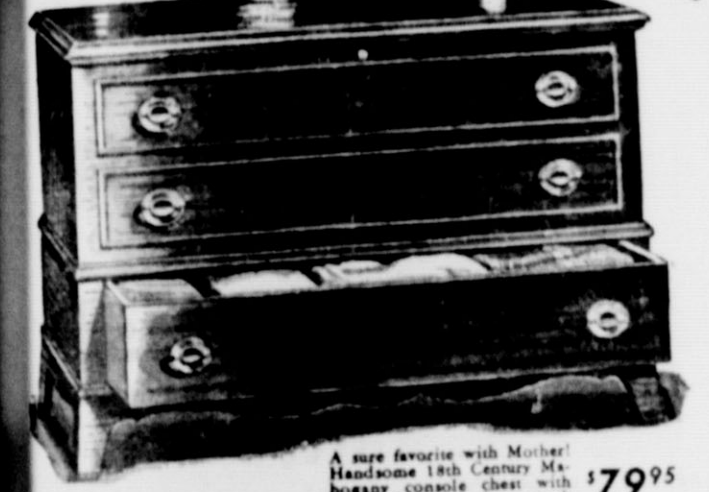

Coyotes Lured By Brandon's Whistle

El Coyote is one of the smartest of all animals and can adapt himself almost anywhere. Otherwise, he'd long have been extinct, for he has a lot of enemies, including man.

But the prairie wolf's curiosity can be his downfall. This has been demonstrated by a shrill little whistle manufactured by R. L. Brandon of Matador.

It sounds like the squeal of a rabbit in distress. If there are any coyotes within range of the whistle, they'll invariably come directly toward the man blowing the whistle. If the hunter is well-hidden and the coyote doesn't catch his scent, he'll get a shot at the animal.

That's what Jerome Martin and Henry Bush, two El Paso hunters, have discovered. Blowing their whistle, they called up three coyotes in one minute recently east of Clint. Near Fabens, among the sand dunes, they lured coyotes within rifle range by blowing their squealer. They killed two and possibly wounded others. (From El Paso Herald Post).

Home Sanitation Important During Hot Summer Months

With the approach of warm summer days, emphasis on home sanitation becomes increasingly

important, stated Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

At this season of the year your special emphasis on a clean-up designed primarily for the two-fold purpose of elimination of flies and rats. These two health hazards can be controlled only through sanitary practices. Places where they feed and breed and rest must be destroyed.

The common housefly has demonstrated that it can spread more than 20 human diseases. Some of the more serious are typhoid fever, diarrhea and dysentery. They have also been implicated in the spread of polio. Rats and mice have been accused in the spreading of 29 to 30 diseases.

"It is plain to see," says Dr. Cox, "that your health and that of your family and community depends in a good measure upon your maintenance of clean, fly and rat-free premises."

Spraying to kill flies and poisoning of rats are valuable supplements to the sanitation program, but will not do the

nation job by themselves. Sanitation is largely a personal matter. It is a way of life, pressed in clean, healthful surroundings.

Representative To Explain Survivors And Other Benefits

"Just what is old-age and survivors insurance?" That question is frequently asked since the Social Security Act was amended to include the self-employed and regular farm and household workers, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

In answer to the question, Cleveland said, "It is a plan under which families have a regular monthly income when their earnings are cut off by retirement or death.

"The insurance is paid as a matter of right because it is earned and paid for by workers, (including the self-employed,) and employers," Cleveland explained.

"This family insurance partially replaces the loss of earned income of retired workers and the close relatives of deceased workers."

"The payments range from \$15.00 to \$150.00 a month depending upon the members of the family and the average earnings of the worker," Cleveland explained.

The insurance is paid to eligible applicants whether the money is needed or not, but an application must be filed with an office of the Social Security Administration before the payments can begin.

COME TO CHURCH SUNDAY

Blue Cross Will Offer Enrollment To Individuals

For the first time in history, the Texas Blue Cross and Blue Shield Plans for Hospital and Medical-Surgical Care have announced a continuing program for non-group enrollment for individuals. The official announcement was made by Mr. W. R. McBee, Executive Director of Blue Cross and Blue Shield, in an address to the members of the Board of Medical Councilors of the State Medical Association meeting in Dallas. The Association's Convention is scheduled for May 4 through May 6.

"This non-group enrollment for individuals will make Blue Cross-Blue Shield available to thousands of Texans heretofore not eligible. This enrollment will start immediately and will be continuous," McBee said.

This modern idea of prepaid medical care had its birth in Dallas in 1929 when it was first introduced for hospital participation in the Baylor University Hospital. It was first employed as protection for the public school teachers of Dallas who had operated their own private plan for several years prior to the Baylor adoption. From the beginning, this cooperative movement between the hospital, the doctor, and the plan was based on group enrollment to permit maximum coverage at reduced cost.

Throughout the years individual requests for enrollment have mounted until local experimental enrollments proved the plausibility of going forward with an individual plan on a state wide basis.

In addressing the medical councilors, McBee said, "This additional step forward results from constant study and a desire on the part of the officers and directors to make this voluntary program available to all Texans."

Illustrating the acceptance of this modern idea of mass protection for medical problems the Blue Cross Plan for Texas has grown from a few thousand
