

At the apothecary shop, said to be the oldest in the country, beeswax candles are cast while in Moravin homes housewives are busy baking pies and cookies from time-honored recipes.

Traditionally, the city has its own Christmas "putz" on view, but these miniature portrayals of the nativity also can be found in practically every house and are proudly exhibited. The putz has a charm all of its own and it is not unusual to find little carved figures which have appeared year after year for threequarters of a century. Inspiring Service

The Moravian Christmas servce is a beautiful and inspiring eccasion. Latecomers will find it difficult to obtain tickets for it at the old Moravian Church which dates back to 1803.

The dawn of Christmas Day heralded from the tower of the Moravian Church by the famous trombone choir playing the traditional carol, "How brightly shines the morning star." There is no escaping the peace and trapquility that has settled over the town, one of the few where Christmas retains a real meaning in the hearts of nen and women.

Walking around Bethlehem is an experience any time of the day. In the evening, of course, the eye is dazzled by the profusion of lights. 



The Pilgrims forbade Christmas celebrations on the grounds they were pagan. A Massachusetts law in 1689 subjected anyone to fine who observed the day by feasting, refraining from work or in any other manner.

It was not until near the end of the American Revolution that the Christmas tree took hold. German immigrants. homesick for the tradition of their native land, put them up. The custom of the lighted Christmas tree, some historians tell, originated with Martin Luther. He was fascinated by evergreen trees. glistening with starlit-snow, pointing to the heavens at Christmas time. So he brought an evergreen tree into his house and lighted it with candles for his children.

Another old German legend credits St. Boniface with the origin of the Christmas tree. Having converted some oak tree-worshipping Druids to Christianity, he took them into a forest, cut down an oak and pointed to a stately fir along side. "Take this tree." said, "into your homes as a sign of your new worship. Celebrate God's power no more with shameful rites, but in the sanctity of your homes with laughter and love."

Kitchen Tricks

FROSTED MINT LEAVES A Christmasy decoration to tuck in the side of a plum pudding or hang on the side of a cold beverage glass or to lay on the edge of a salad plate is a sprig of frosted green mint leaves. They are lovely - and you can eat them. Beat egg white to a froth and dip bunches of mint leaves in it; shake gently; dip into powdered sugar; then dip in the sugar again until each leaf is covered. Dry on wire cake rack. Frost small bunches of white grapes this way, too.

SHARE AND CARE PROGRAM PLANNED BY NATIONAL 4-H

Texas 4-H club members and other interested individuals, as well as business concerns, are invited to participate in the "Share and Care" program for the National 4-H Club Center, said Floyd Lynch, state 4-H club

A twelve and half-acre campus with five buildings and adequate parking space for the center were purchased last February at 6410 Connecticut Ave., Chevy Chase, Md., which is only a 20-minute drive from the White House and U. S. Capitol building.

"The center will serve as national assembly grounds for many groups," Lynch said. 'Priority will be given youth groups interested in rural life; the annual National 4-H Club Camp heads the list."

As planned, the center will have lodging, dining and conference facilities for groups of up to 300 persons. It will be operated the year-round on a non-profit basis.

The center was purchased at a cost of \$375,000. An additional \$290,000 is needed for repairs and remodeling. And a scholarship program is planned to help support the training programs. Lynch points out that this adds up a million-dollar program.

"No government funds are available for the center," he said. "Contributions are neededed now. They should be sent to local county Extension offices; to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service College Station; or to the National 4-H Club Foundation care Extension Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D. C."



Unsulphured Molasses Gingerbread Key



Just as you use a specific type of flour for rolls and cake, or a definite shortening, you use unsulphured molasses rather than other types for a gingerbread with sweetness and delicate aromatic flavor. This unsulphured molasses has the sweetness of sugar because it is the concentrated juice of sugar cane, aged and blended. But it is more than a natural sweetening, it has distinction of flavor and on that flavor the popularity of gingerbread is based. Gingerbread muffins are an excellent hot bread with the main course. In cup cake style, gingerbread comes in for dessert honors. To dress them up cut a come out of the top of the cakes and fill the cavity with whipped cream and fit the "top hat" back in place. Baked in layer style, gingerbread dessert squares may be garnished with spiced canned applesauce or a chocolate or lemon sauce. The following recipe makes enough for the cup cakes and muffins or one layer square.

Grandma's Homemade Gingerbread

Grandma's Homemade Gingerbread 2% cups sifted all-purpose flour 1/2 cup shortening

1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder % cup sugar % teaspoon soda

cup unsulphured molasses teaspoon ginger teaspoons cinnamon 2 eggs 1 cup hot water 1/2 teaspoon cloves

Sift together flour, salt, baking powder, ginger, cinnamon and cloves. Cream shortening, sugar and soda. Add unsulphured molasses. Stir in % cup flour mixture. Beat in eggs. Add hot water alternately with remaining flour mixture. Beat 1/2 minute. Turn into 12 well greased 2%-inch muffin pans and 12 2%-inch muffin pans. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) 20 minutes. For gingerbread layer, turn batter into a well greased, lightly floured 9 x 9 x 2 inch pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) 45 minutes.




