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ARMY BELLOWS FOR MEN, AND FALLS DOWN IN OWN RED TAPE

WASHINGTON—The fantastic story of Byron Asteriadis of Jamestown, N. Y., who wants to get back in the Army and can't, has just come to light. It's a classic of Army red tape and snafu.
 The 21-year-old former GI has spent five bucks of his own dough to prove that he's in top shape for active duty. Still the Army won't have him, even though he speaks Korean pretty

well and served in Korea two years before.
 Experts on Byron's case at the Pentagon say they're shocked by the fact that he isn't on active duty. The Army is crying for men with his qualifications. Two colonels to whom the case history was taken first said it was impossible for him not to be in the Army. Then they looked up some more regulations and said well, maybe it was possible.
 Anyway, Byron Asteriadis, patriotic American citizen, is now broke, working part time as a bell-hop, unable to get a better job, and hoping only that the Army will unwind its red tape enough so that he can shoot some Commies.

When the Korean fighting started Asteriadis tried to enlist in the Army immediately. He was turned down because of dependents. To get around this he joined the active reserves and asked for active duty. He had to pay for his own physical exam but they told him he would be in uniform in a week.
 He quit his job to wind up his civilian affairs and then started to wait—which he is still doing. The only information he got was that the circular under which he had applied for duty had been withdrawn and that a new circular would come in soon which would let him in.
 Asteriadis then wrote to this reporter for help.

When the facts of his case were laid before the Colonel "who would give a complete explanation of the trouble" he said he could prove that it couldn't happen. He called in Colonel No. 2, who got the facts and then retreated to his office in a state of high indignation.
 In a few moments he returned with a smile of great satisfaction on his face, waving a blue sheet of paper. This paper, he said, proved that the whole thing couldn't happen. It was a copy of an order sent to all reserve officials instructing that men with Asteriadis' qualifications be called to active duty immediately.

But why isn't Asteriadis on active duty then? Maybe it's a human error somewhere, the Colonel suggests. What's the best way for Asteriadis to get the error corrected? See the top reserve official in Jamestown, the Colonel says.
 But isn't that where the error started? Yes, but that's where Asteriadis should go, the Colonel stoutly insists. What about the circulars? These matters aren't handled by circulars, the Colonel advises.
 Is there anything you can do about getting this man in, Colonel? That is, not exactly the function of this office, the Colonel reminds you. Doesn't this seem like a thoughtless piece of business on the part of the Army? That sometimes happens in the Army, the Colonel admits. And Asteriadis? What does he think about all this? He says:

"Now I can't get in or out. I can't get a job because being in the reserves is like having leprosy. I can't even get in any other service. My problem is how to get in, that is, get in before my family and I starve."
 So far the best the Army will do for him is grant permission for two weeks of "on-the-job training" at active duty pay. Beyond that the red tape is still unrolling.
