## Harvest Started In Wheat Fields

### Combines Sweeping Over Golden Acres

Combines are cutting across fields of fine wheat in the north section of the county and trucks are being made available to move the crop. Showers which fell Tuesday night and early Wednesday (rainfall here about .40 inch) will cause a slight delay as the county's harvest gets under way.

FIRST harvest of Motley county wheat from the 1952 crop was reported Tuesday shortly before noon. L. H. Dirickson of Matador sold a pick-up load to the Red Ball Elevator at Roaring Springs (the county's only grain elevator) for \$2.10 per bushel, or 5¢ per bushel above market price. It was the first the firm had received from this year's crop.

The wheat tested a moisture content of 12.46 and weighed 64.5 pounds per bushel. Mr. Dirickson said the field was yielding approximately 12 bushels per acre.

While most farmers and ranchers plant wheat for pasture, when conditions are favorable the crops are allowed to develop into grain. Estimates of the number of acres in wheat ripening for harvest in the county were not available.

Red Ball Elevator provides modern facilities for handling wheat and also receives daily teletype reports from the country's principal markets.

### Born At Whiteflat

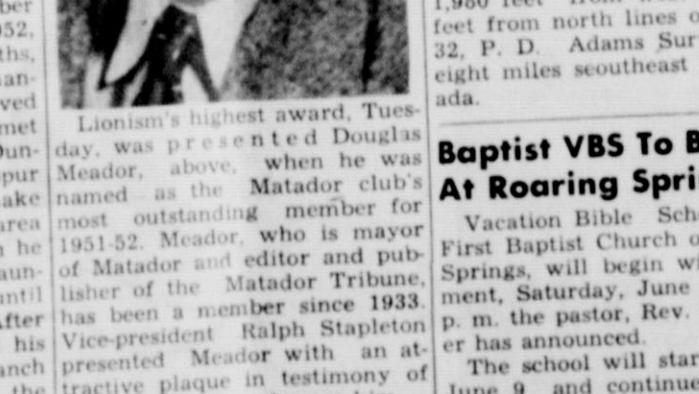

C. E. Fisher, Superintendent of the Spur Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, was presented \$5,000 gold medal as winner of the Sabinella Award.

search work before the Matador Lions club, and directed the spraying of thousands of acres Motley county range land. His many friends here rejoice in his highly deserved recognition for an outstanding work.

The award went to Fisher for his work on devising ways to eradicate mesquite—the scrawny tree that infests more than 55 million acres of rangeland in 113 Texas counties, depriving livestock men of pasture and millions of dollars potential profits each year.

Fisher's research resulted last year in the control of mesquite on more than 400,000 acres. The control method is simple: A low-flying airplane sprays the mesquite with coarse droplets of an oil-water emulsion loaded with a new chemical herbicide. Flying just above the tree tops, the pilot sprays a wide swath of

## Dougherty Child Killed In Auto Accident May 24

A Dougherty child, Teddy Carter Smith, three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William H. (Bill) Smith, was killed in a highway accident Saturday afternoon, May 24, when he was thrown from a farm truck and crushed as it overturned on a farm road near his home in Floyd County.

Two youths, one the child's brother, escaped injury in the mishap.

The youngster was pronounced dead on arrival at Stanley Hospital in Matador, after the accident.

Texas Highway Patrolman Thurman Keefer and Floyd County Deputy A. K. Alton, investigated the mishap, and according to the officers, the youngster's nine-year-old brother, Ronnie Smith, was driving a load of cotton seed to his father, who was planting in a nearby field.

With him was a neighbor youth, George Scott, 10, and his younger brother. May reported the oldest Smith boy said the truck "got out of control" on the narrow dirt road and overturned. Young Teddy was crushed as it rolled over, but the other two boys were uninjured.

mesquite as he goes. One pound of the hormone-type chemical, 2,4,5-T is recommended per acre. Cost of treating is about \$3 per acre.

The judges, in selecting the work on mesquite control over that of 30 other Texas agricultural scientists whose research has been entered, pointed out:

"No absolute method for the final eradication of mesquite has been perfected, but the research of C. E. Fisher provides new hope for the farmers and ranchmen of Texas and the Southwest through the provision of an economic and effective means of controlling the brush. His research has immediate and widespread application."

Fisher's control method not only kills about 89 per cent of the mesquite to ground level but invades the bud zone area below ground and prevents a high percentage of the plant from sprouting.

The chemical spraying of the brush not only knocks out the mesquite but many other range pests such as cocklebur and sunflowers. The treatments can be administered while cattle and

other livestock are on the land. The chemical must be carefully used however, for even in trace amounts it will damage highly susceptible crops such as cotton, alfalfa, clovers, grapes, tomatoes and many others.

**Serves Three Purposes**  
Fisher and his staff conducted hundreds of experiments in his long fight against mesquite brush before the method of airplane control with 2,4,5-T was perfected.

Three-fold benefits result from the solution to this problem peculiar to the ranges of the southwest: 1. It is much easier to handle and care for livestock in cleared areas; 2. Improved growth of native grasses helps to rebuild the soil and aids in conservation; 3. Cleared areas afford better grazing.

During the past three years in experiments at Spur, steers gained 28 per cent more weight on cleared pastures than in brush pastures.
