PROGRAM PLANNED FOR SCHOOL WEEK

In observance of "Texas Public School Week" March 3-7 as proclaimed by Governor Alan Shivers, Commissioner Edgar and the State Legislature, Matador schools have planned a full week's activities.

ANTHRAX CATTLE LOSS AT PADUCAH

Anthrax, the dreaded cattle disease, has been reported in Cottle county. County Agent J. R. Emmons said yesterday he had a report from Cottle county veterinary Dr. J. T. Westbrook that a cow had died of anthrax. The animal belonged to Willie Boyle, whose place is north of Paducah.

Dr. Westbrook cautioned farmers and ranchers with regard to skinning or handling animals that die with symptoms of the disease. A veterinary should be called immediately. Some of the symptoms include sudden staggering, collapse and a few convulsive movements before death. A blood-stained discharge from the mouth and nose may also be observed.

CITY VOTING BOX IS LOCATED IN COURTHOUSE LOBBY

A plan to improve voting facilities here has been approved by the Commissioners' court and the Matador City Council, whereby all future elections will be held in the courthouse lobby. In county elections where two boxes are necessary, the north side residents will vote in the west wing of the lobby and the south side residents will vote in the east wing of the lobby.

In city elections where only one box is necessary, the election will be held in the center lobby. In county elections, north side residents have previously voted in the courthouse lobby while south side residents have voted in the city hall.

The change was made because of better facilities and easier access. The city hall office is too small to accommodate a voting box and at the same time allow enough room to conduct city business. The fire truck garage which has been used in the past is difficult to heat and at times the door must be closed because of inclement weather. Often it has been necessary for voters to pass through the city hall office to reach the poll.

Advantages of the courthouse location include ample room, desks, chairs and other facilities for holding an election, with easy parking facilities and entrances on three sides.

Implement Plant Builds Paint Shop

Expanding its activities, the Spring Manufacturing company of Roaring Springs which recently received a contract to construct a large number of "Hot-Devils".

The new structure of concrete blocks and steel, is located southeast of the Braxton Implement company. When completed the building will be used to process the stock pile of new "Hoe-Devils" now constructed. The grey steel implements will receive a coat of bright red paint as they pass through the new building.

"I've Been In Trouble Before..." Holdup Suspects Are Behind Bars

SISTER OF RESIDENT DIES AT SAN MARCOS

Mrs. George Moore of San Marcos, sister of local resident, Mrs. Harry Willett, died Wednesday last week at her home here. She had been in ill health for a prolonged period, and Mrs. Willett had been at her bedside for several weeks.

Mr. Willett left immediately after receiving word of the death, and joined his wife in attending funeral services.

"I don't know why I do things. I just get a notion to do them and I have to get it off my chest."

A short blue-eyed youth shrugged his shoulders as he looked through the bars on his door. Somewhere below a trusty slammed a steel door. The half-dozen men in the cell stood silently around in a ragged semicircle.

"It's just something in us, I guess," said the youth's companion, a somewhat taller, tattooed youth of 21. The pair stands charged with the armed robbery of a Matador service station owner Feb. 6. They were brought to Lubbock Monday for "safekeeping."

Both Are Boastful
"It'd be hard to say," said the first youth, Kenneth Earl Owens 21, of Portales, N. M., when asked where he was the night of the robbery.

"Yeah, I've been in trouble before. Spent a couple of stretches in New Mexico for burglary."

His companion, 21-year-old Clarence William Helmer of Roswell, N. M., broke in. "Burglary, forgery, white slavery; Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Arkansas, New Mexico, the Southwest. I can't remember the charges or the places."

Arrested In Missouri
"I never think something out. The notion hits me to pull a job and I do it. I always heard that if you think long you think wrong."

The pair was arrested in Union, Mo., last Wednesday and charged with the robbery with firearms of Clarence Kifer at his service station in Matador. They allegedly then forced him to accompany them several miles into the country, where they set him loose. Helmer's wife, Della Mae, and Owens' girl friend, 18-year-old Betty Christine Trout, are charged as accomplices and also are in the Lubbock county jail.

"Both men refused to admit the robbery. Asked where they lived, however, one of them said, "It looks like we'll be living in Huntsville before long."

Motley County Sheriff John Stotts said all four of the suspects had been identified by Kifer and by other persons who reported seeing them in town the day of the robbery.

"No I never needed the money when I pulled a job," said Owens. "It just gave me a sort of exciting feeling. Yes, I've almost been caught while burglarizing a place, but I think they were as scared as I was."

"You're damned right," he said when asked if his childhood was a happy one. "You're damned right," he said again when asked if his home was a happy one. He said he is a painter when he is working.

"Me?" asked his companion. "I work at first one thing and the other. I don't know whether you'd say my childhood was happy or not. I spent most of it in reform school."

Hopes Mother Not Told
Helmer, in response to a request, bared his chest where the tattooed letters "USN" were visible. He also showed the tattoo of a woman on his left forearm. (continued on back page)

Increase Expected in Whooping Cough

Inasmuch as the incidence of whooping cough in Texas is expected to show an increase during the coming months, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, released a statement today urging that strenuous efforts be made to control the spread of this debilitating childhood disease. There were 1273 cases reported during the first 5 weeks of this year.

"Whooping cough can only be contracted by direct exposure to the disease, and isolation of cases must be universally practiced if the incidence is to be controlled," Dr. Cox stated. "The infectious agent or germ of whooping cough is transmitted by droplets expelled in coughing, sneezing, or speaking," Dr. Cox said. "The discharges from the nose and throat are dangerous to susceptible persons; the need for early recognition and careful isolation of whooping cough is obvious. Your family physician should be called at the first sign."

"The first symptom of this disease is usually a dry cough, which persists day and night and tends to become increasingly severe. The disease is fully developed when vomiting of food and whooping accompany the paroxysm of cough. Dr. Cox stressed the fact that children who have whooping cough should not attend school or come in contact with other children until three weeks after the appearance of typical signs of the disease.

"Prevention and control of whooping cough, especially among infants and small children, may be accomplished

through use of approved vaccine and convalescent serum," Dr. Cox asserted, "and it is important that such measures be taken to protect them. Neglecting to do so, and allowing the young child to suffer an attack of this disease, may seriously impair his future health."

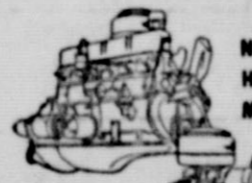

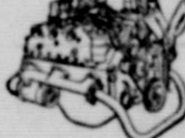

arm and that of an arrow-pierced heart on his lower right arm. At the time of the robbery, Kifer had said one of the bandits wore an open jacket which revealed a tattoo on his stomach. Downstairs in the jail, Mrs. Helmer and the other girl looked up as the jailer entered. Taking their plight in stride—except for the lack of cigarettes—they obligingly posed for pictures. One of them remarked they would probably be in the penitentiary "for the next ten years—or life." The younger said she hoped her mother didn't find out about her. Both said they wished they could comb

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their hair when asked for pictures. The two men and the two women have been charged in Motley County in connection with the robbery of Kifer of nearly \$100. They allegedly drove up to the service station, where a tattooed gunman, according to Kifer, entered under the pretext of selling an old battery. Kifer's billfold and the cash register were emptied. He then was forced to sit between two men while they drove into the rugged foothills of the caprock and turned him loose. The victim said his life was never seriously threatened.

On Feb. 13, the quartet in jail here was arrested in Union, Mo., "where we were just riding in the car." They were brought back to Matador last Saturday by Sheriff Stotts and Texas Ranger W. E. (Razz) Renfrow of Lubbock. Monday, they were transferred here.

Kifer at the time of the robbery said the four were riding in a 1935 or 1936 Ford. Helmer said he owned a 1936 Ford.

Sheriff Stotts said bond of \$25,000 each was set for the two men in Matador Monday by Justice of Peace H. F. Pipkin. Bond of \$5,000 each were set for the

women. The cases against all will be presented at 110th District Grand Jury which Judge Alton B. Chapman of Floydada has called for Friday.
