. . . . Best, and thickest hamburger I've chomped since before Pearl Harbor. They have a shuffle board in the place, and this was the first time I'd seen a thing like that in operation.—(Amarillo Daily News, Tues., Nov. 21)

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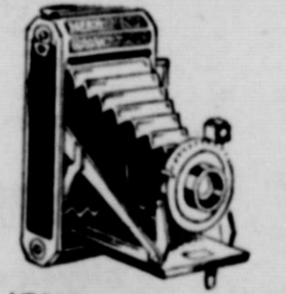

**Farmers-Ranchers Attend Meeting Despite Cold Spell**

It takes more than mercury hovering 10 to 15 degrees above zero to prevent a group of Motley county farmers and ranchers from holding a meeting. County Agent Rufus Emmons thought seriously of cancelling the scheduled affair, but 70 farmers and

ranchers showed up. Two speakers were unable to negotiate the slick roads.  
Charley Fisher of the Spur Experiment Station, one of the principal speakers, advised on mesquite control. He said spraying should be done with the proper chemical, when trees are in full growth and by reliable operators. He warned of the danger of killing cotton near sprayed areas. Mr. Fisher said it was probable the government would pay \$1.50 or more per acre on the cost of spraying, through PMA, altho the announcement is not official.
