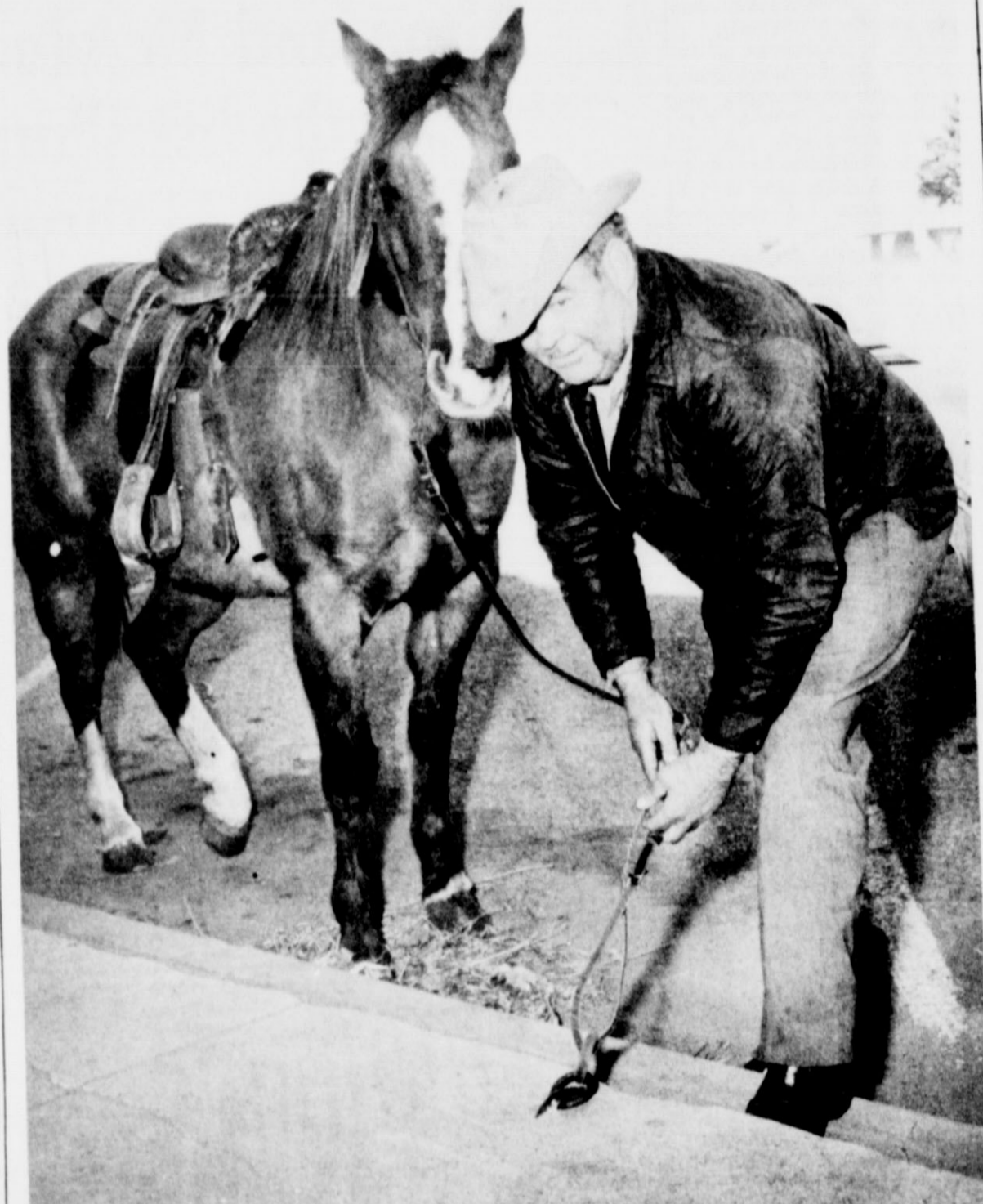

Man's Life is Saved By Lubbock Driver

DRENCHED in his own blood, a man stood near his wrecked automobile Friday night on lonely highway FM 94, between Northfield and Childress. The temperature was about 12 degrees and falling.

Walton Hancock of 310 SE 7th, Plainview, was not wearing a coat at the time of the accident. He could see approaching car lights on the winding road, but the car passed. Then it stopped and backed up to where the dazed man stood.

A. J. Daper, 2937 E. Colgate in Lubbock, was returning home from Childress. A woman passenger caused him to stop and back to the accident scene. Hancock was bleeding profusely from a deep laceration behind his right ear. Ignoring the damage to the interior of the Thunderbird car, the Dapers rushed Hancock to Matador.

When they learned that no hospital facilities are available here, the Motley County Ambulance Service was called and received

the injured man at El Matador Travel Center. He was rushed to Caprock Hospital in Floydada. Pat Seigler driving the ambulance, called the Highway Patrol in Floydada and asked for an escort through town and that the hospital be notified of the emergency.

Physicians at the hospital said Hancock would have died in a short time if he had not received medical aid. The other factor threatening his life was the cold temperature. The mercury later dropped to 6 degrees during the night. The accident happened about 9:15 p.m.

Hancock had been working on a road construction job near Goldthwaite and was returning home to spend the week end. The accident was investigated by the State Department of Public Safety out of Childress.

A relative of the injured man was here Saturday to secure the address of Hancock's benefactors to express gratitude to a family of another race.

Circuit Riders had Major Role In Expanding Religion in Texas

Early day circuit-riders played a major role in the advancement of religion in Texas, and the extent of their endeavors, experiences and progress were told Thursday at regular meeting of El Progresso Club.

Guest speaker was Mrs. Marvin Brotherton, whose husband, the late Rev. Marvin Brotherton served as a Circuit Rider in the Canyon Circuit.

"I joined the 'circuit riders' in 1923," Mrs. Brotherton said, referring to her marriage. "I knew of course that Marvin was a preacher, and what the pattern of my life would be."

Mrs. Brotherton introduced her talk with reminiscing on early day Sunday Schools. She recalled the name of her first Sunday School teacher, and that the classes were held in a school house, which was the rule in most rural communities, until church houses were built.

She referred to the book, "From Dugout to Steeple," by J. T. Griswold, describing the organization of churches by the circuit riders, who preached on alternate Sundays with ministers of other denominations, and the organization of the various Conferences. Northwest Texas Conference was founded in 1910.

In this part of the country, she said, the circuit riders began at Vernon, in the 1880s. In 1884 the town of Clarendon was laid out with a site for the proposed Methodist Church in it, but it was not organized until 1890. "In those days, Clarendon was called 'Saints Roost' by the whoys, because the sale of whiskey was not allowed," Mrs. Brotherton related.

Rev. Brotherton volunteered for the ministry in 1920 and was assigned to the Floydada Circuit. He was a native of Hunt County, but his parents moved to Floyd-

ada in 1917. After his marriage to Miss Mattie Robinson of Electra, who was attending West Texas State Teachers College in Canyon, the couple lived in Lockney and later Floydada.

"Bathroom Appointment" He was later assigned to the Canyon Circuit, and in the 1930's was assigned to the Wichita Circuit. "Our first bathroom appointment was at Vernon," Mrs. Brotherton recalled.

During his early days in the ministry, Rev. Brotherton rode horseback, but later acquired a Ford roadster. Since there were no roads or landmarks, the preacher "set his compass and started out in the direction he wanted to go."

Asked whether she accompanied her husband on his circuit, Mrs. Brotherton said that she and their two sons always went along.

"We have such a rich heritage, bought with a price, left by dedicated men and women who worked so zealously to establish the churches," she concluded.

Rev. Brotherton served the Matador First Methodist Church as pastor for five years and was transferred to Rotan. They returned to Matador in 1954 to retire here, and he passed away on April 4, 1955.

On Sunday, Jan. 9, Mrs. Brotherton was honored on Retired Minister's Day at the First United Methodist Church, together with children of other Methodist pastors still living here. Mrs. Brotherton is the only widow of a retired (or deceased) Methodist minister, living in the community.

Thursday's meeting was held at the Methodist parsonage with Mrs. Douglas Gossett as hostess. Mrs. Furman Vinson, president, welcomed the members and guest, and in a brief business session,

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE KEEPING AND MAINTENANCE OF LIVESTOCK AND FOWL WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF MATADOR, TEXAS, AND PROHIBITING LIVESTOCK AND FOWL FROM RUNNING AT LARGE WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF MATADOR, TEXAS; CONTAINING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTY ON VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Because of the lack of proper regulation of livestock and fowl, there exists in the City of Matador, Texas unsanitary conditions where flies breed and disease is cultured, where odors are obnoxious to citizens, where unsightliness is evident and a need for regulation is great; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Matador, Texas, in order to promote the public welfare, health and convenience of the people, has decided that it is necessary to regulate the keeping and maintenance of livestock and fowl within the city limits of the City of Matador, Texas to prohibit the running at large of livestock and fowl within the city limits.

THEREFORE, Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Matador, Texas:

Section 1: KEEPING AND MAINTAINING LIVESTOCK WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS: Any livestock kept or maintained within the city limits of the City of Matador, Texas shall be kept in pens or on the premises of the owner, by leash, cord or chain or otherwise. All pens and premises shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to maintain livestock within the city limits of Matador, Texas in unclean and unsanitary pens, or to maintain said livestock in sufficient numbers as to injure or affect the public health or comfort.

Section 2: KEEPING AND MAINTAINING FOWL WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS: All fowl kept or maintained within the city limits of Matador, Texas shall be kept in pens or roosts. All pens or roosts shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to maintain fowl within the city limits of the City of Matador, Texas, in unclean and unsanitary pens or roosts, or to maintain said fowl in sufficient numbers as to injure or affect the public health or comfort.

Section 3: PROHIBITING LIVESTOCK AND FOWL FROM RUNNING AT LARGE: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation owning or controlling any livestock or fowl to permit same to run at large, within the city limits of Matador, Texas.

Section 4: DEFINITIONS: The following words and phrases as used in this Ordinance have the meaning respectively ascribed to them by this Section, unless the context otherwise indicates:

At large: "At large" shall mean, off the premises of the owner, and not under the control of the owner or member of his immediate family either by leash, cord or chain or otherwise.

LIVESTOCK: "Livestock" shall mean, horses, mules, jacks, cattle, sheep and goats.

FOWL: "Fowl" shall mean, chickens, turkeys, ducks, or any domestic fowl.

Section 5: PENALTY FOR VIOLATION: Any person who shall violate or fail to comply with any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not exceeding \$100.00 and any person who shall aid, abet or assist in the violation of any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100.00. Each and every day that any provision of this Ordinance is violated shall

be deemed a separate offense.

Section 6: REPEAL OF ORDINANCE: All ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance or any provision of this Ordinance is hereby repealed.

Section 7: SEVERABILITY OF PROVISIONS: It is the intention of the City Council that each separate provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed independent of and from all other provisions thereof, and it is further the intention of the City Council that if any provision of this Ordinance be declared invalid, all other provisions hereof shall remain valid and enforceable.

Section 8: This Ordinance is passed as an emergency measure, and the City Council does, by the vote by which this Ordinance is passed, declare that this Ordinance shall be effective and valid upon publication of said Ordinance as required by law.

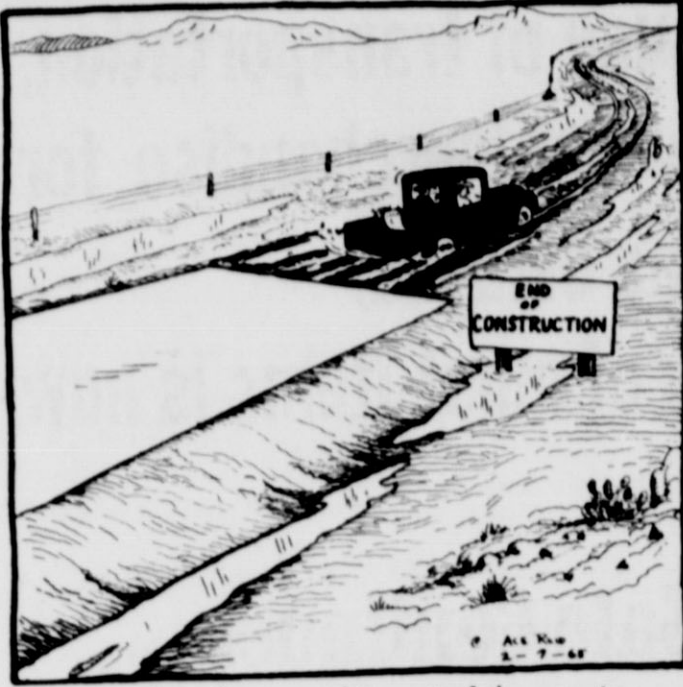
