County Polls 585 Votes in Primary

Motley County voters went to the polls and cast 585 ballots in last Saturday's 2nd Democratic primary. Largest vote-getter was Dolph Briscoe with 439 for the governor nomination. Mrs. Frances "Sissy" Parenthold received 143.

In the Senator race Barefoot Sanders was out in front with 402 against Ralph Yarborough's 175.

In the Lieutenant Governor race Wayne Connally won in Motley County 372, but lost state nomination, to Bill Hobby's 204.

Robert S. Calvert received 307 for the office of Comptroller of Public Accounts, to James Wilson's 247.

Impressive Ceremony at Dedication of Assembly of God District Youth Camp

ONCE A DREAM is now a realization and the Assembly of God Youth Camp 11 miles east of Roaring Springs. Willing hands, prayer and funds have changed the 43 acres donated by Mr. and Mrs. Ben Dillard in 1962 from rough mesquite covered pasture to a thriving camp with modern facilities.

Assembly of God Youth Camp has nine modern masonry buildings and one large sheet iron building (the Tabernacle where the impressive formal dedication service was held Saturday).

J. A. Thomas, District Superintendent for 20 years, now retired, said the district did not have any money when the land was donated for a youth camp 11 years ago. The approximately 125 churches in the district pledged help to build the camp in the form of money and labor. Many gave of both money and labor.

Rev. Haskell Rogers of Lubbock, District Superintendent conducted the dedication service and said many preachers gave up their vacation and extra time to work and sweat in building the camp. Help came from many sources as the land was cleared and buildings started. Ben Dillard lived to see most of the buildings erected. He died three years ago. The land is part of the 2000-acre Dillard Ranch, which they purchased in 1936.

The Rev. Mrs. Ben Dillard has pastored the Roaring Springs Assembly of God Church for 26 years.

"We lived here on the ranch until 1950," Mrs. Dillard declared "and our four children were reared here and graduated from Roaring Springs High School."

One of the problems when the camp was started, was a source of water. Six wells were dug before adequate water was found. The supply contains some minerals and it was feared that it might not agree with young people attending the camp. The problem was solved by building a separate drinking water system, with the water being hauled from the City of Roaring Springs. It is placed under pressure and supplies the refrigerated drinking fountains in all the buildings. Water pumped from the camp well is used for the swimming pool, irrigation and other purposes.

Dormitories have facilities for approximately 100 boys and 100 girls, but a less number usually attend. Three teen age and two junior camps are conducted Monday through Friday noon. The cost is \$17 for food, lodging and tuition (sheets must be brought by the youths). There is a regular cook in the lunch room and a nurse is on duty. The pastors who conduct the camp live in the staff house. The large recreation building is just being completed.

"We found that evil sources were reaching out for our boys and girls," a speaker declared, "and the camp was a necessity." Most impressive part of the dedication ceremony was the testimonies of four or five boys and girls who said they had found religion while attending the youth camp.

A group of four young people known as "The Disciples" played musical instruments and sang. Sides of the massive tabernacle building are open and the concrete floor is only a few inches above the prairie grass. A mocking bird began singing in the Hackberry trees along the winding South Peace River below.

Mrs. Dillard expressed her thanks to everyone who aided in building the camp, for the generosity of the people of Roaring Springs and especially to the county for building the road (and maintaining it) to the camp.

New Tax to Insure City Improvements

THE APPROVAL of the proposed 1% Sales Tax here on June 27 could insure enough funds to maintain city operation, and insure enough money for improvements, city officials declare.

It is the same tax that residents of Matador pay when they spend money in Lubbock, Amarillo, Wichita Falls, Paducah, Floydada, Plainview and most other towns.

It is the fairest tax known with everyone paying a share. The cities receive a check quarterly from the State Comptroller's office. In other words the state collects the tax (with the 4% state tax) and remits the 1% to the cities.

Matador rejected the proposal three years ago, and at the time the city was in good financial condition.

Since then it has been necessary to spend over \$8,000 on the water tank and expense of operation has increased. Money is needed to repair the many blocks of paving. Much of the city's equipment is old, including the road grader, city trash truck, fire truck, etc.

Matador has not had a re-appraisal of property in 20 years, so tax revenue has not increased. It is possible that the approval of the 1% sales tax would leave the present tax structure in its current status. It would provide the city with enough funds, according to estimates.

Mayor Kirby Campbell feels that it will be necessary to re-evaluate the property (and increase city taxes) if the sales tax is not approved.

The city of Dickens is voting on the same tax the same day, June 27. Only a few small towns have yet to approve this "painless" tax method that provides funds for operation without raising property taxes.

SCOUTING is again active in Matador under sponsorship of the Lions Club. At a re-organizational meeting Thursday night attended by boys and parents 12 boys joined Troop 360, and Freddie Welling again accepted the place of Scoutmaster. Matador Lions have sponsored a Scout troop for over 40 years.

Doug Palmer, Dist. Scout executive from Lubbock made the principal address Tuesday at the regular Lions luncheon meeting. He followed his talk with the showing of a film on Scouting.

He complimented the men who are to lead the re-organized troop here and said, "busy men conduct Scouting... the leaders of the nation today were formerly Scouts... 50 million boys have been affiliated with Scouting since it was started in 1908... about 40% of the Scout troops in the United States are sponsored by Lions Clubs..." 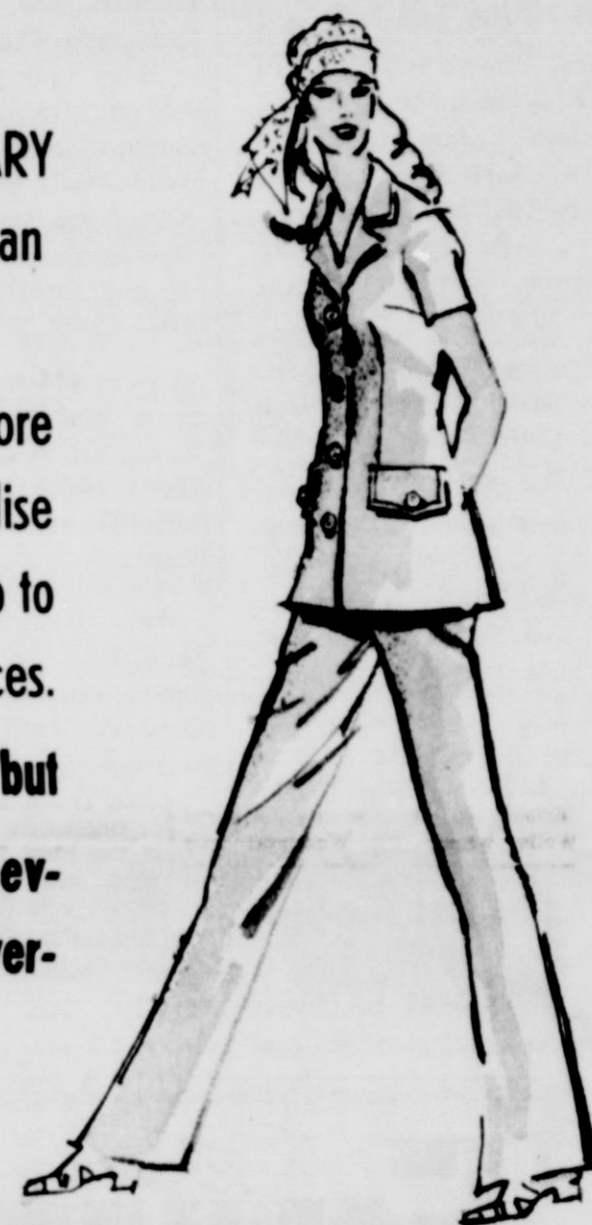

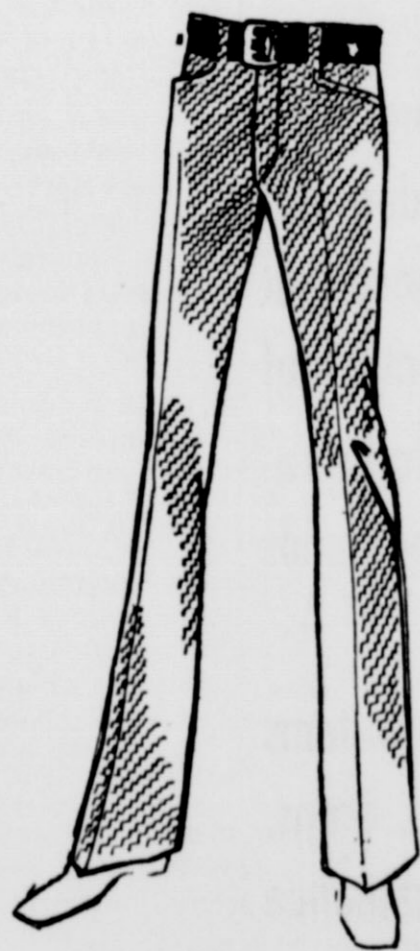

The Sales Tax is a FAIR TAX...

THE City Council is asking that the people of Matador approve a 1% sales tax on June 27th. It is a fair tax, in that everyone, both property-owners and non-property-owners, pay a small portion of this tax.

Matador must have more money for operation. The cost of labor and equipment for essential services has greatly increased in the past few years, while Matador remains with the same property evaluation of 20 years ago.

The recent repair work on the depreciated water system cost over \$8,000. The city does not have sufficient funds for street maintenance that will be required in the near future, and much of the city equipment is old and will have to be replaced in the next few years, but sufficient funds are not available to do it.

A city sales tax will apply only to those items already covered by the state sales. Food, drugs, etc. will not be taxed. Collection and remittance of the tax will not require additional work on the part of our local merchants, as the tax will be collected and remitted to the state along with the state sales tax. Then once each quarter the State Comptroller's office will compute and remit this amount directly to the city in one check.

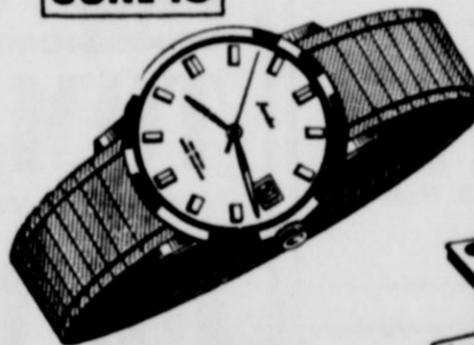

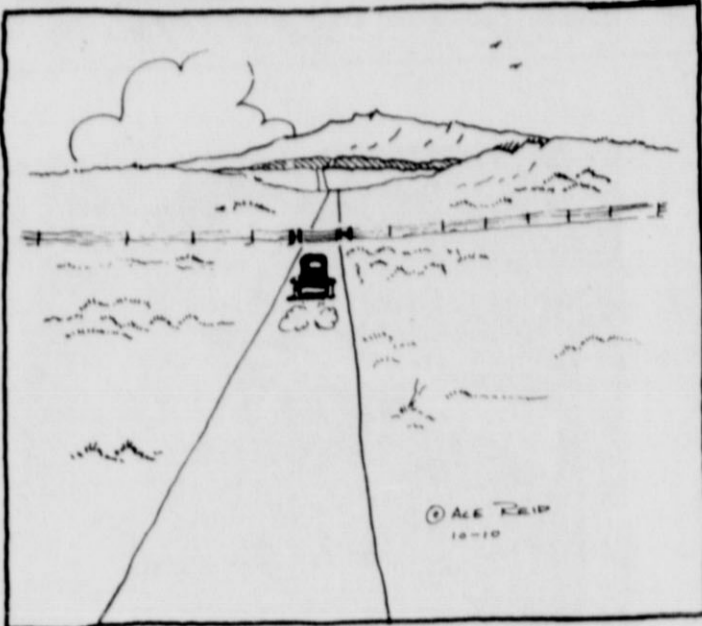
