mill. As a matter of fact he has recommended the purchase of the machines and is making an effort to get one of the machines placed in all of the firm's mills to condition and prepare cotton for their spinning purposes.

"All the qualified ginners and oil mill men who have inspected and seen the new lint cleaners in operation have been unanimous in their opinion that it is not only necessary but essential that the ginners install the machines in order to protect the farmers against loss in grade and staple and at the same time make the cotton more desirable to the domestic mill trade."

A letter from a cotton buyer reads like this: "As you know we buy cotton from every gin in your territory and we have watched the grades and staples... we have found that the lint cleaner you made and placed in your gin, has raised the grade and combed out and increased the length of the staple... your cleaner is the only thing that will do the job on cotton that is gathered by machines..." (Names of firms and individuals quoted above may be obtained from Mr. Moss.)

Ginner Of The Month

November 3 issue of the "The Cotton Digest" named Mr. Moss as Ginner of the Month and devoted an entire page to describing the unusual personality that invented and perfected the Moss Lint Cleaner. The writer concludes his article by declaring: "...it looks very much like Ennis Moss, who put his heart in the gin business to try to make the farmer the most money possible in all phases of the giant cotton industry and be called one of the industry's great servants in helping the honored fiber maintain its position against all competitors by making it possible to produce good cotton cheaper."

December issue of the "The Cotton Gin and Oil Mill Press" carried a full page two-color inside-back cover advertisement announcing the Moss Lint Cleaner under the signature of the Gullett Gin Company.

Last week 37 of the cleaners had been sold (cost is approximately \$10,000). A wall map in Mr. Moss' office at Roaring

Springs is dotted with pins bearing small flags, each at the location of a cleaner installation. They already reach from coast to coast and an order has been received from the Republic of Mexico.
