

# Absentees Set Record In Primary Balloting

**PEOPLE ARE ANXIOUS** to vote in Saturday's Democratic primary election. At the time for absentee voting last evening County Clerk Pat Sheridan said that absentee applications had registered which means that Motley county voters already voted for the candidates on the ballot. It is the largest absentee

vote since I have been in office," Mr. Sheridan declared, "and I believe it is the largest absentee vote ever registered in the county."

Mr. Sheridan believes the county may poll between 1,400 and 1,500 votes. "That is my guess," he declared, "and it is based on the 1,275 poll tax receipts and an estimated 225 'over' voters who do not need

to register."

County Democratic Chairman W. L. McWilliams said all boxes and voting supplies had been delivered late Tuesday and that balloting would start at 7 a. m. Saturday morning and continue without interruption until 7 p. m. when the polls will close.

"A few voters are confused," Mr. McWilliams declared, "with regard to voting in the primary.

They want to vote a "split ticket" in the general election in November and fear they can not vote in the primary.

"They are pledged only to the nominees of the primary ballot (Saturday's election) but they are not pledged to the presidential and vice-presidential nominees who will appear on the November ballot."

Some local political observers

say they believe Motley county may poll the largest vote in its history. The voter is saying little. He is studying the ballot and he is evaluating the candidates. The way he votes will be secret.

**Bank Will Be Closed**

First State Bank here will observe the legal holiday remaining closed all day, with the post office, county offices, city hall

and West Texas Utilities company closing at noon as usual. But Saturday will be a big day in Matador.

Election returns from the seven county voting places: North and South Matador at the courthouse, Roaring Springs, Union Corner, Whiteflat, Flomot and Northfield will hold the top

place of interest, to be followed by districts, including senatorial and representative, and state offices. Much interest will rest on the 88th representative district, composed of Donley, Childress, Hall and Motley counties, in which Motley county has a native son, Elbert Reeves, as candidate.

**Cars Sideswipe In Highway Accident**

A second tragic Highway accident within eight days was narrowly averted early Tuesday morning about one-half mile west of Matador.

The accident occurred about 2:30 a. m. when a 1940 Oldsmobile driven by Charlie E. Pelton, 50, of Portales, N. M., sideswiped a 1952 Ford driven by Mrs. Pauline Harlan, 504 N. 2nd street, Brownfield.

Sheriff John Stotts who investigated the accident said that if Mrs. Harlan had not driven off the pavement the two cars would have met in a head-on crash. Wheels of the two automobiles caught during the accident and the Oldsmobile was reduced to what was described as a total loss. Mrs. Harlan, who was driving west, was accompanied by her husband and a 14-year-old daughter. Damage to her automobile was estimated at \$300.

Pelton was accompanied by William Ordner, about 40, who was thrown from the automobile. He was treated at Stanley Clinic for a cut on the left hand.

## Two Taxi Drivers To Submit To Lie Tests

FLOYDADA, July 23 (Special) Floyd County Sheriff Leland Hart accompanied two Lubbock cab drivers to Austin today to be given lie detector tests in connection with a missing 96-year-old Floydada farmer. He is expected to return with the men today.

Texas Rangers, who have been working closely with Hart, said the men were not in custody but had volunteered to submit to the tests.

An investigation of the disappearance of R. L. Ardry disclosed the two cab drivers had taken the missing man from Lubbock to Littlefield a few days after he had been reported missing, Rangers said.

Officers fear that Ardry, who was last seen June 12, may have met with foul play.

A recent search of Blanco Canyon near Floydada failed to disclose any clue relating to the disappearance of the man.

Information Ardry had been in Lubbock had not been disclosed in previous inquiries, Hart said.

## Stevenson Rates High As Nominee

Riding through the arena of the Chicago Democratic convention, and spurring every jump, Texas' Statesman Governor Allan Shivers, Tuesday kept his promise to over 92 per cent of the state's Democratic voters.

His 52-member delegation was seated in the Democratic saddle despite vigorous opposition by the so-called "loyalists" faction led by former Representative Maury Maverick. The approval was won by a voice vote in the convention.

Governor Shivers in his fight to take an uninstructed delegation to Chicago won for himself strong opposition from the Truman Democrats of Texas. His own race for re-election as governor is in the hands of his friends back home.

Two words, "Texas" and "Shivers" echoed across the nation since the beginning of the convention. Fighting for a higher place for Texas in the brackets of the Democratic party, Governor Shivers declared he was tired of being a part of "the solid South" and pledged to support the candidate of the National Democratic machine. Over 92 per cent of the state's Democratic voters believed the same way, although strong claims had been made that the Shivers group would not be seated in the convention.

Aspects of the convention were changing rapidly and it is probable another candidate may be leading for the nomination before the ink is dry on this newspaper, but Governor Adlia Stevenson of Illinois appears to be the choice despite Kefauver's numerical standing of 262 pledges (needed to nominate 615).

Governor Stevenson has declared that he is not a candidate but political leaders believe he will accept a movement to draft his name at the head of the Democratic ticket, as "the one man who can beat Ike."

While the Texas delegation would prefer Richard Russell, an old line Jeffersonian Democrat, Stevenson would be more acceptable than any other nominee except the Georgia senator.

**Revolt Is Nipped**

Party leaders sought to nip a threatened revolt of southern states and "harmony" was forecast before the convention is ended. Civil rights plank in the party platform was expected to be the biggest hurdle according to newsmen.

## Deadline Near On School Transfers

Transfer of school students from one district to another must be made before August 1, according to Ex-Officio County Superintendent C. W. Giesecke. Application for the transfer must be filed with the county superintendent during the month of July and will, with the approval of the Commissioner of Education, qualify the child for all Foundation program benefits.

A scholastic residing in the district but whose name does not appear on the census roll, may be transferred on the basis of parental request to the county board at any time prior to September 1. This regulation affects students whose names were inadvertently left off the scholastic roll, or who have moved into the district since the March census.

### OPPONENT CHARGES AGAINST GOVERNOR ARE PROVEN FALSE

Charges and insinuations being made against Gov. Allan Shivers by an opponent in the gubernatorial race about a "yacht trip" the governor and his family made in 1948 in Galveston are without fact, David C. Leavell, Galveston publisher, said Saturday.

"Insinuations are being leveled at Gov. Shivers concerning the propriety of a visit he made to Galveston which must be repudiated as false."

"These charges, coming at a time when Texas democrats are puzzled over how their respective delegates may be treated at the National Democratic Convention after other Texans experienced a similar bitter contest at the Republican session, are certainly in poor taste and wholly without fact."

"I refer to charges and insinuations being made in the press and over the radio about Governor Shivers making a trip on the yacht 'Balinese' while on a visit to Galveston when he was lieutenant governor."

"In 1948, while serving as vice president of the Galveston Chamber of Commerce, I joined E. C. Leach, immediate past president of the Greater Galveston Beach Association, in inviting Governor Shivers and his family to visit our city and relax on our beaches."

**City Host To Official**  
"The then lieutenant governor accepted, and with his wife and three children, came to Galveston for the week-end. A highlight of the visit included a yacht trip which was originally planned to be aboard one of the city's finest yachts. The boat's engines did not function properly and in quickly seeking a substitute craft, Leach found the first yacht to be available immediately was the Balinese."

"The lieutenant governor didn't have the slightest idea before or at the time what yacht was to be used and since we were going out for a brief sight-seeing tour, it never occurred to the hosts that use of the 'Balinese' could be used for political purposes in the future."

"This vessel had and has been used by scores of groups from throughout the country by Galveston civic leaders and for no other purpose than to 'show off' our fine beaches and port facilities."

**Cruise Of City's Port**  
"The trip now in question was a two-hour inspection cruise that included all sections of Galveston's port, thence to the nearby Texas City port to view damage from that community's disastrous explosion along the waterfront, and finally out into the Gulf and return to our home port."

"Others invited on this cruise, in addition to Mrs. Leavell, were E. H. Thornton, jr., now Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, and Mrs. Thornton; the U. S. District army engineer and his wife, now in Korea; the Mayor of Galveston and his wife; Mr. and Mrs. Julius Scheppe of Dallas, with their daughter and grandchildren."

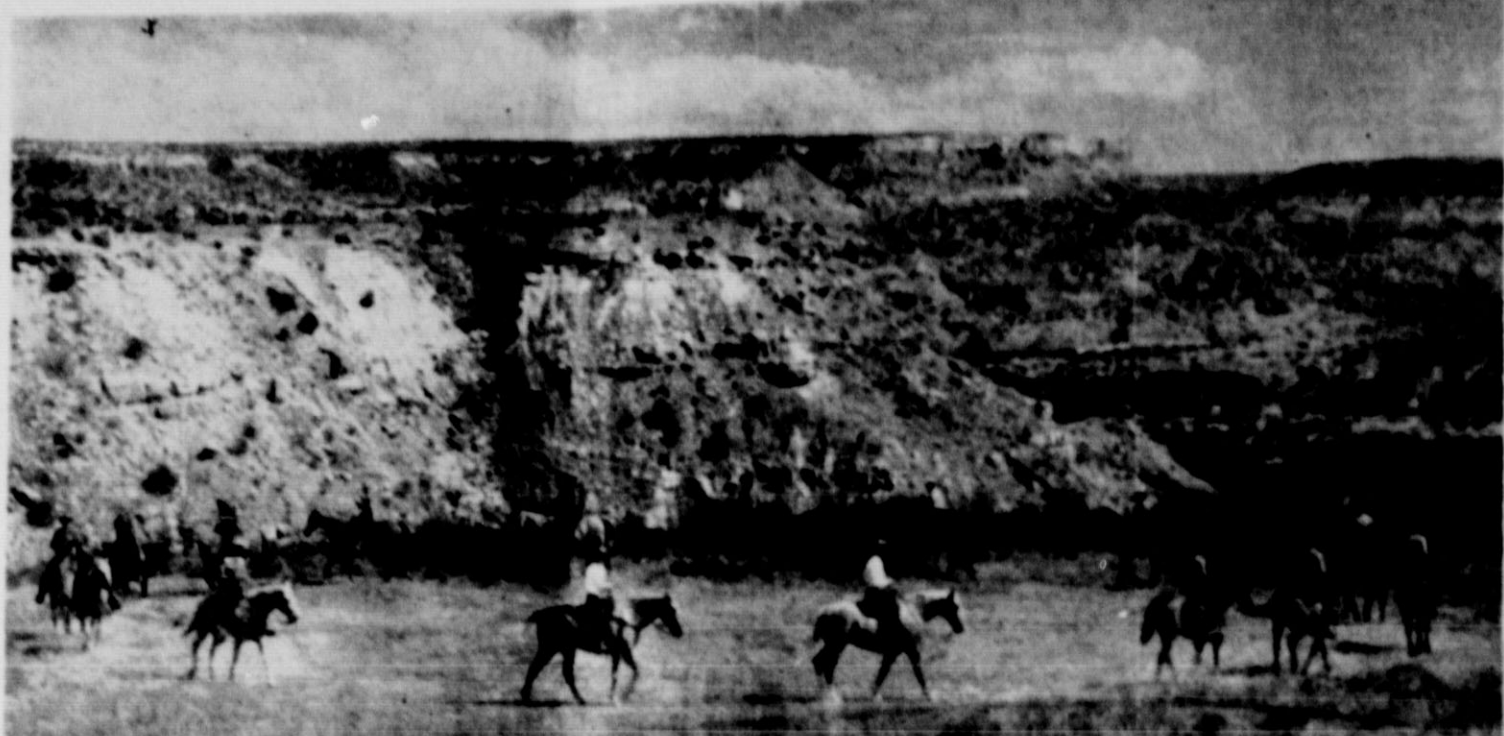

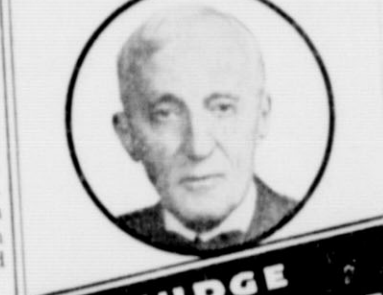

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)

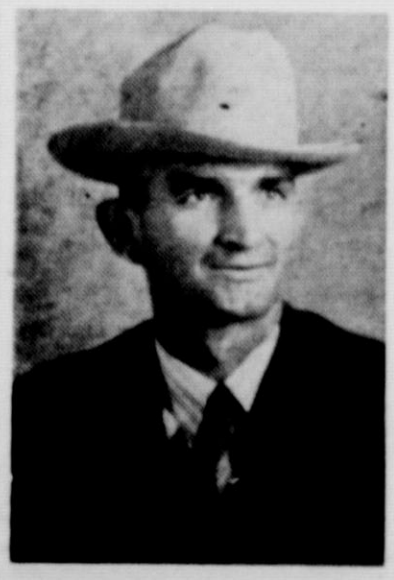

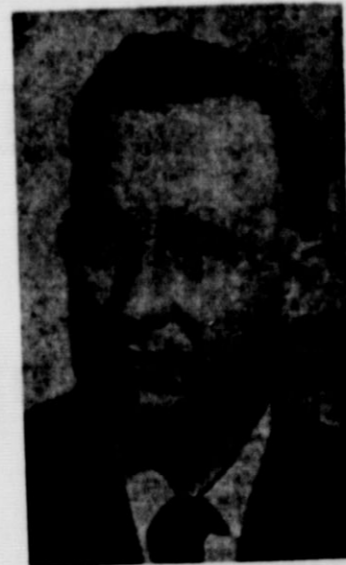

### Fly Control Urged By Health Officer

The control of the fly menace comes at the top of the list of necessary public health measures which should be applied by every city, community, and individual in the state, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The most effective measure for fly control is to prevent their breeding. Flies breed in filth

and about eight days are required to complete a life cycle. During her life time of several months, one fly lays from 600 to 1,000 eggs.

To eliminate flies, the breeding places must be destroyed. Manure piles, garbage, and other filth furnish the requirements of warmth, moisture, and food necessary for the propagation of the fly. Flies should be kept from contact with food or drink or utensils in which such food and drink are prepared and served. Likewise, they should be kept from access to privy vaults

where they pick up the infections, which they later spread to humans by contact with the food and drink, and by unwashed hands and utensils.

See that your windows, doors, and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor will not molest your family. See that your grocer keeps meat, vegetables, and fruit screened from flies.

The use of DDT and other sprays for the control of all varieties of adult flies and fly larvae have come into wide usage. However, their use should be, after all trash and breeding places have been eliminated. Otherwise, spraying will give only temporary relief and a false sense of security.

### Increase Made In Social Security Payments Due Soon

About 3,500 people in the South Plains area will receive higher social security payments beginning early in October as a result of the social security amendments which President Truman signed into law last Friday, July 18, 1952.

John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office, emphasized that no one needs to apply for the increased payments. "The Social Security Administration is already changing the amounts," he pointed out. "We expect to get them changed in time to have them in the mail October 3, the regular delivery date, but if in a few

Mr. Hutton pointed out that although nearly every family receiving payments would receive an increase, the additional amount would not always be divided among all the members of the family receiving monthly checks. In some cases the entire increase will go to the retired worker.
