



Is "Mr." or "Mrs." part of a legal signature? Lawyers find that people are often at a loss to know how to sign their names to legal documents. And, while signature discrepancies utilimately may be straightened out, the provess can be expensive.

In legal effect, a name is used merely as one method of distinguished one person from another. Under the Common Law, since very early times, a legal name has consisted of one Christian or given name, and one surname which is the family name Generally, use of both such names is necessary for legal identification.
