The wheat market got a shot n the arm yesterday from "Dr." Brannan, Secretary of Agriculture by allowing on the ground storage during the distress period for a maximum of 90 days while satisfactory storage is being constructed. The hurried legislation permits federal loans for as much as 85% of the cost of storage construction. Further provision of the measure will be construction by CCC, storage facilities for 50,000,000 bushels. Wheat prices, which had lost as much as 50¢ per bushel in the past ten days, responded sharply to the government announcement. Ft. Worth grain men said the plan would bring speedy and lasting relief. Amarillo and West Texas grain dealers were less optimistic, according to newspaper reports.

# SOLON RAPS DRAIN OF NATURAL GAS **OUT OF TEXAS**

Representative W. R. Chambers (Dist. 125) of May, Texas has brought a vital subject to light in his HCR-18. The Legis lative subject is treated in the following statement released to the press:

In the newspapers of Thurs day, May 19th, there appeared a story stating that the Coastal Pipeline Company was going to file an application before the Federal Power Commission to build a 30-inch pipeline 1,000 miles long from Texas to Virginia. The same story mentioned the Piedmont Pipeline Company that also is applying for a certificate to build a big-inch pipeine to North Carolina.

Texas may be sure that both of them will be built, as the Texas Railroad Commission never opposes these applications. A few weeks earlier I noticed that the Gulf Coast Northern Pipeline Company was goa 34-inch line to Chicago. 

'Financing of the new system will require approximately six ty-five cents per \$100, of prop erty evaluation (as against fifty cents under the old plan), but i is generally believed that it will not be necessary to raise taxes since the district will be allowed approximately \$5600, for maintenance costs, against \$4500. past two years.

# State Department **Approves Current Report Of School**

Matador Public school records for the current year has been received and approved by the State Department of Education, according to information re ceived by Bert Ezzell, superintendent.

Several interesting items are disclosed by the report, particularly the fact that there are twenty more boys than girls in grade school, while in high school there are seven more irls than boys.

There were 397 students en rolled in the Matador schools for the current year. However, counting withdrawals and those who dropped out, the average enrollment was only 320.9 students. Deducting days absent gave the school an average daily attendance of 295.7 students.

Matador students attended school a total of 52,351 days and were absent a total of 4490 days. These figures are particularly important since under the new law the number of teachers allowed by the state is determined


