

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



Increase Expected In Whooping Cough

whooping cough in Texas is expected to show an increase during the coming months, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, released a statement today urging that strenuous efforts be made to control the spread of this debilitating childhood disease. There were 1273 cases reported during the first 5 weeks of this year.

"Whooping cough can only be contracted by direct exposure to the disease, and isolation of cases must be universally practieed if the incidence is to be controlled," Dr. Cox stated.

"The infectious agent or germ of whooping cough is transmitted by droplets expelled in coughing, sneezing, or speaking", Dr. Cox said. 




