ATLANTA, March 24, 1949—Dr. J. D. Grey opens The Baptist Hour series, Consider Jesus Sunday April 3. He is the first



man chosen to preach an entire series of 13 weeks since the program's inauguration in 1941, according to S. F. Lowe, Director of the Radio Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, Atlanta.

In May, Dr. Grey begins his thirteenth year as pastor of the First Baptist Church of New Orleans, La. For ten years he has conducted "The Gospel Hour" over WSMB, New Orleans, and now has three regular services broadcast over

A graduate of Union University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Dr. Grey has for ten years been a member of the Home Mission Board; is now President of the Louisiana Baptist Convention; and also president of the Southwide Alumni Association of Southwestern Seminary. He is much in demand as a revival preacher accepting five to seven meetings each year; and in July will fill this third week's engagement at the Southwide Training Union Assembly at Ridgecrest. In 1946 and 1947 he preached sermons at the Southern Convention.

A native of Kentucky, Dr. Grey claims the same home

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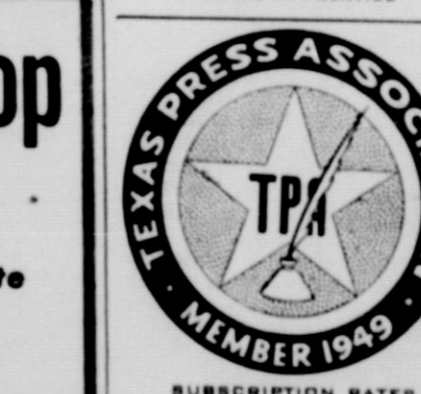

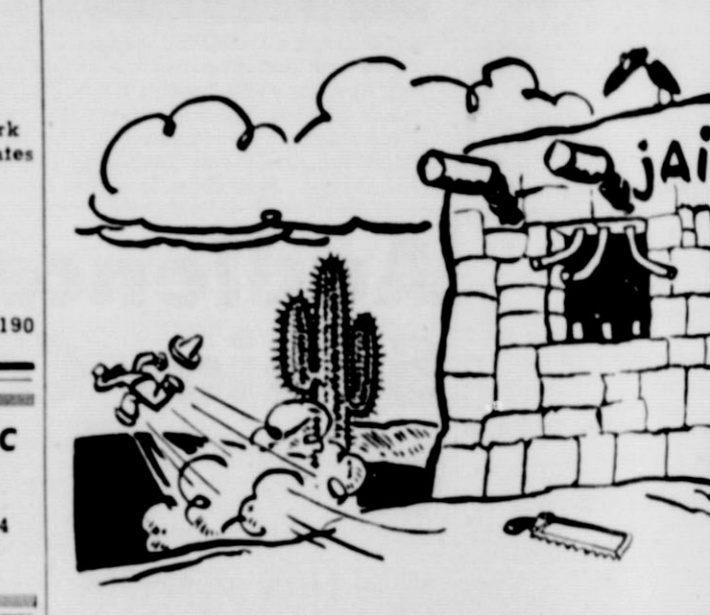

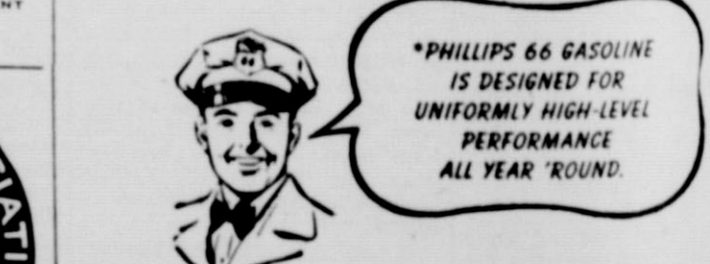

Bob Wills, Once A Barber In Shop at Turkey, Now Famous

For a guy who says he just didn't have any choice in the matter, Bob Wills turned out to be a pretty good fiddler. "Violin!" he snorts. "Never played one in my life, but just show me a fiddle!" Bob has been in Amarillo for several days recuperating from a serious illness which hospitalized him for two weeks at Fort Worth. The other night at the Cotton Club in Lubbock, he received his 12-piece band, which his absence has been directed by his brother, Luther J. another fiddler. In fact, Bob is a fiddling man in a fiddling family. The Willses don't have to take lessons. They're born with an in-

ward instinct for fiddling. Bob boasts that both his grandfathers were fiddlers. His father John Wills of Tulsa, formerly of Clovis, saws out a toe-tickling hoe downs, and Bob has nine uncles and seven aunts whose fiddle music won't let grass grow under the feet of anyone in listening distance. Bob has made 18 pictures in his time, out as far as he is concerned Hollywood is a dud. He prefers a live audience. He likes to be able to see the expression on his listeners' faces when he gives out with his famous, Ah! Ha! Sam Antonio! Bob's roots are deep in the soil of the Panhandle. Many of his songs originated in West Texas while he was playing for coun-

try dances or for just anyone who cared to listen to him. Three of Bob's songs which brought him national acclaim came from one idea while he was playing for Mexicans in New Mexico. "They only wanted to dance one step," said Bob, "and I used to get so bored that I'd just play a simple tune and put in my own variations." It wasn't long until Bob was experimenting on his customers with his own music.

A barber by trade, he decided that cutting hair, even if it did not possess the lure of music making, was a surer way of winding up at the end of the week with a meal ticket. So he began barbering the Floyce Ham Barbershop at Turkey. Bob's father farmed near Turkey and he grew up there.

One day, during the leisure hour at the barbershop, Bob, as was his custom, took down his fiddle and started to play a tune for the customers. He hit a note or two of one of the songs he had played in New Mexico. "Doc" Garner heard it and being a lover of fiddle music, asked for more. Abashed, Bob put his fiddle away for the day and fiddled to the inquisitive physician. "It's a song I learned in New Mexico," he told the doctor.

When Bob started playing over KPJZ with Pappy O'Daniel's Light Crust Doughboys in 1928, Dr. Garner's requests for the Mexican ditty came so thick and fast that Bob had to do something about it. So he worked out the complete music for the "Spanish Two Step."

The birth of the "Old San Antonio Rose" was just as spectacular. The director of a recording establishment told Bob that he was badly in need of another Spanish two step.

"Got it right now," said Bob, who firmly believes that recording people should be kept "up in the air."

Leaning close to one of his musicians, he whispered, "We'll just play the 'Spanish Two Step' backward."

Bob rode the crest of the "New San Antonio Rose" to musical fame. It was a hit over night and was hummed in every house hold and on every street corner

in America. It has long since graduated from the popular music class to the "standard" category. Bob says the sale of his recordings alone has reached the 34 million mark.

Strangely enough, Bob made his radio debut in Amarillo. He played over KGRS and WDAG, Amarillo's only radio stations. That was either in 1923 or 1924, says Bob. He doesn't remember exactly.

But he does remember the tightness in the pit of his stomach when he was shut up in the studio with nothing but his fiddle and a wicked looking microphone.

"There was a green light and a red light on the wall," he said. "The engineer told me to start playing when the red light flashed and play until the green light went on."

Bob held one of his first jobs at Amarillo. He helped to build the smelter and worked there two years. "I stole that job," he remembers with a grin.

"They were hiring carpenters to begin construction work," he said. "When they called the roll I fell in with the carpenters as though my name had been called. I didn't even have a hammer. Some one gave me a hammer, an old wornout saw and a carpenter's apron, so I was on the job before they even had a time-keeper."

Bob still loves West Texas, and although his home is now in Sacramento, Cal., he returns periodically. Last week he visited the old Wills homeplace near Turkey.

The Texas Playboys will go to Pecos from Lubbock and continue their tour. They left Sacramento Jan. 18 and will complete the tour some time in late April. Bob said he hopes to play at The Nat in April before returning to California.

The Playboys are sponsored by Crosley Appliances and are heard daily over three Sacramento radio stations. When they are on tour they are heard by transcription.
