He walked away from the accident none the worse except a slight injury to his thumb. Members of the mesquite eradication spraying firm and ranchers observed the plane crash on a distant hill side at the edge of the Cap Rock and one man left hurriedly to summon a Eudy-Seale ambulance, while others drove rapidly to the scene of accident. Pilot Gardner came forward to meet them. Next day he went to Oklahoma City and piloted another plane back to continue the mesquite spraying. The company now has three planes in the county and last night had sprayed over 7.000 acres of mesquite-infested ranchland.
