They remained in grog shops and other places of social recreation until Monday, when they would return to their homes, sleep off the effects of drink and return to work each Tuesday. One night the printer's young son asked him for money to buy a model airplane. He didn't have any money but told his son to meet him when he cashed his check Saturday morning. He had forgotten but the small boy remembered and was waiting at the steps. The printer left his friends and went to town with his son. They purchased a model airplane to be assembled, but there was need of other articles and the printer also bought a book on model plane building. They ate late lunch together and returned home. He was ready now to join his friends and resume the established custom. As he left the house, his son called from the garage where he had started to assemble the plane. He was having trouble and would help. Together they began working on the problem. One slipped through their busy fingers. The mother rebuked him mildly for keeping the boy up so late. It was eleven o'clock. His wife prepared his supper and went to bed. He felt wonderful on Sunday morning and joined his family in Sunday school and church, then the man and boy returned to the plane. Several years have passed. The father and son have won awards for plane-building together. The printer has not had time to think again.

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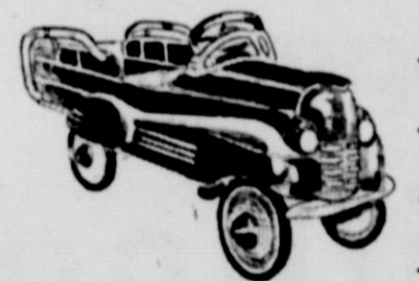
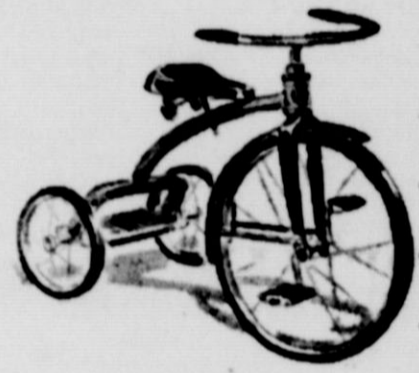
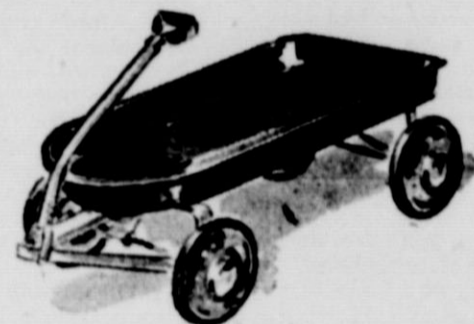
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Matador Football Season Climaxed With Annual Banquet Held Recently
