Clarendon Geologist To Address Lions Meeting

Geology, paleobotany and geology are fancy terms. J. C. Clarendon, geologist, prefers to call himself and his wife by a more familiar name, "Rockhounds." He is an outstanding geologist and has held the chair of geology in the field from Arizona and Utah universities during the summer months. But J. C. Clarendon is a West Texan, rugged as a mesquite and as gentle as blue Texas skies. He is Clarendon's postmaster and he has lived 70 extremely short and interesting years.

Next week (Tuesday, May 20) Mr. Clarendon will tell the Matador Lions club and visitors how this country looked 50-million years ago. He was not here at the time but he did arrive later. He once worked on the Matador ranch when it was operated by Henry H. Campbell. He has been in every state in the southwest in the search of rocks for his collections which are sold to museums and private collectors.

Precious Stone Display
Mr. Clarendon will bring along one of the finest displays in the country of precious and semi-precious stones. He cuts and polishes the marvelous rocks which he finds (some sell for extremely high prices). Geology is his hobby, he declares.

Mr. Clarendon accompanies her husband during his search for stones and she will also accompany him to Matador. Arrangements are being made for a special program following the Lions meeting in which members of various women's clubs will be invited. The colorful speaker is a true son of the Old West. He was born February 13, 1882 in Littleton, Colorado and moved with his family to Old Tascosa in June, 1883. He has made northwest Texas his headquarters since that time.

Heat Wave Broken By Rainfall

Conditions uncomfortably close to the boiling point were broken Friday night when a heavy rain fell, accompanied by some light hail, and broke the heat wave that drove mercury near the 100 mark the previous day. Precipitation registered here varied from 1.65 inches in some sections of town to less than one inch elsewhere. The fall was light at Roaring Springs where some sections east of Matador reported 2 inches.

Many tree limbs were broken in Matador and some damage to lawns and young gardens resulted from the fine hail. Beneficial from the rainfall far exceeded the minor damage.

Heavy rainfall, estimated between five and six inches, was reported on the Curtis Graham road about 15 miles north of Matador. Some hail accompanied the heavy rain.

Lee Burns of Matador, Tuesday was named in a special meeting of the city council, to fill the place of city water superintendent, following the resignation of Herman Stanfield.

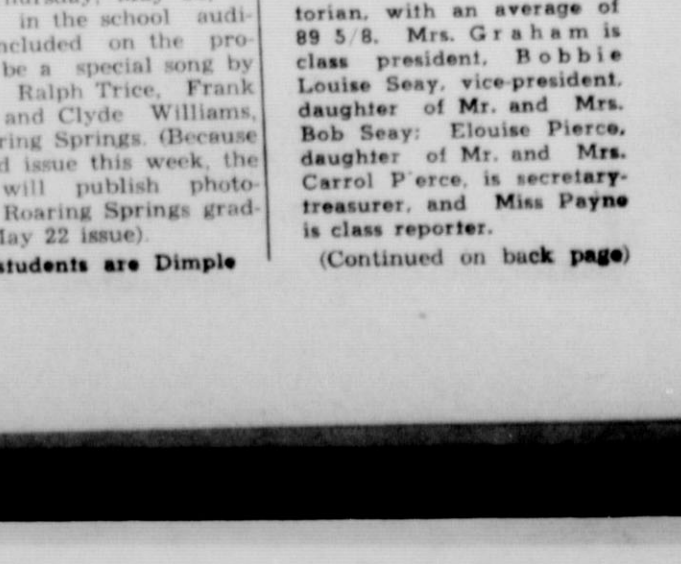
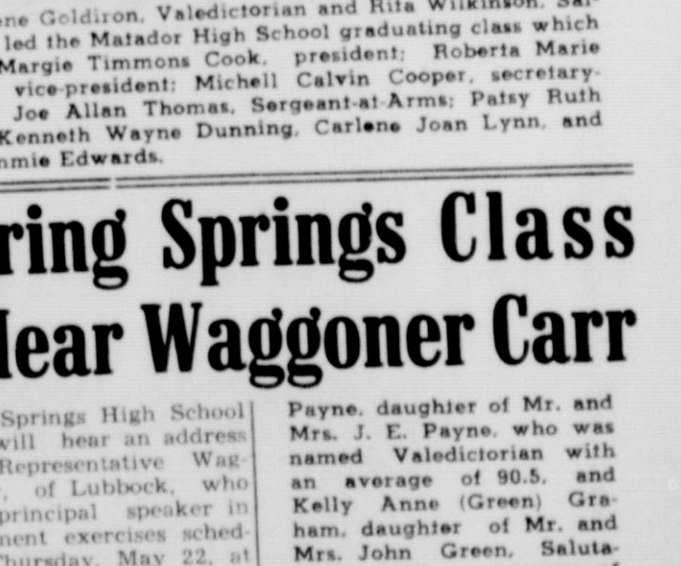
Local Boys Will Receive Degrees At West Texas SC

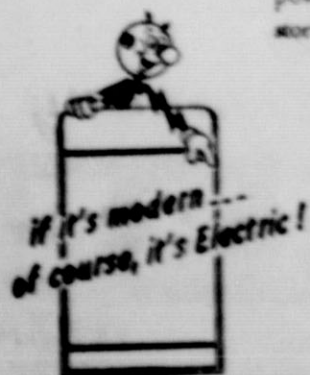
